DISTRICT 117-B LEAGUE ORGANIZES FOR MEETS TO GET UNDERWAY SOON

The District 117-B Independent League composed of Rankin, Barnhart, Imhoff, and Wink, met recently and plans for the series which will get underway March 20. Joe Scrivner, president of Rankin schools, is chairman of the organization. He has also been named district director general of the league for 1958.

Meets were scheduled. On March 20 beginning at 9:00 a.m., the literary and one-act play activities will be held here in Rankin.

On March 28, volley ball play will be in Imperial. For April 3, Rankin will host the tennis meet and on April 9 and 11, Wink will entertain the league in the golf and track and field meets, respectively.

RANKIN DOES WELL

In past years, Rankin has taken their share of the District 117-B Spring events, particularly the literary phase. Wink has been a hot contender in the sports department while the remainder of the honors have gone to the various schools on a more equal basis.

This year some nine trophies and eighteen medals will be given to winning schools, and first and second place individuals. Rankin's chances appear to be good again this season for a number of the divisions, particularly the literary and the girls tennis. They will also compete in all other phases of the league.

DAY OF PRAYER OBSERVANCE

Selection of the Rankin High School student who will receive an all-expense paid trip to the United Nations moved toward the finish this week as the deadline for entries passed on Wednesday, Feb. 19. All entries from the high school were turned in to the principal, H. G. Adams.

On Friday night, Feb. 21, a committee composed of three members from each church in Rankin, three members of the Rankin school faculty and three members from the two lodges involved, will screen these applicants for the purpose of giving further examinations which will eventually lead to the selection of the delegate. The examinations will include a study kit and forms to be filled out which will be entered in a competitive contest and will be graded on points.

Final selection of the committee will be made as soon as they have determined the winner.

D. F. SCHNAUBERT

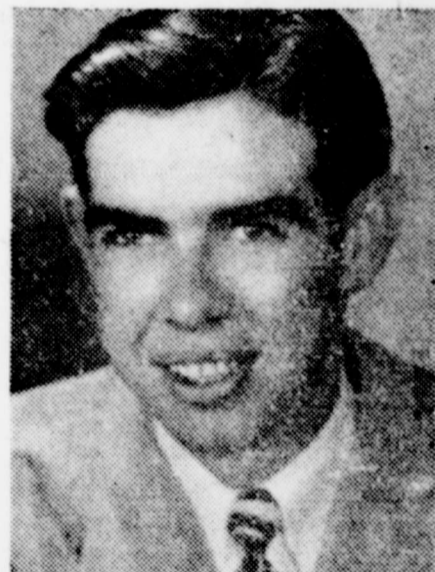

VOTING RIGHTS

Roy Priest, one of Rankin's local attorneys who usually gives a matter a great deal of thought before making pronouncements upon same, says that if we're going to be controlled virtually from the cradle to the grave by decisions of the Supreme Court, then it follows that the people ought to elect the judges just as they do their Senators and other high governing people.

It is Roy's opinion that we are

being governed without any representation—from the South at least. Supreme Court judges are appointed for life by Presidents and no one has any means of compelling them to listen to the voice of the people. Roy points out further that the court over-ruled some 60 or more previous decisions handed down in years past when they decided that schools had to be entegrated—like it or not.

Without answering to anyone, this small group of men (the editor doesn't know how many justices are on the court—do you?) have continued to hand down decisions that have become the iron-clad law of the land at a rapid pace in the last few years. Operating as they have—without regard to past decisions or established practices—what assurance don't we have that some morning we will wake up and find that the Supreme Court has found the Constitution to be unconstitutional.

WHO PAYS WHAT —

Now the figures are in and the mechanical brains have fround out the percentages. The Texas State Tax Study Commission has finished their report on how much it cost you and I to live in Texas in 1956.

To begin with, the Commission finds that state and local taxes have tripled in the past ten years in Texas but that the gain is more than offset by increased income—actually the state and local tax burden is lower in accordance with wages than it was before the war.

This trend has been the same in Texas as it has in a majority of the rest of the states. All in all, it can be said that state and local taxes which include city, school and any special taxing groups such as water districts, have become less of a burden to Texas even though they are higher.

Then we take into the picture the cost of taxes paid to the Federal Government—or—what does it cost Texans to belong to the Union. And hold your hat.

In 1956 Texans paid one-fourth; 25 percent; 25 cents out of every dollar they earned, to taxes. Since we have already seen that the state and local taxes are not a major factor — that leaves Uncle with his hand in our pocket. In fact, he takes almost 70 percent of all the taxes paid by Texans and by taking into consideration the 25 percent angle, we see that one out of every four people in Rankin, Upton County and the State of Texas is working for no other purpose than to pay the taxes that operate our local, state and federal governing bodies.

And who pays the big load? Of the \$2.6 billion paid by Texas into Federal Taxes in 1956, exactly one-half or \$1.3 billion was raised by personal income tax—right out of the old pocket book that you and I try to keep from getting so lean.

In the state and local level which accounted for 30% of all taxes paid it is seen that the average John and Mary Doe—not General Motors or US Steel, had the big burdens through motor fuels tax, vehicle registration fees, cigarette tax, in-

heritance tax, sales tax, etc.

If you are an average Texan, don't think for a minute that you're getting a free ride on the matter of paying your share of governmental expenses. Just remember that one-fourth of your earnings—more than that if you have above average income—goes into a tax vault somewhere.

WHAT'S THE ANSWER

Well, it is that politicians talk each election year about lower taxes with personal income tax being their choicest piece of bait. Already

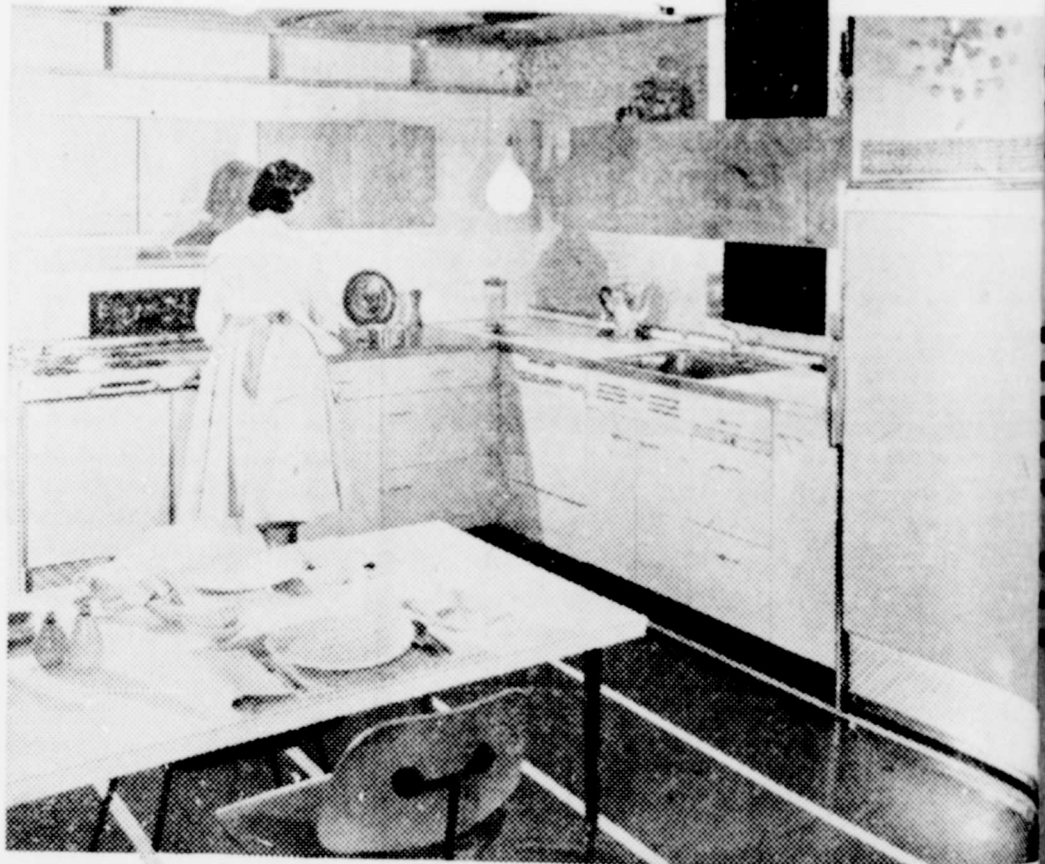
