This ruling, which in itself would seem justified, has now been extended by IRS to refuse deduction of \$23,000 contributed by a gas and electric company to finance an government backed power project.

The Internal Revenue Service has now stepped into the business of censorship. They have knocked one little peg from under the foundation of freedom of speech.

But, on the other hand, the same federal agency has ruled that advertising contributions made to the Foundation for Education on International Economic Relations" are tax deductible. This particular fund is being used to influence U. S. tax payers . . . Rankin Citizens to support foreign aid.

So, if an advertiser gives to a fund for advertising to explain why legislation will be harmful to his business, the contribution may not be deducted for tax purposes. BASIN BOY SCOUTS TO HOLD CAMPOREE

All Scout Troops and Explorer Posts of the permian Basin District, Concho Valley Council, have been invited to participate in a District Camporee at Iraan, Texas on May 2nd-3rd, 1958.

The Camporee is a project of the District Camping and Activities Committee under Chairman Roy B. Shahan of McCamey, Texas.

The Scouts and Explorers will camp at old "Camp Webb" on the Pecos river.

Activities will start with an 8:00 p.m. Campfire Program Friday night, May 2nd.

Competitive Scout skill events will be conducted Saturday morning with each patrol visiting six out of eight activity areas. The activity area will offer such subjects as knot tying, silent signals, trail signs, first aid, signaling, rescue relay, compass course, and fire by flint and steel and water boiling. Units will also be rated on their camping ability.

Competition will be by natural Patrols as far as possible. Scoring will be against a Standard making it possible for any patrol to win a Blue (1st), Red (2nd.), or Yellow (3rd.) ribbon according to their proficiency.
