## Lease Of Three Newspapers Announced By News Publisher

C. C. Carll, publisher and owner of The Rankin News as well as The Crane News, The McCamey News and the Iraan News, has announced that effective June 1, 1958 he will lease three of his weekly newspapers for one year with an

option to buy at the end of that time.

Newspapers which will be effected by the break-up of the former News Publishing Company on June 1 will be The Rankin News, The Crane News and The Iraan News. In all three cases, the present managing editors will take over as publishers and editors of their respective publications.

In The Rankin News, J. B. Hutchens, who has been managing editor

since the latter part of 1953 will lease the firm and plans to take up the buyers option at the end of 12 months. In Crane, A. G. Adair, managing editor of the past 5 years will assume control while T. D. Farris will take over the reigns of the Iraan newspaper.

C. C. Carll will continue to publish The McCamey News and will also hold his present franchises on a number of office machine and equipment items. All four newspapers will continue to operate under their present names.

The Rankin News will be closed from Friday, May 30 until Monday, June 2 for taking inventory and making final settlement of the business change-over. All accounts due and payable to The Rankin News on June 1 may be made either at the office of The McCamey News, Box 818, McCamey or given to the editor at The Rankin News to be forwarded to Mr. Carll.

After June 1 all business transactions with the Rankin News will be due and payable at Box 445, Rankin, Texas, or at The News office at Grand and 10th St.

As of June 1st, we will buy us another bottle of headache pills and assume the duties of both publisher and editor. In addition, we will continue to serve as janitor and general flunkey. In payment for this "promotion" we will receive all the blame for any mistakes, the

burden of paying all the bills and the right to use freely the red ink pen.

Progress in the newspaper business is sometimes a wonderful thing.

For the past five years we have tried to run The Rankin News in a manner that would promote Rankin and the community. We will continue these efforts. During that time in which Mr. C. C. Carll has been the "boss" we have enjoyed unlimited and unhindered freedom to operate the newspaper as we thought best. Never once in the five years has Mr. Carll ever given or even offered unasked-for advice. Any mistakes that have been made in editing The News has been the sole responsibility of the editor.

We have never worked for a more "square shooter" than C. C. Carll and we feel a personal debt of gratitude toward him. Although we sometimes disagree, we have never failed to see two sides of the questions that have come up in our association. We know that he has always wanted to do what was best for the communities in which he owned newspapers.

A weekly newspaper is seldom any better than the support it receives from its home town. In this respect, we can promise no improvements in The News for we could not ask for better home-town support than that which has been extended to us by the people of this community—and most especially the merchants and business houses.

None of us—fortunately—can see into the future but we firmly believe that there are good times ahead for West Texas and for Rankin. This is still "new country" and more progress is bound to come even though we will have—and still are having—a slack time for the present. This is not only true of west Texas but of the entire nation—we will always have more "good times" than bad—the question being whether or not an individual concern can hang on through the slack times until the "rains can come."

In the future, The Rankin News will continue to hold forth for those things which seem to be most desired by the community. We will not, however, stick our necks out for any individual or any group even though we may think they are right in their attitude. We will give them our support whenever they are willing—as groups or individuals—to come out in the open and run with the ball.

We believe that there are changes that ought to be made in our community—both on a political basis and on civic improvements. These we will strive to call to the attention of the public from time to time. Once the attitude of the community is determined on these matters, we will not continue to "stump" for them just because they may happen to be a personal matter with us but will be guided by the decisions

of the citizenship.

We feel that Upton County needs a new county judge. We do not raise the question of whether or not Bud Fisher has made a good county judge but we do maintain that he has lost the confidence of a good many people, particularly in Rankin and can no longer serve all the people as a county official should. We have our personal preference for the post in Norman Elrod but will support the candidate elected by the voters of the county.

We feel that the commissioners court, the hospital board, the school boards and any other similar "government board" ought to better inform the public of what they are doing. They should make a public accounting of the money they spend and explain to the public their reasons for the conduct of their various offices.

All in all, we would sum up our attitude toward The Rankin News and this community by saying that "We've found a home."

#### BUGS, BUGS, BUGS

Do you have millions, billions?—I can't count high enough to get them all!—bugs? We strongly suspected that they were the false chinch bug. We just checked with the entomologist at A & M and sure enough we were right. It's hard to tell how long they'll stay but probably two or three weeks. In the meantime, however, they can destroy all of your flowers, shrubs, and lawn if not controlled.

For control use 5% Chlordane or 5% DDT, or 20 per cent toxaphene. They can be killed with almost any contact spray but five minutes after you've killed a million, another will be on your plants. Use the Chlordane or DDT dust and put a heavy coating over the plants and the ground around them. If they have not yet reached one bed or shrub, dust it and all around to keep them off. They will walk right over a thin coating of the dust, but seem to avoid heavy applications.

They hide out at night and in the heat of the day under planks, straw, anything available and feed in mid morning and later afternoon hours mostly, although you find some at work at any hour. They will not be easy to control and you will need to continue the dusting program until they have gone, but perhaps in the meantime you can save your shrubs and lawn. Luck to you! You'll need it!

#### PERSPIRATION STAINS

Cool dark cottons are popular for summer wear. Many styles are not cut to be worn with dress shields, so perspiration stains and discoloration of dark colored clothing sometimes result.

The fresher the stain, the better your chances for removing it. Pressing a dress that is even slightly stained may set the stain and cause more discoloration. First try washing the stain thoroughly with warm water, rubbing soap or detergent well into the stain. If the fabric has discolored, try sponging with a little vinegar and water for fresh stain. Use ammonia and water for an older one. This may help to restore the color. Rinse thoroughly. Read your tags and save them.

## HENRI CASTRO

Guardian of Man's Right to Self-Rule

Historic and architecturally beautiful Castroville, 20 miles from San Antonio on the Medina River, is an enduring monument to a great and wise man who had unbounded faith in the capacity of intelligent men for self government. And he chose Texas as the country in which to prove his faith. Henri Castro, Parisian banker, scholar and humanist, learned about Texas when he aided the young Republic to obtain a French loan in 1840. What he learned fired his idealism and determination to help his fellow men in independence of thought and action. So, backing his concept of freedom with his own great personal fortune, he contracted to bring a colony from Alsace to settle in the new country. Although war with Mexico made Texas ports unsafe, Castro successfully landed 27 shiploads of Rhenish-French immigrants from 1844 to 1847. In that time he had settled 485 families and

457 single men in the peaceful, pleasant villages of Castroville, Quihi, Vandenburg and D'Hanis. There he expended more than \$200,000 to equip his colonists for a successful agriculture economy, and planned with them for progress in trade and industry.

Today Texans still demand and get their right to choose the way they want to live. In this vigorous and freedom-minded homeland . . . # Summer School Repairs Set

School is out and the work is just beginning—at least for the janitorial staff at Rankin Schools. A large program of work has been scheduled for the summer—all to be done by the janitors—which will get the buildings and grounds ready for another term in September.

Following is the schedule which has been prepared for the summer and is approximately three months work for the staff. A similar program is carried out each year.

### High School Building

Refinish all floors, including auditorium stage. Clean all curtains, blinds and windows. Clean woodwork, walls and desks. Sand all desks which need such repair. Paint metal blinds in rest rooms where needed. Repaint rain circle in front stairs. Repaint and repair ceiling in dressing rooms in auditorium. Maintain grass and shrubs around building. Paint outside doors. Repair and adjust all door stops.

### Junior High School

Refinish all floors, halls and the gym. Repaint halls, four classrooms rest rooms and woodwork where needed. Install rest rooms upstairs in room above present rest rooms. Sand desk which are in need. Clean woodwork, windows, blinds and curtains, walls and desks where needed. Maintain yards. Paint outside screens, sashes and doors. Clean and check all boilers in the system. Build several bulletin boards, cabi-

nets, and shelves in various class rooms.

### Gym And Band Hall

Refinish all floors including playing court. Paint dressing rooms and ramps. Replace cracked windows. Repair shower blinds. Repair shower heads. Repair and clean blinds in band hall. Clean woodwork, windows and furniture. Replace tile in floor where needed. Maintain yards. Replace old back boards with new glass.

### Elementary Building

Refinish all floors including auditorium stage. Clean all blinds and drapes. Maintain yard and add new area of grass across lower end of elementary playground. Fill in dirt along curbs on West side. Sand desks where needed. Clean windows, woodwork, desks and walls. Repair base molding in cafeteria. Build new storage cabinet in cafeteria. Repaint all woodwork in B section including cabinets and book shelves. Repair ceiling in cafeteria. (contractor from out of town) Repair venetian blinds. (from San Angelo)

### Football Field

Maintain grass and keep weeds down. Replace cracked windows. Replace window screens. Repaint both stands. (outside help) Build outside fence with two new ticket booths and entrance gates. (outside help) Other repairs as needed.

### Teacherages

Repaint outside of teacherage across from gym. Repuddy windows on all teacherages on teacher's row and repaint windows.




