County Calls For Bids On Street Paving Work

Another round of street paving is near for Rankin and McCamey.

In an order issued this week, the Upton County Commissioners Court is calling for bids on surfacing of county roads in the vicinity of Rankin and McCamey. These roads include a number of streets within the two towns.

Bids are to be addressed to the Commissioners Court of Upton County and are to be opened and read in the court's room on Mon-

day, July 14 at 2:00 p.m. All bids must be accompanied by a cashier's check or bid bond in specified amounts to insure that the bidder will enter into contract with Upton County within 10 days after being

notified that he is the successful bidder. Actual paving work is expected to get under way in the latter part of July.

RANKIN WORK

In Rankin, bids are being asked on construction of approximately 56,000 square yards of double surface and 7,400 square yards of single surface asphalt treatment. This will include work on several streets in the southwest part of Rankin, on Grand Street from the highway to 12th Street and the road running on the South side of the Santa Fe railroad as well as additional minor areas.

McCAMEY WORK

In the McCamey area, no specified amount of work is set forth in the bid call but it is reported to be approximately the same as that which will be done in Rankin. It has also been reported that the City of McCamey will participate in a limited amount of paving of their own. The successful bidder in past years has performed the paving in both towns and usually starts in whichever has their streets in the better condition for topping.

ENGINEERS CHANGED

This year, in McCamey, a new engineering firm is handling the work in Precincts 3 and 4. Edwin S. Martin, Jr. of Odessa has prepared the specifications and done the surveying on their portion of the project. In Rankin, W. W. Greif and Associates of Snyder is still employed. In the past this firm has handled a majority of the county road engineering.

COUNTY JURY FREES DWI SUSPECT

"Not Guilty" was the verdict returned Tuesday by an Upton County jury composed of two women and four men in a case in which Dan Hartness, formerly of Big Lake and now living in New Mexico, was charged with driving while intoxicated. Hartness was picked up by highway patrolmen in Rankin on October 20, 1957, following a high-speed chase down Highway 67. Patrolmen involved in the case had testified that the suspect was driving his car at a very high rate of speed and that he was, in their opinion, under the influence of alcohol. A quart bottle of whisky was taken from the possession of Hartness and used in the trial as evidence. Only a small portion of liquor was in the bottle at the time of the arrest.

Members of the jury were Mrs. J. T. James and Lawrence Holcomb of Rankin and Tomie Baldwin, Boudine Brazelton, C. E. Anderson, Jr and Lovie Burnett, all of McCamey. Anderson was foreman of the jury.

Several more DWI trials were set for trial in county court during the remainder of the week.

DIDN'T WORK

We note in last week's Big Lake newspaper where the city commission has voted to restore taxes within the City of Big Lake. It was just a little more than a year ago that the same commission voted to do away with city taxes all together.

It just won't work. You can't operate a city—or anything else—without money. It is almost certain that the city dads in Big Lake did everything possible to keep from re-assessing a city tax but they just couldn't make a go of it on money taken in on city utilities.

This ought to be a lesson to us who sometimes go off into a spin, forgetting the cold facts of dollars and cents and two plus two, and looking forward to the day when Rankin will not have a city tax. There is every indication that that day will never come. And, few that we know of ever expected it or even work toward such a thing.

Most folks realize that taxes are necessary—they always have been wherever people are under an organized government. About the only thing that the average citizen wants is for his money to be spent wisely and for unnecessary waste to be eliminated.

HALF DONE

Last week everyone got a chance to witness one of the rarest of things—a tax was repealed by the U. S. Congress! It will likely be many a day before such a thing takes place again.

But, as usual, it looks like they did the thing only half-way. In knocking out the tax on certain types of freight and passenger fares, Congress repealed a thing that was tagged on everybody during the war and has hung on every since. They also knocked a very large hole in Uncle's pocketbook. And heres where they failed to finish cutting the mellow. They made no provisions for eliminating an equal amount of spending on the part of the government. No foreign aid was cut, no handouts withdrawn. That's not good business.

We all say that we want less

spending. We, however, say it in a small, quiet, voice. A report released last week shows that the largest amount of mail received by Congress this year was in protest—not of high taxes, government spending, foreign aid, Communists, or getting the government out of private business—but the largest protest was received in more humane slaughtering laws in packing houses. That's a dandy if we ever heard one.

We doubt that anyone in Rankin took the time to write their congressman about the slaughtering laws but on the other hand, we doubt that the congressman received three letters from Rankin about anything else.

We ought to speak up about the things we like or dislike.

HENRY GONZALEZ

Henry Gonzalez, the first Mexican as far as we know to ever run for the governor of Texas, appears to be an honest and sincere man. We doubt that he would do much for the state as governor. However, there is a group in the state who are strong supporters of Federal control and who are making a most active campaign in support of Senor Gonzales.

Among the plans that they are putting forth as to why he should be elected is that he would be a wonderful influence in making friends for the U. S. among the Latin-American nations. That sounds like the old idea of: "If you can't lick 'em—join 'em." We don't believe Texans have ever had any such ideas. Rather, it has in

the past been the attitude of most Texans to mind their own business and to let the other fellow do likewise.

We can just see Henry Gonzales as governor of Texas making the rounds that Nixon made last spring. He would whip out a mike, sing the "Purple Pickle Eater" in Spanish and immediately have all the audiences swooning. And that would be old Texas to the rescue of Uncle Sam once again.

There's a chance for glory here.

during the past two years only the first and second grade pupils attended the school. Pupils in the other elementary grades were being transported to Big Lake.

Texon was included in the county wide school system in 1925 when the Reagan County Independent School District was created by a special act of the Texas Legislature. For a number of years, the first seven grades were taught at Texon, and as facilities were improved in Big Lake the upper grades were transported here to the schools. High school students from Texon had been transported to Big Lake from the first.

In the early days of the county

wide independent district other elementary schools in the county were Stiles, Best and Santa Rita, all 3 having been discontinued since then. Stiles, the oldest school in the county, at one time taught all grades through the tenth.

Mrs. L. B. Benielle, sole teacher at Texon for the past two years, has resigned from the county system after teaching at Texon continuously since 1945. As the former Miss Norine Maxey, she had taught in the school for a number of years before her marriage. Mr. Benielle, an employee of Plymouth Oil Co., and his wife live at Benedum Field.

Sealed proposals addressed to the Honorable Judge and Commissioner's Court of Upton County, Texas, will be received at the office of the County Judge at the County Court House until 2:00 P.M., July 14, 1958, for furnishing all necessary materials, machinery, equipment, superintendence, and labor for re-shaping and surfacing with double asphalt penetration surface, certain County roads and streets in McCamey and vicinity, all in Upton County, Texas.

Bidders must submit cashier's or certified checks issued by a bank satisfactory to the County of Upton, or bidder's bonds, payable without recourse to the order of Upton County in the amount not less than 5% of the largest possible bid submitted as a guaranty that bidder will enter into contract and execute bond and guaranty in the forms provided within ten (10) days after notice of award of contract to him. Bids without required check will not be considered.

The successful bidder must furnish performance bond in the amount of one hundred (100%) per cent of the total contract price from a surety company holding a permit from the State of Texas to act as surety, or other surety or sureties acceptable to the County of Upton.

All lump sum and unit prices must be stated in both script and figures on the forms provided. The County of Upton reserves the right to reject any or all bids and to waive formalities. In case of ambiguity or lack of clearness in stating prices in the bids, the County of Upton reserves the right to consider the most advantageous construction thereof, or to reject the bid. Unreasonable (or "unbalanced") unit prices will authorize the County of Upton to reject any bid.

Bidders are expected to inspect the site of work and to inform themselves regarding all local conditions.
