## Bill Hood And Cook Named New Principal Posts

Members who have been members of the Rankin Independent School Board for a number of years moved up this week by the School Board to fill the posts vacated by the resignation of the school principal, H.

Bill Hood, who has served as junior high principal for 1 year, replacing Jack Skiles. Prior to that time, Hood had been a high school English instructor for 4 years in the local organization. He came to Rankin from Sterling City.

Taking over the duties as junior high principal is Bill Cook, former head basketball coach, assistant football coach and science teacher in junior high. Cook came to Rankin from the Army 6 years ago.

Prior to the time he spent in the service, he was head basketball coach at Iowa Park in Wichita Falls. His first two years as head coach in Rankin saw his basketball teams go all the way to state.

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### NEW COACH NEEDED

Supt. Joe Scrivner said this week that the Rankin Schools are now looking for a new coach to take over duties as boy's basketball coach, assist in football and teach Junior High Science.

All interested parties should contact Mr. Scrivner at the Rankin High School.

## Upton Voters To Ballot On Three Contests Saturday

Saturday, August 23, Upton County voters will go to the polls and cast their ballots in the Second Democratic Primary Election.

Polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. with polling places and election officials being the same as those used in the July Primary. Three contests will be printed on the ballots.

For Supreme Court Justice, Place 1, Edwin L. Smith, leader of the July voting, is in a run-off with Robert W. Hamilton. For State Representative in the 102nd district,

Andy Anderson front-runner in July is being contested by Brown Bailey.

### Monday Services Held For Lou Ann Carl

Funeral services were held for Lou Ann Carl at the First Methodist Church last Monday at 10:00 a.m., with the Rev. Arthur Kendall, pastor, officiating.

The four-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Carl passed away last Saturday, August 16, in Baylor Hospital, Dallas, where she had been seriously ill for over two months.

Carl is owner and publisher of The McCamey News, and also owns newspapers in Iraan, Rankin and Crane.

Lou Ann was born May 28, 1954 in McCamey.

Survivors are the parents; a sister, Patricia Jane; and a grandmother, Mrs. J. O. Carl of McCamey.

Interment was in the McCamey Cemetery. Moore Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Of top interest to County voters is the third contest, that of County Judge. There, Bud Fisher, leader in the July vote, is opposed by Norman Elrod. Fisher will have served 12 years at the end of his present term and is asking for another four-year term. Elrod is seeking his first county office.

### CLOSE RACES

Most political observers have stated that they expect all three races to be close. In the July Primary, none of the three leaders had an outstanding margin of votes. Anderson and Bailey are expected to run "neck and neck" while the number of voters who go to the polls is expected to decide the County Judge's race.

### ABSENTEE VOTING

Absentee voting for the Saturday election has been considerably heavier than was expected with 152 ballots either having been cast or mailed out by the County Clerk's Office as of Wednesday morning, August 20. Deadline for absentee voting passed at midnight, August 19; however, any ballots received before election day and postmarked before the deadline will be counted.

In the July Primary, 169 absentee ballots were cast and 1415 total for the county. A vote of about the same figure is expected Saturday.

### High School Students To Register 27 & 28

Bill Hood, principal of Rankin High School, has asked that all Freshmen and Sophomore students who will attend Rankin High School to be on hand Wednesday, August 27 to register.

Junior and Senior students will register for the forth-coming term on Thursday, August 28. All students will be registered at the high school between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m. and 1:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m.

In Junior High, principal Bill Cook stated that only Junior High students who will be entering Rankin school system for the first time need register. They may register either of the two days at the junior high building.

Cook has emphasized that only students who are enrolling in Rankin schools for the first time need attend these registrations.

Mrs. Moore visited with him Sunday, and says he is recovering satisfactorily.

### VOTE TIME AGAIN

Saturday, Upton County voters will go to the polls and help settle three run-off races. While some counties are reported to have little interest in the Second Primary—and at least four are not even holding elections—Upton County is seeing two contests that are drawing a great deal of interest.

In the 102 Representative race, Andy Anderson is making an effort to avoid being unseated by Brown Bailey. The issues in this particular race boil down to whether or not a state representative ought to be the sole judge of what legislation he will introduce into the Legislature or whether or not he should introduce all measures called for by his people in the district and then let the entire law-making body decide the matter on its merits.

Anderson has stated that he will not introduce measures which he does not think are just and has called those who propose such bills—i.e. Permian County issue—dreamers. Bailey says that the American way is built by those who had dreams of greater things and

that he will introduce all measures brought to him by the people of the district and then let the Legislature decide what action should be taken.

Drawing the lion's share of interest in the county is the Judge's race where Bud Fisher is asking that his stay in office be continued to 16 years. Opposing him in hard working effort is Norman Elrod. Fisher states that he is seeking re-election on his record which appear to be of a very conservative nature while Elrod is basing his race on the need for a change in the office with the county Judge taking a more active part in all phases of county activities such as civic organizations, school affairs, youth programs, etc.

On the state-wide vote, two men are seeking the Supreme Court seat in place 1. J. Edwin Smith has the support of the radical liberal group and the labor movement while Robert Hamilton of Midland County is terming himself a middle-of-the-roader. Hamilton is expected to draw heavy support in West and North Texas while the Houston and Gulf Coast areas are said to be for Smith.

### CAST YOUR VOTE

One debt that every eligible citizen owes himself and his neighbors is to go to the polls Saturday and vote. Don't let your friends down—be there early and encourage someone else to go.

If each of us would talk to two other people Saturday and encourage them to vote, the balloting would more nearly reflect the desires of the majority rather than a minority which could easily be the case if a light vote is cast.

Please make the effort to go to the polls and talk to at least two other voters about going to vote. Your help is needed badly.

## What About Permian County

During this campaign for the office of State Representative, much to-do has been made of the creation of a new County out of part of Pecos and Crockett Counties. It has been said that simple honesty and integrity would not allow the present State Representative to introduce such a bill.

Brown Bailey does not feel that the main issue is whether or not a new County is to be created, but rather one of pure and simple representation of the people of the district. He feels that this same issue could have arisen over any other measure that might have been supported by a community or city which does not comprise a majority of the people of the district.

Brown Bailey feels that if a particular bill is supported by the people of an area, and such bill has merit both for and against it, then the measure should be introduced in the Legislature for the entire Legislature's consideration, and not be denied by one man who calls himself a representative of an entire district.

Brown Bailey will introduce the Permian County bill into the Legislature so that both its merits and demerits may be considered and passed upon by our state's law-making bodies.

#### IS THE BEGINNER READY FOR SCHOOL?

Starting school is a big event in every child's life. It will be a happy one if the youngster is physically, mentally and emotionally ready for it.

Practical tests to show readiness are suggested by the White House conference on child health and pro-

tection. Physically he needs to be independent and well-trained. He will need to be able to dress and undress himself, take care of toilet needs and eat well without assistance. The better able to use his hands and feet well, the more at ease he will be.

Intellectually, he should talk readily, understand and carry out the simple directions, and show a healthy curiosity. Be sure he knows his name and address and will repeat it to others if necessary.

Emotional adjustment is difficult for a child who is still very dependent on others, shows marked fears temper outbursts or moodiness. He will be happier if he has learned to play with other children, respect their possessions, and is responsible for his own belongings.

Arrange for a health check up and check safety training. If he

looks forward to school as a happy experience, and has learned to stay contentedly in another home or school for limited periods, he is ready to go.

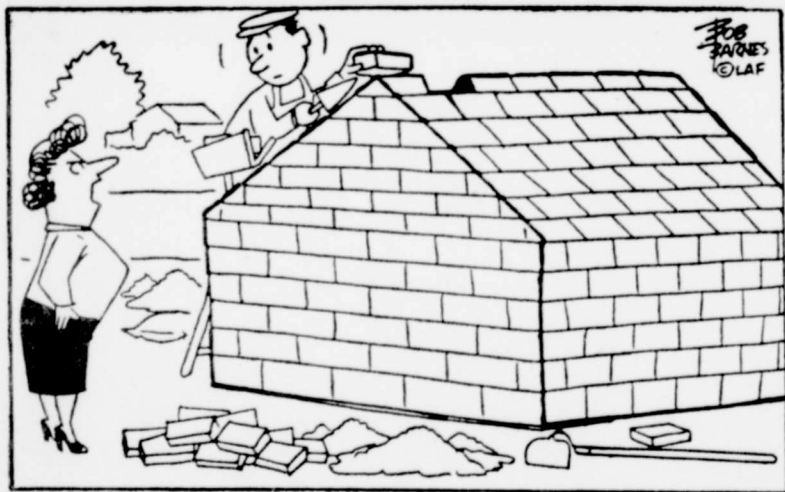
