## Spookeroo, Football Game Will Highlight Homecoming

Hallowe'en spooks, a parade, a carnival, a coronation, a barbecue, another parade, a football game and a homecoming dance are all on tap for the week-end as Rankin prepares to welcome ex-students and visitors in the annual homecoming week activities.

Officially opening the two-day affair will be the Hallowe'en Parade Tuesday afternoon at 5:15. This will include floats, a whole town full of spooks and goblins in all sizes and shapes and the Rankin Red Devil Band. The parade is to form at the elementary school grounds and will march through town.

Immediately following the parade, the school carnival will open at the Park Building. Scheduled to run from 5:45 to 8:00 p.m., it will feature all sorts of attractions and is open to the public free of charge.

Beginning at 8:15 p.m., the coronation of the Hallowe'en queen will be held at the high school auditorium. Admission to this event will be 50c for adults and 25c for the children. Theme of this year's coronation is "Mother Goose Land."

Football boys are to be in bed by 9:30 in preparation for Friday's Homecoming Game with Van Horn.

Friday will be the official homecoming day with the Freshmen of Rankin High School to begin beating the war drum at 8:45 a.m. and continuing until football time. At

2:05 in the gym, a giant pep rally will be held with the public and ex-students urged to attend.

Beginning at 5:00 and serving until 7:00 in the elementary cafeteria, the Seniors will hold the homecoming barbecue. Tickets will be on sale at the door.

At 7:00, another parade will form at the high school gym and will include the band, the pep squad, and numerous other entries. It will go through town and out to the football field where the game between Rankin and Van Horn will get under way at 7:30.

Following the game, a homecoming dance will be held at the Park Building and will be open to students, ex-students and their invited guests. The homecoming queen, Miss Frankie Jean Clay, will be crowned at the half-time in the football game and will be the guest of honor at the dance.

### WRITE-IN CONTEST DEVELOPS FOR JP

In Precinct Two, a last-minute write in contest is developing in the race for Justice of the Peace where Democratic candidate W. J. "Curley" Cowen is being opposed by Mrs. Murray McCain, seeking the office on a write-in. Cowen defeated Charlie Campbell in July for the Democratic nomination.

Mrs. McCain, who previously held the JP office for four years from 1950 through 1954 when she was defeated by Cowen, said this week that she was making the race "because I now have 4 children that I must support by myself and feel that this is a job for which I am qualified."

Mrs. McCain is a widow whose husband, Murray, died a short time ago.

Cowen, who has filled the office for four years, has been a resident of Rankin for 22 years. He is a disabled war veteran and the father of three boys, two in school. "I have always tried to do a fair and honest job in this office," Cowen has said, "and I would like to continue serving the people of the precinct. As the Democratic nominee receiving the majority of the votes in July, I will greatly appreciate the continued vote and support of the citizens of Precinct Two," he stated.

### Rankin vs. Van Horn At 7:30 P. M. Friday

Following their 37-0 trouncing of the Coahoma Bulldogs last week, the Rankin Red Devils go into district play here Friday night at 7:30 against the always tough Van Horn Eagles. This will be the first round of conference activity for District 5-B with the other two members, Wink and Grandfalls having a go in Wink.

Bad weather which has kept the Red Devils off the practice field most of the week, is expected to play an important part in a contest that most fans predict will go to the team getting the breaks. Pitted will be Van Horn's hard-hitting offensive unit against a somewhat heavier and stouter Rankin squad. Fans will also see two of the top scoring aces of the Permian Basin in action in the Eagles' James Garkick and Rankin's Wayne Windham. Both boys have marked up 74 points thus far in the season and are in second place for total number scored.

The Eagles run a very tight regulation tee formation and make good use of their speedy backfield men. They also are good at the passing attack and have upset some highly regarded teams in earlier play.

Rankin's Red Devils are said to be in good shape for the game with the exception of a few colds and the fact that they have not seen much practice this week.

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### AMENDMENTS—

Next Tuesday, we, the people, are supposed to go to the polls and vote on — among other things — nine proposed constitutional amendments to the State Constitution. Needless to say, every eligible voter ought to go to the polls Tuesday and cast a ballot. These amendments are important to each and every one of us since they propose—in part—to spend a great amount of mine and your money.

We have little doubt but that they will all be approved. But they ought not be.

For what it is worth and in order to give a few folks an opportunity to cuss the editor, we set forth our opinions on these nine amendments.

No. 1: Proposes among other things to pay the Legislators some \$7500 per year, have them meet each year instead of each two years and to give them an unlimited expense account. It is argued that this will make for better state government and that better men will run for the offices. We say no. We don't believe that you can buy honesty in a man. We do favor paying our Legislators what they are worth and we are not now doing this but \$7500 a year for some three months work—plus the unlimited expense account—is too much at this time. Better to re-write the bill and make it a little more reasonable.

No. 2: Proposes to set up a law whereby each county may vote on whether or not they want to establish a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering people who work for the county. This one is all right since it leaves the final matter up to the people of the county who will be paying the bill if they decide to call the election and put the plan into action.

No. 3: proposes that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next general election. We will buy that but don't see why it is limited to only those two offices.

No. 4: Proposes a law whereby County and Precinct officials have to resign from their office before seeking election for a different office if there remains more than one year of the term to the office to which he is serving. Yes again but we fail to see why it was also limited to just certain offices and the time limit.

No. 5: Proposes a law whereby certain cities may elect their officials for four years. We vote yes on this one also since it too, leaves the final settlement up to the affected citizens.

No. 6: Proposes a pension to Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the present state retirement plan. Yes again since it is only fair to give those the same privileges as present Rangers now get.

No. 7: Proposes a law to authorize the spending of a lot of money for advertising the state of Texas in an effort to attract more business and tourists to the state. We say no. This thing would be used by only certain parts of the state such as the big city areas and we doubt that more businesses in the state would benefit a lot of little people such as farmers and ranchers. We are all for more business, personally but it is not the job of every citizen to have to pay for the ad-

vertising to attract it to the state. Let those who stand to benefit the most pay the bill As for tourists—there again, only a limited number of people benefit from their being in the state and that group ought to pay for their own advertising.

No. 8: Proposes state aid to a certain group of old age assistant people, blind, dependent children and disabled persons. This is another step in the ever increasing circle of "cradle to the grave" assistance and is also a form of socialized medicine. We have said before and say again that such things are here to stay and since it is for a group who can use the help, we will vote for it but not because we like it in particular.

No. 9: Proposes a special law for the benefit of three or four counties in the state so that they can set up a co-owned hospital. Evidently the affected citizens favor the bill so we will go along with them on it and vote yes.

In any case, go to the polls and vote Tuesday. Yours just might be the vote that would make the difference one way or another.

**NOVEMBER 1-20 FOR  
OVERSEAS MAILING**

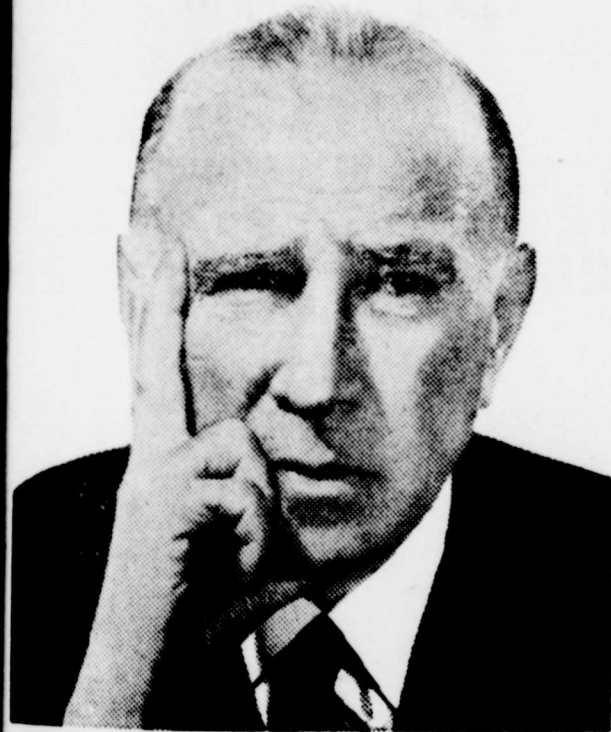
November 1-20 has been designat-  
ed for mailing Christmas parcels,  
cards and letters to members of  
the armed forces overseas. "Armed  
Forces Overseas" includes person-  
nel of the Armed Forces, members  
of their families and authorized  
United States civilians employed at  
overseas posts who receive their  
mail through an APO number.

Persons planning to send Christ-  
mas gifts in addition to cards and  
letters should check at the post  
office regarding size and weight  
limitations and best methods of  
packing gifts for overseas delivery.  
Proper packaging to prevent break-  
age, rattling or loosening of arti-  
cles within the parcel is very im-  
portant.

A slip showing a list of contents  
and addressee should be enclosed  
in each box or package and to cer-  
tain APO's and NPO's a customs  
declaration of Form 2966 or 2976-A  
must be completed by the sender.

Another reason for checking at  
the post office before sending pack-  
ages is that some articles are pro-  
hibited to be sent overseas. Pro-  
hibited articles include matches,  
lighter fluid, cigarettes, other tob-  
acco products and coffee.

Christmas cards and letters go-  
ing by air mail should be sent be-  
tween December 1-10.

## Cong. J. T. Rutherford Is Rankin Visitor

Cong. J. T. Rutherford visited in Rankin briefly Monday, while enroute to a West Texas flood control meeting in Marfa which was held

Tuesday.

The Congressman met with the Upton County Commissioners' court and personally invited the members to the flood control meeting. It is being held for the purpose of formulating long-range water and soil conservation goals for the West Texas area.

Rutherford said his visit was a continuation of his practice of visiting all of the 19 counties he represents during the Congressional recess periods. During the 85th Congress, which adjourned in August, Rutherford was one of only twenty-two of the 435-man Congress who had 100 per cent voting-attendance records.

The Congressman, who was unopposed for re-election this year, has been in Washington during the past few weeks attending special sessions on the House Interior Committee, and also received briefings on the Formosa crisis in executive sessions with the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

He expects to report in mid-November for a brief period of active

duty with the U. S. Marine Corps, and then will return to West Texas briefly before preparing for the convening of the 86th Congress in January.

### ASKS FOR LETTERS

Rutherford asked that all Rankin area residents write him at any time to give him their opinions on national matters.

"Only by knowing the thinking of the people can I give West Texas the type of representation it truly wants," he said.

The Congressman called the 85th Congress "a Congress of crises" and said problems included a record-high peacetime budget of \$71.8 billion, the Middle East war scare, launching of Sputnik I by Russia, the economic recession which hit a peak last spring, and the Formosa area crisis.

Prior to being in Rankin Monday, Rutherford was in Ozona and Big Lake. From Rankin, he visited in Iraan, McCamey and Alpine before calling it a day.

## Louis Anderson Asks For Approval Of Nine Amendments Nov. 4

A proposed amendment providing for annual sessions of the Texas Legislature "should result in a more efficient and economical government," State Representative Louis (Andy) Anderson asserted this week.

The opinion came in an analysis of the nine proposed constitutional amendments which will be submitted to Texas voters in the November 4 general election.

Rep. Anderson, whose home is in Midland, has served two terms as representative in the House from the 102nd District, comprised of Midland, Upton, Crane and Pecos Counties, and is seeking a third term. He is opposed by Republican Tom Devine, also of Midland.

"I voted in favor of submitting each of these proposals to the voters," said Anderson, "because it always has been my policy to submit such questions, if I think they have merit, to the people to decide."

He pointed out that since the Texas Constitution was adopted in 1876, 220 amendments have been presented to the voters and 133 have been accepted.

Rene Robert Cavalier, Sieur de la Salle

First Freedom Fighter in the Great Southwest

Whatever the motive of France in sending Rene Robert Cavalier, Sieur de la Salle, down the Mississippi River from Canada in 1678, the adventurous Frenchman himself was seeking freedom and a new life. From the mouth of the river he returned not to Quebec, as ordered, but to France... for permission, money and colonists to establish a colony in the newly explored region. His fleet of four ships neared the mouth of the Mississippi's main channel on December 19, 1684... but La Salle changed his course. He landed on the coast of Texas, near Matagorda Bay. There, in February, 1685, he established Fort St. Louis as a base for further explorations.

The settlement failed and La Salle himself was murdered by some of his own men in 1687. But he had influenced significantly the history of Texas. His colony gave France a basis

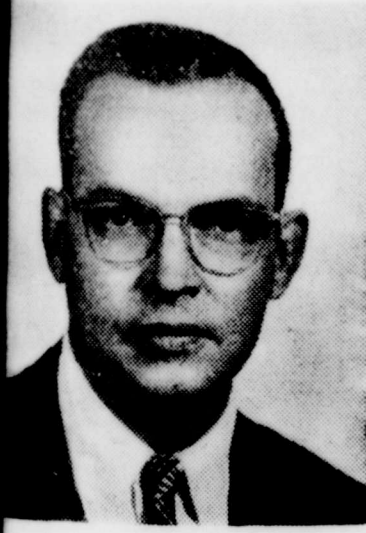
for claiming the area and impelled the Spanish to hasten their expansion north from Mexico. The mission of San Francisco de los Tejas was established in 1690 as a barrier to French designs... and the territory of Tejas became freedom's battleground.

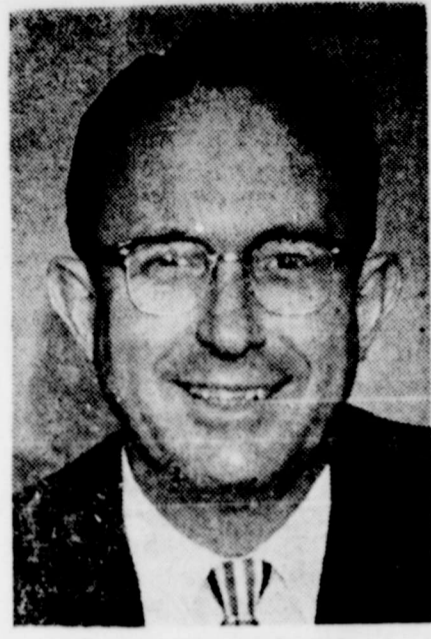

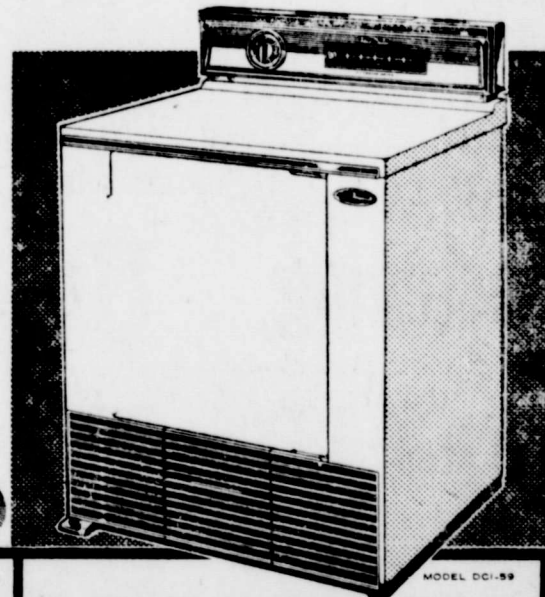

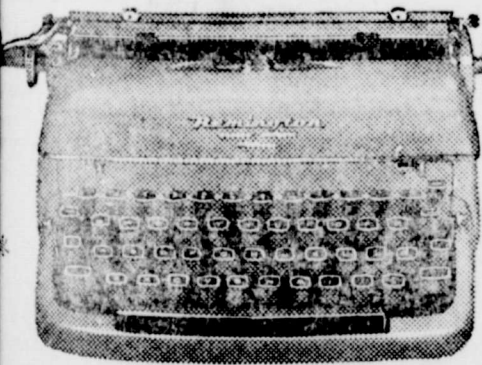
