Con．J．T．Rutherford visited in Rankin briefly Monday，while en－ route to a West Texas flood control meeting in Marfa which was held

Tuesday．
The Congressman met with the Upton County Commissioners＇court and personally invited the members being held for the purpose of for－ being held for the purpose of for－
mulating long－range water and soil mulating long－range water and soil conservation goals for the west Texas area．
Rutherford said his visit was a continuation of his practice of visit－ ing all of the 19 counties he re－ presents during the Congressional recess periods．During the 85th Con－ gress，which adjourned in August， Rutherford was one of only twenty－ two of the $435-\mathrm{man}$ Congress who had 100 per cent voting－attendance records．
The Congressman，who was un－ opposed for re－election this year， has been in Washington during the past few weeks attending special sessions on the House Interior Com－ mittee，and also received briefings on the Formosa crisis in executive sessions with the House Foreign Af－ fairs Committee．
He expects to report in mid－No－
vember for a brief period of active
duty with the U．S．Marine Corps
and then will return to West Tex－ as briefly before preparing for the convening of the 86th Congress in January．

## ASKS FOR LETTERS

A proposed amendment provid－ ing for annual sessions of the Tex as Legislature＂should result in a more efficient and economical gov－ ernment，＂State Representative Lo－ uis（Andy）Anderson asserted this week．
The opinion came in an analysis of the nine proposed constitutiona amendments which will be submit－ ted to Texas voters in the Novem－ ber 4 general election．
Rep．Anderson，whose home is in Midland，has served two terms as representative in the House from Midland，Upton，Cramprised of Counties，and is seeking a third term．He is opposed by Republican term．He is opposed by Republ

## Ne Need A New Man In Austin

The issues in the State Representative race are simple.

People used to say "Always Vote Democrat, no matter who's on the ticket," or "He may not be an outstanding candidate, but he's our candidate."

The age old argument of an incumbent has always been that he offers age, ability, experience, wisdom, integrity, courage and connections.

In this day and age, party label is not sufficient. We question the value of our present State Representative's age and experience. We challenge his wisdom, his ability and his record because:
the last legislature, he voted against putting teeth in the Code Ethics Bill (House Bill 3).
meet a state operating deficit, he voied to raid the Permanent thool fund of $\$ 12$ million dollars instead of facing the issue of onomy or more taxes squarely. (HB 103).

He voted to require oldsters in all parts of the state to get new exemption certificates every year if they want to continue voting. (HB 107).

When he has made efforts to be constructive, he has not been able to obtain the legislation we need. Typical is the fact that he has failed twice to get redistricting for one of our counties, Midland, where $98 \%$ of the people have only one vote on the Commissioners Court.

One of the reasons is that a Representative can become overcommitted to other legislators. In the current contest for Speaker of the House, for example, our present State Representative has supported both candidates!

When a legislator is overcommitted, he has no prestige or influence. He can be no man of action. He has no bargaining power. He cannot get support for legislation we need.

Now what we need is a new Representative, one whose only commitments are to us in the 102 nd District. We need a man with real bargaining power.
