When they left last week for their first showing in the Chicago International Livestock Show, we felt that they would make history for Texas 4-H clubs and although they did not do anything spectacular, we figure they more than justified the trip.

Day says that they learned a lot from the show and is rather confident that—should they ever decide to go back—they would know better how to go about winning some top

honors. As it was, they will have to settle with a fifth place as the highest they were able to capture. When you consider that they were beaten by such groups as the University of Kentucky, Perdue University and Ohio State, you can see that they made a mighty fine showing against top competition.

At that, they were the highest of any junior team and took top place for any group of feeders. The big universities feed their lambs all in one pen from the time they are lambs—all under the watchful eye of one person while the Upton 4-H Club's lambs are fed by a number of different boys under different conditions in separate pens. Judges of the big show said that the Upton lambs were the best they had ever seen to have been raised in such a manner.

We have an idea that they will be going back and when they do, there's going to be a fine project open to some local organization—that of erecting signs on the outskirts of Rankin reading: "Rankin, The Home of the Internationally Famous Upton County 4-H Club." Better keep the paint handy.

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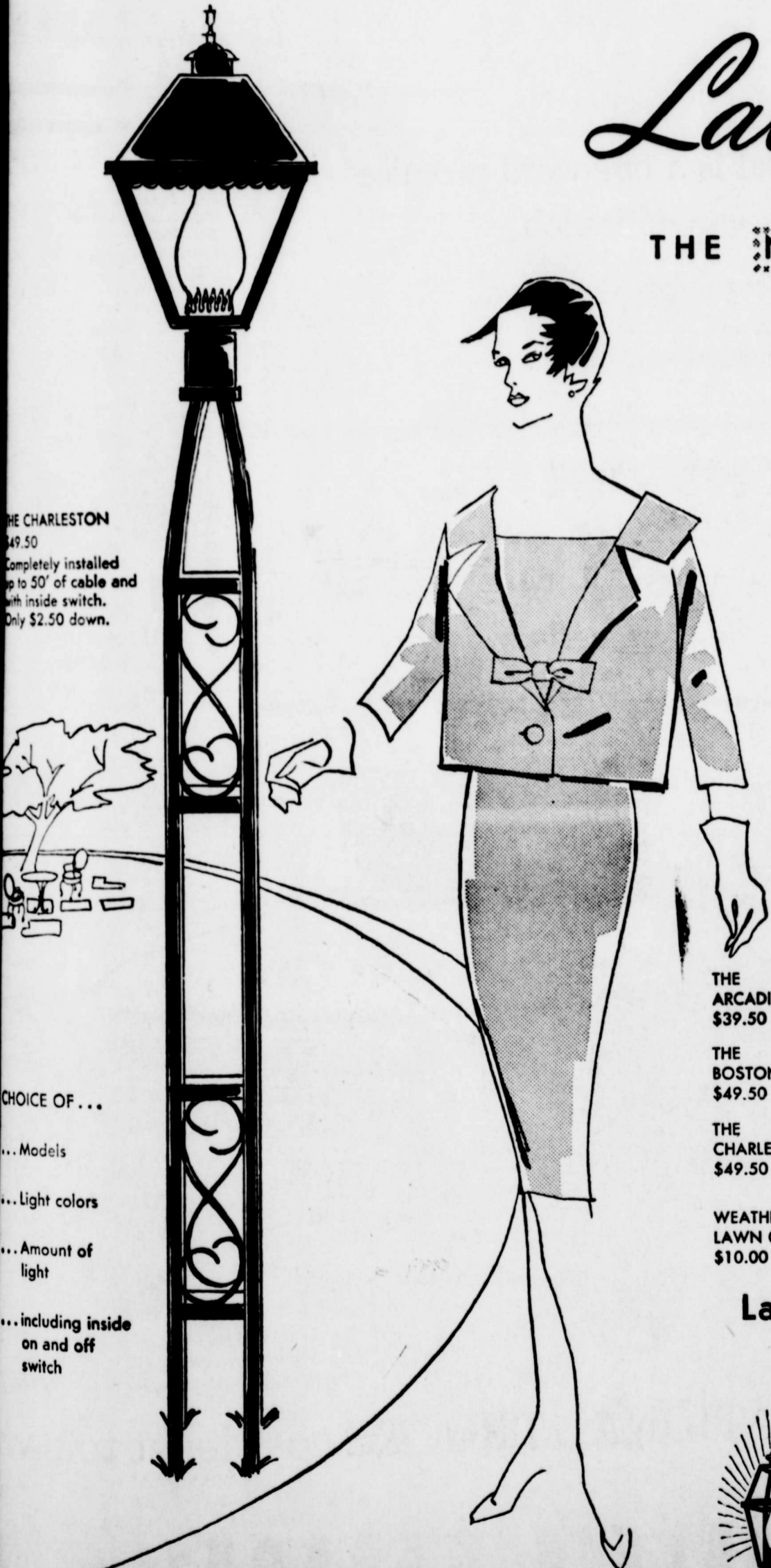

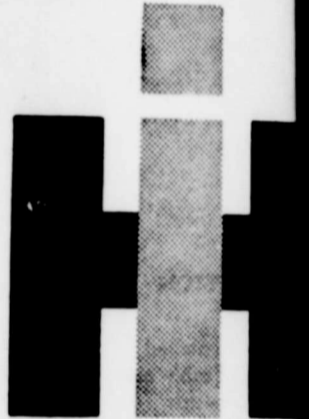
