Eight Area Team Open Play Friday In Rankin Tournament

Beginning at 2:30 p.m. Friday afternoon, eight top basketball teams from this area will begin play in the Rankin Tournament.

Teams represented are Rankin, McCamey, Grandfalls, Fort Stock-

ton, Ozona, Iraan, Crane and Imperial. These eight schools have produced some of the top teams in West Texas over the past years and play is expected to be fast and hard this year as it has been in the past.

McCamey's Badgers are defending champion, having won the last two years. However, it is believed that this year, there will be a closely contested battle for top honors since none of the teams appear to be outstanding at this time.

Crane, Fort Stockton and Ozona are generally considered strong and host team Rankin is considered the darkhorse.

LOCAL FANS URGED TO ATTEND

In commenting on the tournament, Supt. Joe Scrivner stated

that he would like to urge all fans to attend the sessions.

"Some of the best basketball to be seen in West Texas will unfold here Friday and Saturday," he said.

Scrivner also explained that due to the expense involved in having a big tournament such as this, all those attending will be charged admission fees except the boys who suit out, coaches, school officials and those people who are working with the tournament.

Admission will be 25c and 50c for all the sessions except the finals. They will be 35c for students and 75c for adults.

SCHEDULE

Friday's schedule calls for Ozona and Grandfalls to open the action at 2:30. They will be followed at 4 o'clock by Crane and McCamey. At 7:00 p.m. Fort Stockton will play Imperial and at 8:20, Rankin will meet the Iraan Braves.

Saturday, play will start at 9:10 a.m. and continue throughout the day with games starting at 10:30 a.m., 12:45 p.m., 2:05 p.m., and 6:00 p.m.

Finals which will determine the champion, will begin play at 9:00 p.m. Saturday night.

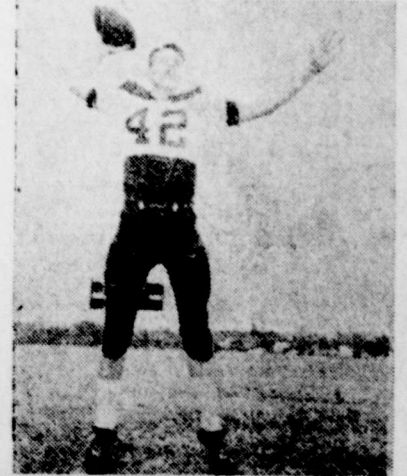

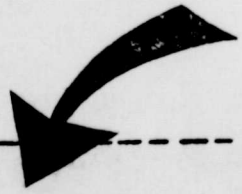

IT'S FRUIT CAKE TIME

There is still time to make fruit cakes. The confection type of fruit cake does not need to ripen as long as the better variety. An example of this type of fruit cake is given below:

Magic Fruit Cake (Confection type)

- 1 pound candied cherries
- 1 pound candied pineapple
- 1 pound pitted dates
- 4 cups pecans
- 1 can sweetened condensed milk
- 1 4-oz. package dry coconut

Cup up fruit, cherries, pineapple and dates and chop pecans coarsely. Add to milk and coconut. Mix thoroughly with hands. Pack down into loaf pans, stem cake pan or small molds, which have been greased and lined with greased foil or waxed paper. Bake loaf-sized cake at 300 degrees F. for 1 hour. Bake cake in stem cake pan 1½ hours. Bake small molds 45 minutes. Remove paper when taken from oven.

RIPENING AND FREEZING FRUIT CAKES

Batter type fruit cakes are at their best after 3 or 4 weeks of aging or ripening. This storage period develops flavor and mellowness. For this reason, fruit cakes should

be allowed to ripen before they are frozen.

Proper cooling and wrapping is important. Fruit cakes should be cooled thoroughly before wrapping for storage or ripening. Use aluminum foil, pilofilm, cellophane or waxed paper. Place cake in a cool place for 3 or 4 weeks.

Ripened fruit cake can be frozen and preserved for one year. To use, simply defrost cake, unwrap and slice.

DECORATED FRUIT CAKES MAKE FESTIVE GIFTS

Fruit cakes make acceptable and enjoyable gifts, either plain or decorated. For a more festive gift, try your hand in decorating the fruit cakes. We suggest doing this just before serving or sending as gifts.

The glaze, made by heating 1-3 cup corn syrup (for 2 loaves) to boiling, is brushed on the top of the cake. Whole almonds, pecans or walnuts and candied fruit can then be arranged in geometric designs on top of the loaves.

Holly Wreaths: cut small holly leaves from thin slices of green citron. Arrange in a circle to form wreath. Use bits of candied cherry for holly berries. Make one large wreath or small over-lapping wreaths on cake.

Daisy and Pineapple Flowers: Arrange whole blanched almonds to form daisies on top of cake. Make center with a bit of candied cherry. Arrange cubes of candied pine-

apple in circle and place halves between each cube and place one-half cherry in center.

Make greenery for flowers of green citron.

Poinsettias: arrange quarters of candied cherries in shape of poinsettias. Center with candied cherry. Arrange thin strips of green citron for leaves.

Nuts and Walnut Circles: arrange whole nut halves as almonds, pecans or walnuts around top edge of cake.

Nut Tree: arrange halves of nuts in cone-shape on top of rectangular-shaped cake. Place a bit of candied cherries on top of outside nuts to resemble candles on the nut tree.

These are some of the attractive decorations that can be used.

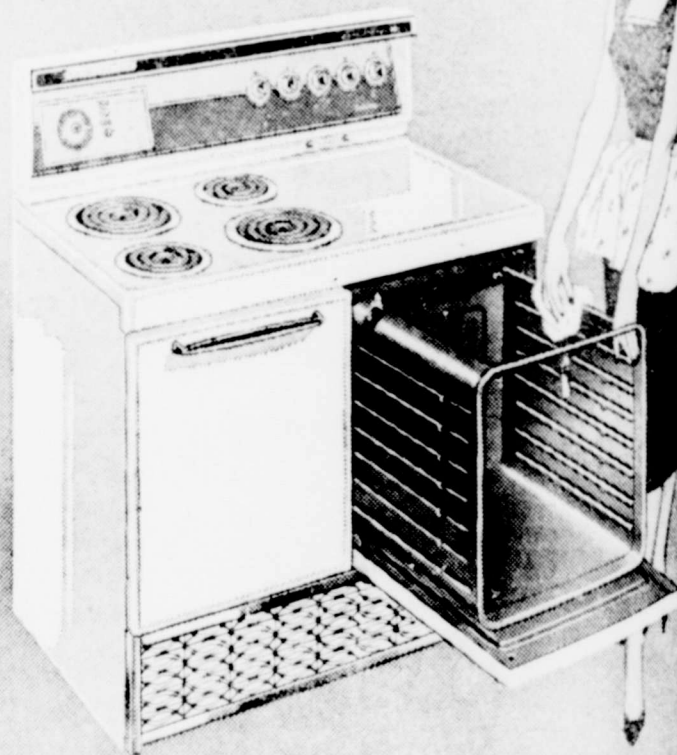

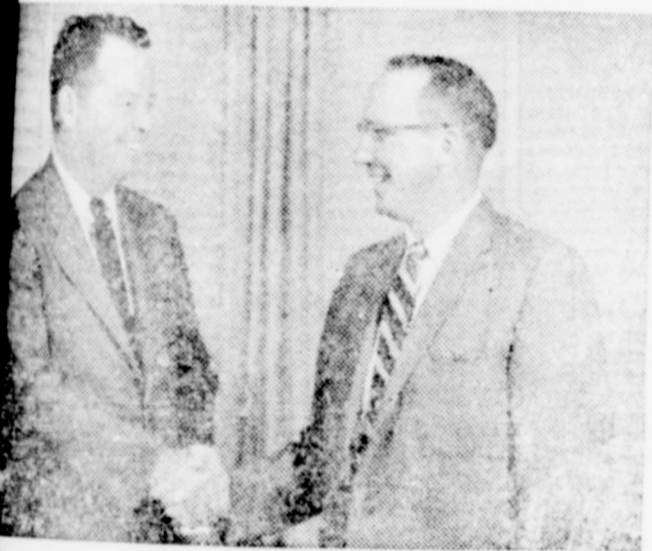

TEXAS CHAMPIONS OF FREEDOM

PHILIP NOLAN

Pioneer in the Cause of Lone Star Liberty

Not all of the bold frontiersmen who envisioned the magnificent future of Texas and helped to open up this great territory ever received due recognition of their championship of freedom. One of these, Irish-born Philip Nolan, history identifies only as a horse-trader. Undoubtedly he was... and a good one. He was killed on March 4, 1801, while fighting a Spanish force sent to arrest him. But his purpose was achieved... the world knew what was here, the way was open and Americans turned their eyes toward Texas.
