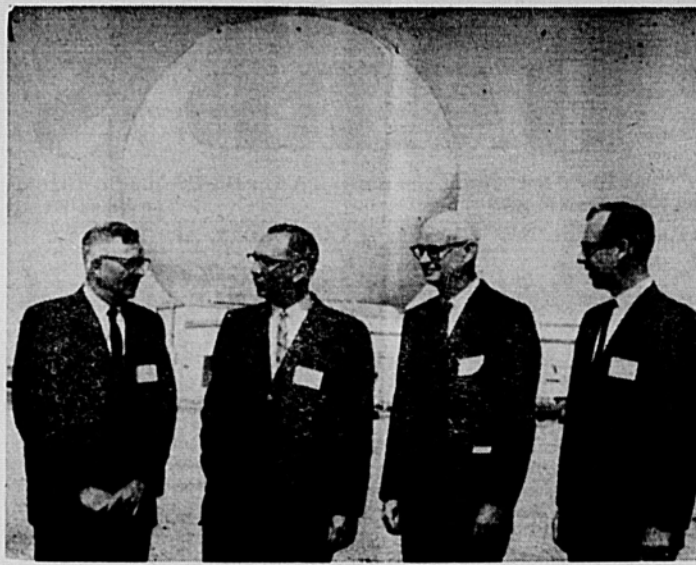

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN — The hundreds of candidates who are running for places in the Texas House of Representatives and the Texas Senate have plenty of problems. But when the victors get to Austin they'll have a new one. Big question will be "where to park their cars."

the Capitol grounds has caused a maddening game of musical chairs -- or musical cars -- at each legislative session. Speaker of the House James A. Turman says the problem is "growing more acute each day."

So, Turman appointed a committee which may have the longest title in the history of the statehouse: The Interim Committee To Study State Owned Lands Around the Capitol Concerning the Possibility of Converting Such Into Parking Lots.

Rep. Obie Jones of Austin was named chairman. Two other Austin members, Reps. Wilson Foreman and Charles Sandahy, will serve on the interim study committee.

CUT THE PROPERTY TAX? — For three years now a legislator-citizen study committee - the Tax Commission on State and Local Tax Policy - has been mulling the possibility of state abandonment of the property tax. Texas Research League has helped with the study.

The committee should have recommendations ready for legislative action in the January session. Outcome may rest on voter pressure between now and the November general election.

Under the current system, the schools get 42 per cent of the property tax dollars; cities take 29 per cent; counties, 18 per cent; and the state government and special districts only get five per cent each.

Texas Municipal League has urged the state to abandon the ad valorem tax and let the cities increase their property taxes.

Hale-Aiken committee asked the state to abandon the tax and let the schools levy it.

Tax experts often have declared that county assessors might place higher values on property, if they felt more of the ad valorem tax dollar would stay in the county.

COLLEGE FUNDS SHORT — Presidents and business managers of Texas' 19 state-supported colleges and universities were stunned that week when Texas Commission on Higher Education reported they will get only 54 per cent of the funds they requested to meet increased enrollment in 1963.

Administrators had set their future needs at \$2,770,951. But the Legislature only appropriated \$1,500,000 to supplement the teaching salaries for enrollment increases. So the commission's staff prorated the fund among the 19 schools.

Dr. F. L. McDonald, president of Lamar State College of Technology in Beaumont, didn't take the news quietly. "This is one of the reasons we are never able to raise salaries," he protested. He said the colleges are never

allocated enough money and "have to dig it up."

While the 19 presidents are trying to balance their budgets, Commission on Higher Education will be studying requests from three more colleges which want to join the state system: Odessa, San Antonio and Laredo junior colleges.

Recommendations will be made when the 58th Legislature convenes.

NEW SHELL GAME — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler predicts that Texas never will yield control over any part of Padre Island to the federal government. He charged that some Texans have been "deceived" by talk of an 88-mile long national park there.

He said the U. S. Senate did not approve a park, but a "National Seashore Area."

"This status," says Sadler, "would keep Padre Island and Laguna Madre in an undeveloped state."

Sadler urged Attorney General Will Wilson to push recovery of Laguna Madre acreage from private owners before they convey their rights to the U. S. Department of the Interior.

Meanwhile, U. S. Congressman Joe Kilgore of McAllen said the House National Parks Subcommittee will make an on-the-ground survey of the island from May 11 through May 13. They will return to Washington, D. C., to consider legislation on May 14.

READING PUBLIC GROWS — Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, State Librarian, announced an in-

crease of 13 public libraries in Texas and more than a quarter of a million books on library shelves throughout the State.

He said library service has improved to the point where there are now 106 branch libraries, in comparison to 97 in 1960. More than \$4,400,000 was spent for library construction last year, "possibly the biggest library-building year in more than three decades."

Dr. Winfrey gave much of the credit for library development to the Rural Library Service Division of the Texas State Library. It operates bookmobile services throughout the state; furnishes books for libraries in cities and communities of less than 10,000 population; and provides consultants without any charge.

But many of the achievements can be claimed by communities like Taylor, Rockdale, Navasota and Alvin, where citizens get

out and raise the money for library building funds.

HIGHEST HIGHWAY LETTING SET — State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said the highway department's April bid letting will be the biggest this year. Low bids are expected to total some \$28,600,000.

The April 24-25 letting will involve 952 miles of Texas highways and cover contracts for 422 miles of U. S. and State highways; 148 miles of farm-to-market roads and 382 miles of seal-coat work.

"We are leading the nation in miles of interstate, primary and secondary highways," Greer stated, "and we want to keep that lead."

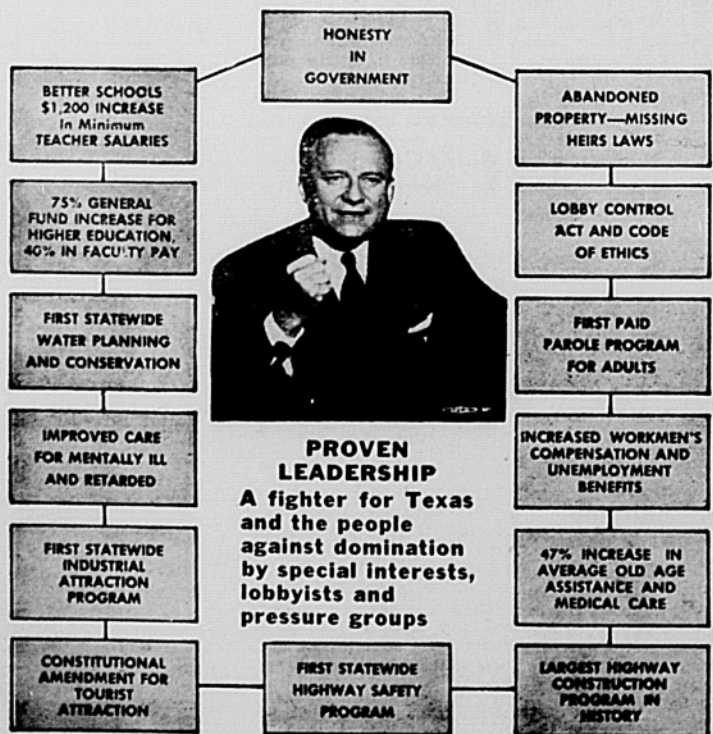
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Beatrice Turner Weds Sam Franklin

taxing agencies. State laws require all real and personal property to be rendered for taxes on or before prescribed dates. Those who fail to comply can blame only themselves for the money loss they may consequently suffer.

Some Texas cities set their own tax deadlines. These are the cities of more than 5,000 population which have incorporated under the "Home Rule" provisions of our statutes. All other cities are governed by the general laws of Texas.

In towns operating under the general laws, property must be rendered for taxes between January 1 and April 1 each year. A number of home rule cities set up the same requirements in their ordinances, while others prescribe different periods.

For state and county tax purposes, property must be rendered to the County Tax Assessor by April 30, and homestead exemptions must be claimed by the same time.

In some localities a third taxing unit is involved -- the independent school district. In other places school taxes are collected by the city or county. In addition, some localities have water, irrigation, or levee districts which assess and collect taxes. Make inquiry as to where these various taxes are assessed, and as to applicable deadlines for rendition.

What property must be rendered for taxes? If Texas laws were strictly enforced, we would be required to render to all taxing units nearly every piece of real and personal property which we own, down to the very clothing on our backs. An exception is the constitutional exemption of \$250 worth of household furniture. However, no taxing unit carries its requirements this far, and it will be necessary to inquire of each tax assessor when rendering your property whether specific types of property are ordinarily rendered in that locality. Some cities and counties collect ad valorem taxes on automobiles, television sets and other personal items, while others ignore

practically all personal property. Business and professional men are generally required to render all merchandise, furnishings, fixtures, business automobiles and equipment.

If property is not rendered by the tax payer, it may then be placed upon the unrendered tax roll, and the taxing agency places such valuation thereon as it considers fair. One advantage of rendering your property is that you can set your own valuation. Then, if the county or city decides a higher valuation is in order, you will be given an opportunity before a board to explain why the higher figure should not be used in comput-

ing your taxes. Thereafter, an appeal to the courts is possible in some instances. Generally speaking, however courts are unable to strike out a valuation unless the agency or board has acted arbitrarily and placed on the property a valuation higher than that placed on comparable property owned by others. If you do not render, the valuation set by the taxing agency is final. Remember these facts: You may need to render your property at three or more different tax offices. Ask each tax assessor or if in doubt concerning the deadline or the rendering of specific personal items.

in each event will qualify for the state contest at 4-H Round-Up in June at College Station.

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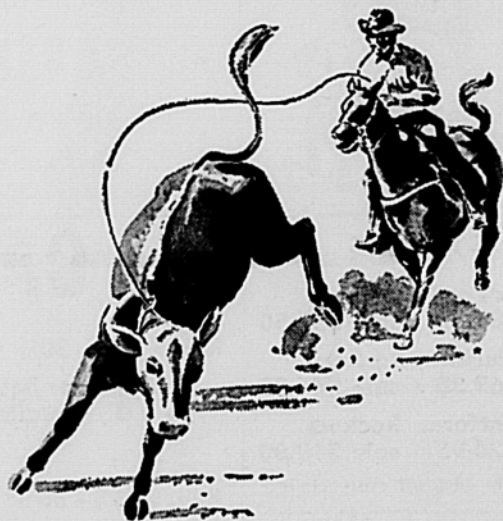

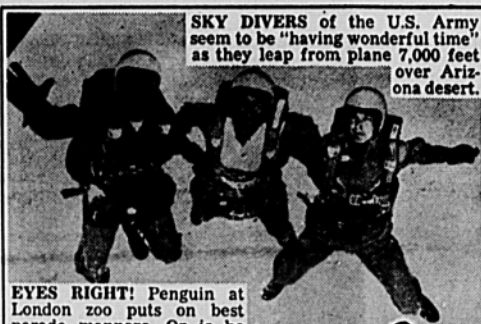

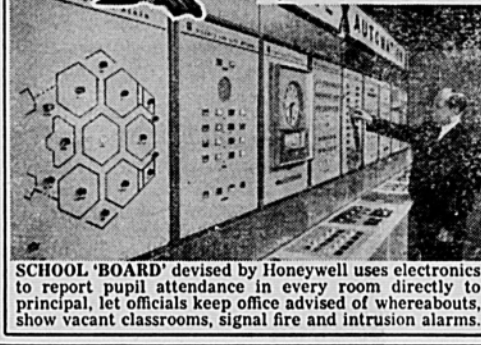

About Your Health . .

The year 1961 was a banner year in one respect. For the first time, the accident rate in the United States was as low as 60 per 100,000 population, dipping to a level about three percent under the previous low set in 1960.

Provisional figures likewise show that the actual toll in 1961 was about 91,500 lives, a decrease of approximately 1,500 from the number in the year before.

Biggest decrease was registered in the death toll column of accidents in and around the home. Approximately 26,500 persons were killed in such accidents during 1961, a decrease of about 1,000 from the total in the preceding year.

Motor vehicle accidents took about 38,000 lives during the year, slightly less than the toll in 1960. The death rate from motor vehicle accidents also declined. The rate based on accidental deaths per 100 million miles was below the previous year's low of 5.3.

Catastrophes -- accidents in which five or more persons are killed -- were responsible for about 1,250 deaths in the continental United States during 1961, approximately 250 fewer than in 1960.

The main factor in this reduction was the smaller number of fatal injuries in major catastrophes -- accidents in which at

least 25 persons are killed.

Aside from three airplane crashes which killed 78, 77 and 37 persons, respectively, two natural disasters were the only major catastrophes during 1961.

One of these catastrophes involved Texas with Hurricane Carla. Accompanied by tornadoes and floods, Carla caused nearly 50 deaths in the Southwest and Midwest during the second week in September.

Other floods which struck the Midwest earlier in the year, during May, claimed 25 lives.

In accidents which killed five or more, motor vehicle accidents

accounted for about 30 percent. Fires and explosions -- largely in the home -- ranked next with about one-fourth of the death toll.

In all accidents, the two most dangerous spots to be in -- are automobiles and our homes, although the death rate from these causes continues to decline.

In Texas, the most surprising figure was the total accidental death column which was identical to 1960, with 5,266 deaths. Motor vehicle deaths accounted for 2,373 in 1961 compared to 2,326 in 1960.

County Agent

The brucellosis program was officially kicked off in Callahan County this week with organizational meeting held Tuesday in Baird and Cross Plains. Since the county has become officially enrolled in the testing program, most everyone is anxious to get started and get it over with. It is estimated that it will take two months to test all the herds of cattle in the county. The speed and ease of the program will be determined by the cooperation of the people and availability of people to line up the herds for testing. It will certainly be to the cattle owners advantage to get the program over as quickly as possible, not only for the ease of marketing animals, but also cattle will just work easier when it is cool. A few herds will be tested this week, and then the testing crew will get into full swing next week.

The lab which is used to test the samples of blood is set in Baird at Pioneer Lodge. The lab will have a phone for local calls. The county will be divided into sections, and one section will be tested before another is started. The testers will start and work in whichever section can have the cattle lined up the quickest. If you desire more information on this program, contact your county agent or any one of the men working in the testing crew. Jim Ellis of Comanche is in charge of the crew and can be reached at Pioneer Lodge. As the line-up men for each community are known, their names will be published and they are men to contact to see when your cattle can be tested.

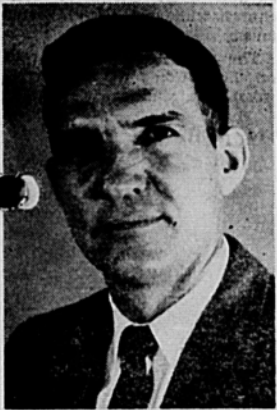

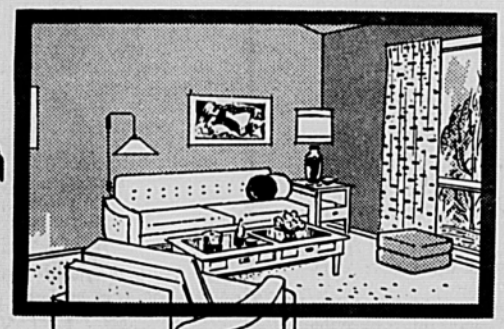

CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS AND INTEREST

You may deduct contributions made by you in cash or other property for religious, charitable, literary, educational or scientific purposes. This is one of the itemized personal income tax deductions available to you. However, you cannot deduct contributions which you make, no matter how worthy your intentions, to needy relatives or other individuals, social clubs and political organizations. If you are on the cash basis and report income as you receive it and expense as you pay it, your contribution must be paid before it can be deducted from your tax return. You need not make a donation in cash in order to obtain a charitable contribution deduction. In fact, you can often afford to make a larger contribution to charity because the law permits you to deduct the fair value of the property you donate to charity, whether or not this amount exceeds the price you paid for the property, with out requirement that you report

Fallout Protection Guide At CD, Post Offices Now

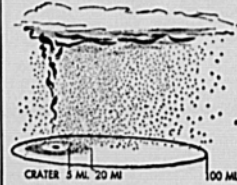
A pocket-sized booklet with the most essential, up-to-the-minute information for families and individuals on how to survive a nuclear attack is now available to Americans without charge from any post office or state or local civil defense office. The 48-page, yellow-covered booklet, entitled "Fallout Protection—What to Know and Do About Nuclear Attack," includes specific instructions on how to survive fallout, build a fallout shelter or improvise a last-minute shelter if necessary, stock and ventilate the shelter, and take sanitary and first aid measures. Special information for farmers is provided on protecting or decontaminating livestock, food and equipment in a fallout zone. The Department of Defense, Office of Civil Defense, produced the booklet to provide up-to-date, easily-readable survival information in one publication. So far, 25 million of the booklets have been printed and placed in distribution.

The booklet also points out other ways in which the Defense Department's new civil defense program will provide increasing protection:

- The National Shelter Survey now under way will identify fallout shelter spaces in existing structures for about 50 million persons. Identification, marking and stocking with austerity food and water rations, first aid kits, radiation detection instruments and other essentials will cost less than \$4 per space.
- The proposed Federal Shelter Incentive Program would provide Federal grants of something less than the cost of constructing fallout shelters in schools, hospitals and in other non-profit institutions. Many shelters also would serve a dual peace-time function.
- The existing National Warning System is being extended to provide Americans near-instant attack warning.

Where to Get Booklet

You can obtain your free copy of the Defense Department's survival booklet for all Americans, "Fallout Protection," at your local post office or your community civil defense office. After April 1, 1962, it will be available only from civil defense offices.



How Fallout Endangers U.S. Told in Booklet

What is fallout? This frequently-discussed and even more frequently misunderstood phenomenon of the nuclear age is simply explained in the Department of Defense's "Fallout Protection" booklet now available to the public through post offices and local civil defense offices.

This drawing from the booklet shows how fine dust and debris from a nuclear explosion can be carried downwind from the blast, the amount of fallout gradually diminishing with the distance. Each dust particle is like a tiny X-ray machine whose gamma radiation will penetrate lighter materials but will dissipate in a relatively short time and do little harm to those protected by a sufficient amount of dense materials in shelters.

the increase in value as income to yourself.

For example, if you have a share of stock which cost you \$50 and is presently worth \$100, you can give the share to a charitable organization and take a \$100 deduction. If you sold the stock and gave the cash as a charitable donation, it would be necessary for you to pay an income on the \$50 profit. By giving the stock to charity, you get the \$100 deduction and pay no tax.

You also are entitled to deduct as a charitable contribution the fair value of clothing, toys and other articles which you gave to charity and also expenses which you incur for travel and transportation in serving a charitable organization. You cannot, however, deduct as a charitable contribution the value of your time which is donated.

On your Federal return, your charitable deduction is limited to 20 per cent of adjusted gross income. However, where one-third of the total charitable deduction is for donations to churches, educational organizations and hospitals, you are entitled to deduct a maximum of 30 per cent of your adjusted gross income.

Interest expense is deductible in full from your tax return.

This expense is often a substantial part of your monthly mortgage payments on your house.

If you are buying a car or other property or appliances on time, a portion of your time purchase price and monthly payment will normally be interest expense. Where the amount of interest expense is not clear or where the time carrying charge includes other charges such as for insurance on your life, you may estimate the interest charge by determining your average monthly balance during the year and multiplying this amount by 6 per cent. It is, of course, preferable to obtain the actual amount of interest which you pay because most running accounts or time charges are based upon substantially higher interest than the 6 per cent figure.
