'58 POSTAL RECEIPTS SHOW SLIGHT DROP

Although slightly less than the record figure of \$20,034.59 set in 1957, postal receipts at Rankin Post Office for 1958 were the second highest ever recorded here when a total volume of \$18,435.16 was reported this week by postmaster Grace Roach.

Also down by \$273.49 was receipts

for box rent in 1958 as compared to the 1957 figure. Total for 1958 in box rent receipts was \$1,844.21 while 1957 was \$2,117.70. Total number of pieces of mail run through the cancelling machine was off in '58 by a good margin over both 1957 and 1956. Totals for the three years in this department were: 1956—44,910 pieces; 1957—52,130 and a record; 1958—33,700. These figures do not reflect letters too bulky for the cancelling machine, the large flat envelopes nor the under-sized pieces. All these must be hand-cancelled.

The fact that there was only a slight decline in money volume in the amounts for mail handled in 1957 and 1958 while a great difference in total number of pieces is due to the raise in the postal rates in 1958.


It's been working for almost ten years now in these foreign countries and it's bound to work right here at home.

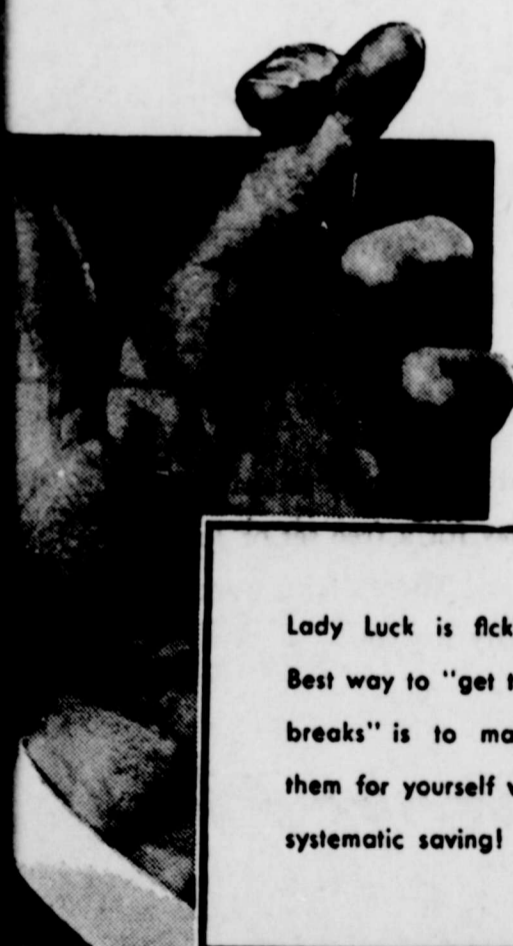

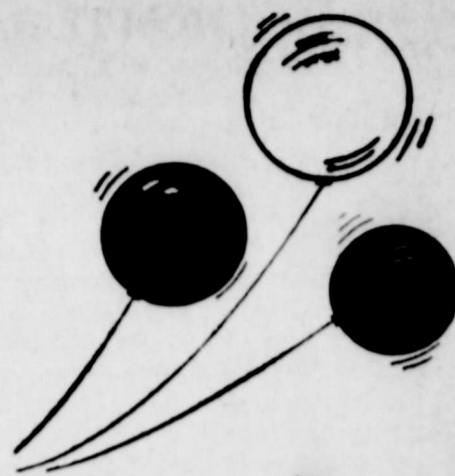
