IN PLACE-

Last week, the Odessa American carried an editorial that is worth repeating. It puts the monkey where it belongs in reguards to raising children-namely, on the parents.

In quoting from a research done by two specialists of Stamford University, the American said: "The authors concluded that it is possible to predict with reasonable accuracy. even at the age of 11, which boys will turn out to be delinquents or criminals. They concluded that punishment such as reform schools, is virtually useless in curing delinquency; that ordinary counseling is no more effective; that present day social work programs are largely a failure.

They tell us that a satisfactory program to alleviate the causes of criminality in our young people is not found primarily in the character of the household, in the economic status of the family, or in the child's IQ. The actual root of the problem is found in the relationship of the two parents to each other and to the child. They point out that a broken home is not so destructive an influence as has been assumed, that it is the degree of affection or the lack of it, between parents, which has the most profound effect. . . . Most impressive is the finding that most communities presist in dealing with the effect of delinquency rather than getting at the cause. HUGE SUMS OF MONEY ARE SPENT in providing club houses, social programs, group encouragements, athletic equipment, counseling and other surface devices. But the root of the criminal is deeply laid in the personalities of his parents and in little else. The specialists insist that "the root of criminal behavior lies in the family."

Now the above is a rather longwinded way of saying that we, here in Upton County, are not going to be able to escape our responsibilities to our own children by building bigger youth centers, more swimming pools, larger schools, or providing more places of entertainment. You just can't get away from the fact that kids will be just about what the parents bring them

#### America's New Liners



#### The Argentina

December 8, 1958, marked the establishment of a postwar record for American-flag shipping and shipbuilding. On that day the Moore-McCormack liner Argentina steamed into New York from the Mississippi yard of the Ingalls Shipbuilding Corporation. Her delivery brought to five the number of new passenger ships added to the American Merchant Marine in 1958.

The name Argentina has been a proud and famous one on the shipping lanes between New York and Buenos Aires since 1938. when Mooremack's first "Good Neighbor Liner" of that name entered the intercontinental run, which she was to serve until early in 1958. Completing the close link between herself and her namesake, when the new Argentina made her maiden sailing for South America December 12, she was under command of Commodore Thomas Simmons, who had been master of her predecessor for two decades.

The new Argentina, 617 feet long with a speed of 23 knots, is a luxury hotel affoat for her 553 passengers, all of whom travel first class. She and her sister Brasil follow the modern trend of shifting ships' engines toward the stern, leaving the comfortable midships area available for spacious cabins and public rooms, and permitting what appears to be a funnel to be utilized as observation lounge and solarium. ## TEXAS CHAMPIONS OF FREEDOM lliam Harris Wharton

Diplomat and Defender of Texas Independence

In just 14 years, young William H. Wharton made a giant's mark on the pages of Texas history .. as lawyer, pioneer, planter, soldier, statesman and patriot. Born in Virginia, in 1802, Wharton came to Texas in 1827, married Sarah Ann Groce, daughter of another pioneer, and established the beautiful and historic plantation, Eagle Island. As one of the colonist party demanding of Mexico separate statehood for Texas, Wharton opposed the conservative policies of Stephen F. Austin. The petition of 1832, asking for statehood, was a document which has become a political classic. Wharton was its author.

But when the territory was faced with the actual fight for freedom, Wharton and Austin forgot their enmities of earlier years in devotion to the cause to which both were dedicated. Wharton supported Austin in his campaign for presidency of the Republic. Sam Houston, the victor, then appointed Austin Secretary of State and Wharton the first Minister to the United States. Through the young Ministers diplomatic skill, the Republic won U. S. recognition on March 3, 1837. But only two years later Texas lost the distinguished services of William H. Wharton. The accidental discharge of his own pistol ended a brief but brilliant career in the cause of freedom.


