## Wheeler Is Winner Of Scholarship At Texas U

Wheeler, 20-year-old son of Mrs. Ross Wheeler and

graduate of Rankin High School, is the recipient of a \$450 Frances E. Goldbeck Scholarship from the University of Texas. He was selected because of his scholastic record.

Wheeler was valedictorian of his graduating class of 1956, compiling a four-year average of 96.71. It was in October of that year that the National Merit Scholarship Contests were begun. He was one of 50,000 high school students throughout the United States, District of Columbia, Alaska, Puerto Rica and Hawaii to compete in the program.

In the first tests, subjects covered included a complete field of literature, mathematics, social science, etc. After the first test the field was narrowed to 4,000 students to compete in the semi-final examination, the local one being held in Midland in January. He was awarded a certificate of Merit for having been in the upper one-half of one percent.

For his first two years of college work, Wheeler attended the Southwestern University at Georgetown. He attended his first year by virtue of his scholarship as valedictorian and his second by receiving a Jessie H. Jones (\$200) scholarship for scholastic record. During his freshman year, he was a member of the college choir, received the science award and was awarded the Alpha Chi prize which is given annually to the student of the Freshman Class who makes the highest average on a minimum of thirty semester hours of work.

He entered the University of Texas this past fall and was listed among the top scholars in the University of Texas College of Arts and Science for the first semester, having rated Magna Cum Laude.

Wheeler is majoring in Philosophy.

## School Opening Scheduled For Tuesday, September 1

With approximately half of the summer vacation over, Supt. Kenneth Welsch announced this week that school will open in Rankin on Tuesday, September 1 for the 1959-1960 school year.

A total of 182 days have been scheduled by Rankin Schools for the term with 6 holidays other than Christmas and a total of 176 days of instruction.

## HIGHWAY PROJECT STARTED ON 349

The Texas Highway Department has announced a new Highway Construction Project beginning at the Midland-Upton County line on St. 349 and extending southward into Upton County for the distance of approximately eleven miles. Construction will consist of base widening and asphalt concrete resurfacing with paved shoulders. Contractor Schwoppe, Inc. of San Antonio and the Highway Department have stated that construction was scheduled to start July 6 and is to be completed by November of 1959.

Archie J. Sherrod, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department in the Rankin and Midland area, explained that traffic will be routed through the project during construction and asks that motorists be extremely cautious in passing through the construction work as it will be heavily traveled by large construction equipment.

All of the construction area will be zoned for a maximum speed of 45 miles per hour for the protection of motorists and workmen alike. Adequate barricades and warning signals will be prominently displayed and the entire length of the project will be patrolled to minimize inconvenience to motorists.

Cooperation of the public is requested in obeying all traffic signals, warning signs and speed zones. Sharrod has said.

## TEXAS CHAMPIONS OF FREEDOM

### GENERAL JOHN BELL HOOD

Defender of States Rights and Self-Determination

In victory and defeat John Bell Hood, the Texas Brigade's "fighting general" of the Civil War, was a dedicated defender of man's right to choose his way of life. Like Robert E. Lee, Hood was a graduate of the U. S. Military Academy at West Point. And, like Lee, he resigned his commission in the U. S. Army to serve his state and the South through the bitter years from 1861 to the surrender at Appomattox Court House, April 9, 1865.

From the time he took command of the 4th Texas Infantry, that—with other Texas and Confederate regiments—came to be known as Hood's Texas Brigade, because of his daring leadership. Victories and promotions came quickly. As Major General Hood he was considered the hero of Chickamauga, where he lost his right leg. As Lieutenant General Hood, commanding the Army of Tennessee, he met crushing defeat at Nashville on

December 16, 1864, and was relieved of his command.

But Texas doesn't forget her champions of freedom. A monument in his memory stands within the state capitol grounds at Austin, and Camp Hood established during World War II—now Fort Hood—was named in honor of the "fighting general," loyal defender of his state's rights to self-determination.

Today Texans still demand and get their right to choose the way they want to live. In this vigorous and freedom-minded homeland...
