## Commissioners Court Calls For Paving Bids

Street paving time is again near for Rankin as the Commissioners Court last Monday issued a Notice to Bidders for paving work.

According to the notice, bids will be received until 2:00 p.m. August 3 at the office of the County Judge, at which time they will be opened

and read.

Bidders are to furnish all necessary materials, machinery, equipment, superintendence and labor for reshaping and surfacing with double penetration surface, certain streets in the city of Rankin and McCamey.

A complete Notice to Bidders is carried elsewhere in this issue of the Rankin News.

Main project of local interest will be some nine blocks on 8th Street reaching from Highway 67 to Severn. Several other streets will also be paved as will the driveways and parking areas at the Upton County Courthouse.

Property owners have been urged to complete their curb and gutter work as soon as possible in order not to delay paving on their particular streets. Once the curb and gutter is in place, the County will do the base filling and grading work with county crews and equipment.

Contractors will have 10 days from the time they are awarded the bid in which to enter into a contract with the county. Actual paving work is tentatively scheduled for about the middle of August.

### OTHER MATTERS

In other matters, the Court voted to raise the salary of Mrs. Barcy McCain, JP in Precinct Two by \$25 per month effective August 1. Her present salary is \$170 per month.

They further voted to publish on each quarter, the County Treasurer's quarterly report of county expenditures and receipts.

And voided a contract with The Weathermaster Co., Inc. of Odessa. The company failed to fulfill agreement in their work on the new courthouse.

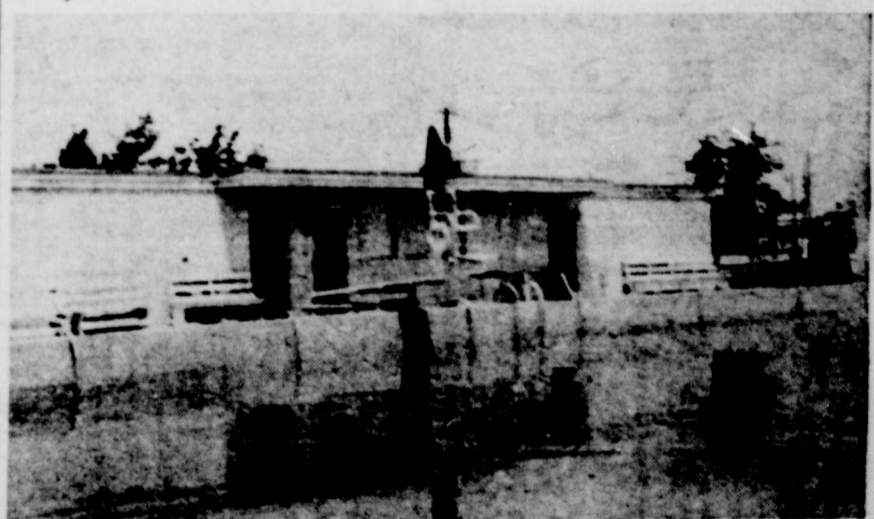

Recently completing the Spring semester with high honors at Texas University was Herbert W. Hurn, son of Mrs. Hurbert Hurn of Rankin.

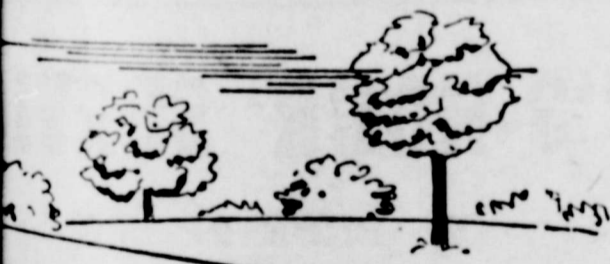

### NOTICE TO BIDDERS

Sealed proposals addressed to the honorable Judge and Commissioner's Court of Upton County, Texas, will be received at the office of the County Judge at the County Court House until 2:00 P. M., August 3, 1959, for furnishing all necessary materials, machinery, equipment, superintendence, and labor for reshaping and surfacing with double penetration surface, certain streets in the city of McCamey and Rankin, Texas.

Bidders must submit cashier's or certified checks issued by a bank satisfactory to the county of Upton, payable without recourse to the order of Upton County in an amount not less than 5 per cent of the largest possible bid submitted as a guaranty that bidder will enter into the contract and execute bond and guaranty in the forms provided within ten (10) days after notice of award of contract to him. Bids without required check will not be considered.

The successful bidder must furnish performance bond in the amount of one hundred (100%) per cent of the total contract price from a surety company holding a permit from the state of Texas to act as surety, or other surety or sureties acceptable to the County of Upton.

All lump sum and unit prices must be stated in both script and figures on forms provided. The County of Upton reserves the right to reject any or all bids and to waive formalities. In case of ambiguity or lack of clearness in stating prices in the bids, the County of Upton reserves the right to consider the most advantageous construction thereof, or to reject the bid. Unreasonable (or "unbalanced") unit prices will authorize the County of Upton to reject any bid.

Bidders are expected to inspect the site of work and to inform themselves regarding all local conditions.

Attention is called to the fact that there must be paid on the project not less than the general prevailing rates of wages which have been established by the County of Upton.

Instructions to bidders, proposal forms, specifications and plans are on file at the office of the County Judge at the County Court House, and the office of Edwin S. Martin, Jr., engineer, 229 E. 27th Street, Odessa, Texas.

Copies may be secured from the County Judge or Edwin S. Martin, Jr., upon deposit of \$5.00, which deposit will be returned to the contractor upon submission of a bona fide bid on the work, with such plans and specifications, or upon returning the plans and specifications immediately after examination of same, and advising the Judge or engineer that bid will not be submitted; otherwise, the deposit shall be forfeited.

## Hadassah's Dream Comes

KIRYAT HADASSAH, Israel—In the Judean Hills, overlooking the birthplace of John the Baptist at Ein Karem, a Hadassah dream is coming true.

Here at Kiryat Hadassah, the \$25 million Hadassah-Hebrew University Medical Center is being built as a "fortress of healing" in Israel. And throughout the United States and Puerto Rico, the 318,000 members of Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization—with headquarters at 65 East 52nd Street, New York City—are mobilizing every fund-raising effort to assure completion of this Medical Center in 1960. Mrs. Abraham Tulin is national chairman of Hadassah's Medical Center Committee.

Since 1948, when the United Nations assumed control of Mt. Scopus, Hadassah has been prevented from utilizing its hospital there and has been compelled to function in temporary quarters in various parts of Jerusalem. These medical clinical, diagnostic and research facilities will be consolidated in the new Medical Center, characterized by former Senator Herbert H. Lehman as "a monument of the Twentieth Century Scientific and Medical World."

The magnificent Hadassah-Hebrew University Medical Center—designed by the prominent American architect, Joseph Neufeld—will include the Hebrew University-Hadassah Medical School—the only medical school in Israel—founded in 1949 by the Hebrew University and Hadassah. It will also embrace a 500-bed teaching hospital with

service laboratories, Mother and Childernity and infant Outpatient Clinic more than 200,000 annually; and the School of Nursing.

One of the major features is adopted by hospitals built in various parts of the world. It is the brilliant nursing unit, shaped like a wheel, which will serve as the load of the staff and concentration of medical and nursing attention in proximity to the patient.
