

School Registration Opens Wednesday, August 19th

for Rankin High School students who plan to attend during the 1959-60 school year at 9:00 A. M. Wednesday according to High School Principal Bill Hood. Hood

stated that registrations for the coming term would be taken at his office in the high school building on Wednesday and Thursday.

Students who will be Seniors and Juniors this year will register on the Wednesday date while Sopho-

mores and Freshmen will sign-up on Thursday, August 20. They may contact the principal between the hours of 9:00 A. M. and noon or from 1:00 P. M. until 4:00 P. M.

At that time, class schedules and courses will be assigned to those

enrolling. Opening date of school will be September 1.

Hood has stated that he expects a slight increase over last year's number of students registered in the Rankin High School at the close of the term. The 1960 Senior Class

is expected to be one of the largest to ever enroll here.

JUNIOR HIGH

Principal Bill Cook at the Junior High School has also stated that he will register students on August 19 and 20. However, he has pointed out that only those who will be entering the Rankin Public School System for the first time will be required to register. None of the students who attended here last year need appear for assignment. This will apply to children in the Sixth, Seventh and Eighth Grades.

Times for registration will be the same as those used for high school students.

County To Call \$50,000 Bond Vote

Upton County voters will be called upon sometime in September to decide the fate of a proposed \$50,000.00 bond issue to build a third County-operated swimming pool in McCamey.

Among the transactions of the Upton County Commissioners' Court in their regular meeting last Monday was a motion passed by a three-

to two vote to call the election. A formal election order was expected to be issued by the court sometime this week which would set the exact date for voting, appoint election judges, etc.

On a motion made by Commissioner E. K. Bufford and seconded by Commissioner Joe Conger, stating that: "after being petitioned by 119

qualified voters to call a bond election for \$50,000.00 to build a swimming pool in the Southwest part of McCamey, Texas in Precinct 3 and (that) the said petition be granted and said election be called"; Commissioners Buford and Conger voted in favor of the motion while Commissioners Tommy Workman and H. Wheeler opposed it. County Judge Bud Fisher then cast his ballot in

favor of calling the election.

About two months ago, the court was petitioned by a group of McCamey citizens, asking that an election of this nature be called. At that time, several individuals appeared before the court to support the request. Among them were representatives of the McCamey Chamber of Commerce.

Funds, if approved by the voters, would be used to construct another swimming pool, in the Southwest part of McCamey, which would be for the use of the Latin American population living in that general area.

McCamey now has one pool in a County operated park near the high school that is being used by whites while some four years ago a Negro pool was constructed in another county park for the benefit of the colored population.

In addition to financing the original construction of the proposed new pool, Upton County would also maintain and operate it as is being done on the two other McCamey pools and the one in Rankin. At this time, there is no charge by the county for use of the pools.

In other actions taken by the court in their Monday meeting, the salary of the second deputy in the Tax Assessor's office, Miss Janice Rhodes, was raised \$50 per month effective August 1.

Shankle Bloxom Appointed To Fill Rankin School Board Post

At their regular board meeting of August 5, members of the Rankin Independent School Board selected Mr. Shankle Bloxom to fill the unexpired term of Johnny Hurst who resigned early in July when it was learned that his position with

the First State Bank conflicted with State School Laws concerning the depositing of school money in any bank which had certain employees either working for the school or serving on the board.

Bloxom, a local rancher, is a graduate of Texas Christian University and, along with his family, has been living in the Rankin School District about three years.

He will serve until school elections are held next spring at which time the position will be open for voting. He may then seek the post through the regular elections should he desire to continue serving.

In other actions taken by the board in this meeting, the agreement with the First State Bank as depository for school money was renewed for one year. The 1958-59 budget was amended and adopted, as well as the 1959-60 school budget. The '59-60 budget can still, however, be amended as the year progresses should the board see fit to do so.

Arrangements were made for the transportation of Rankin colored school students to the Negro school in McCamey. Bill Hood was appointed custodian of textbooks and arrangements were made with the firm of Cherry, Eckert and Story of San Angelo to make the financial audit of the schools.

THREE NEW TEACHERS

Three new teachers were hired by the board. They were Mrs. Ruth Love who will teach public school music, Mrs. Jo Ann Hannah, homemaking, and Mrs. Evelyn Welsh, elementary.

Mrs. Love has had some 14 years experience in teaching and comes to Rankin from Navarro. She and her family of Mr. Love and two children, Dawn, a freshman and Eddie, a seventh-grader, will move to Rankin shortly. Mr. Love is employed by Magnolia Oil Corp.

IT DOESN'T BALANCE—

At the present time there is a great cry throughout the land about the steel strike, increased wages, labor unions and inflation. Both labor and management are going at it tooth and toenail trying to win the public's approval of their particular point of view. There is a strong indication that new and tougher labor laws will be enacted by the Congress of the US.

Now a country editor is not a

smart fellow to begin with but to me, something doesn't balance out in this business. It is repeated each day at sun up that higher wages for the working man means higher prices and higher prices means inflation.

That may be true but I can remember back in about 1939 when a good man's labor could be had for as little as \$2.00 per day and a good used Modle A could be bought for \$85.00 There wasn't too many of the Modle A's sold—nobody had the \$85.00. Now almost any working man makes \$10.00 a day and some three or four times that and a very large bunch of them are buying cars—not \$85.00 used jobs but \$3,000 new models. And not only cars but many other items.

Since 1939—twenty years—wages have advanced many times and so have prices and so has inflation. It is said that the Dollar is now only worth 50 cents—but there is still the matter of the working man buying all this new stuff.

Like I said, somebody is getting the picture a little cockeyed for you can bet that—if given the choice—there would be precious few who would want to return to the 1939 way of doing business.

In the matter of labor, I have never been strong for unions and especially men like Jimmy Hoffa who is without doubt a 14-carrot gold specimen in the rodant department, but all of the troubles in the word cannot be laid at the feet of unionism. For that matter, who is the bigger rat: a union leader who steals money from his members or the head of a corporation who dips into the pot and takes off for South America or who, through poor management, allows the money of his stockholders to be lost—leaving them with a batch

of worthless wallpaper in the form of stocks and shares? It's a tossup.

At any rate, when all the dust has settled, it is most likely that we will all find that America is still a pretty fair place to live and that we will look back in twenty years to 1959 and call it the good old days when you could get the yard mowed for only \$1.50 an hour—plus benefits.

FISHY BUSINESS—

In this issue of the News, there is a picture of Mike Hughes, Gordon Steele and a couple of their amigos and two big catfish. They have put forth the claim that they personally caught these fish and returned with them to Rankin. The picture is supposed to be offered as proof.

Incidentally, we see the United States flag misused on many occasions although not too frequently flown bottom side up.

TEXAS CHAMPIONS OF FREEDOM

Lucy Holcombe Pickens

Ambassador of Goodwill and Sponsor of Liberty

A hundred years ago a beautiful and spirited Texas girl so fascinated the rulers of Czarist Russia that she was an honored guest in St. Petersburg's imperial palace for the birth of her first child. The Czar and Czarina stood as godparents and named the baby "Douschka." Translation: "little darling." That Texas girl was Lucy Holcombe Pickens, of Marshall and the East Texas piney-woods, and wife of the American ambassador to Russia.

Home again, with her husband then Governor of South Carolina, romantic legend says that when General Pierre Beauregard was about to begin the bombardment of Fort Sumter, he handed a taper to little Douschka—who touched off the first cannon shot of the Civil War.

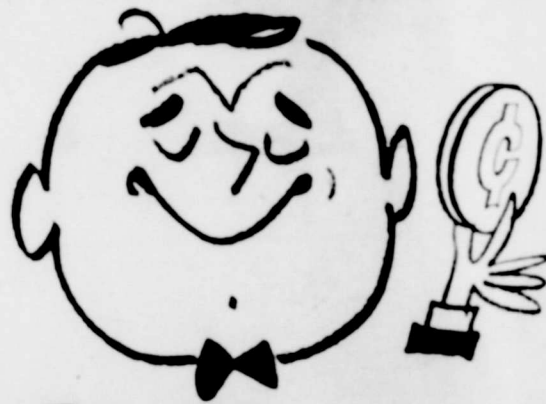
