DOWN BRAVES IN OPENER BY 16-6 MARK

Red Devils Open Home Play Against Coyotes Friday Night

Following their 16-6 win over the much heavier and highly regarded Iraan Braves last week, stock in the Red Devil football team took a nice hop this week. Their defensive ability was the one thing that pleased fans most and was the big factor in their defeating their old rivals

across the Pecos. This week, the Red Devils will open their home stand with a game against the Richland Springs Coyotes, another team that will have the weight advantage and is said to be in good condition. Last year, the Rankin squad was in Richland

Springs for the first encounter between the two teams and spanked the Coyotes rather sharply with the result that the visitors can be expected to come to town seeking a measure of revenge.

Leading their attack will be a threesome of fast backfield men who

are said to be capable of going all the way for the goal line anytime they get behind the defense. In addition to having a weight average of near 165, the visitors will also field seven starters from last year's squad.

For the Red Devils, they will likely be in the favorites spot this week following their win over Iraan. However, Coach Leach has said that he expects this to be one of the hardest games of the season for the team and that he is still looking for improvement in several spots in the Red Devil line-up. All of the local squad is expected to be in condition for action Friday night, having come through last week's encounter with little more than the usual skinned elbows and sore ribs. Gametime will be at 8:00 pm. with a good turnout expected for the first home game of the season.

TICKET SALES

Parking tickets for the Richland Springs-Rankin football game are now on sale in the high school principal's office. These tickets enable the holder to park within the stadium to watch the game from the car. The price of the tickets is fifty cents.

There are still several good parking places available for the season, all six home games for three dollars.

If all parking spaces are not sold prior to the game, attendants at the drive-in gate, the northwest gate, will sell the remaining tickets. Admission tickets for parking ticket holders only may also be purchased at the drive-in gate.

All pedestrian patrons are asked to use the main gate on the north side of the stadium or the gate on the southwest corner.

Admission to all home football games is \$1.00 for adults and fifty cents for students.

New Rate Schedule Announced By WTU

A schedule of revised rates for electrical service was approved in a meeting of the City Commission Tuesday, September 8.

Similar schedules, which have already been approved in Abilene and San Angelo and other area towns, are being filed throughout the 49-county area served by the West Texas Utilities Company.

"The revised schedule of rates is designed," Bill Ramsey, WTU District Manager, said, "to provide:

1. A new low rate for electric heating during winter months.
2. Liberalization of the water heater rate.
3. Reduction in the base of the present fuel clause and incorporation of the new lower fuel clause in all schedules with the exception of municipal water pumping, street lighting and signal light rates."

"The last-named purpose is an effort by WTU to hedge against anticipated future increases in the cost of fuel which the Company may incur in generating electricity and to avoid a possible rate increase," Ramsey said.

The fuel adjustment, which works both downward and upward, becomes effective in the rate not now carrying a fuel clause when the Company's average cost of fuel is less than 8c or above 14½c per million BTU—the normal heat value of 1,000 cubic feet of gas.

Last year, the Company's average cost of fuel was 13.6c per 1,000 cu ft. of gas. Before the new fuel adjustment would become operative at 14½c, the Company would absorb another 6.2% increase in the cost of fuel.

Ramsey added, "It's not probable that the fuel adjustment would be applicable to commercial and residential customers before 1962, and that, if and when it becomes operative, the effect on the average customer's bill will be negligible." Ramsey continued, "A 10% increase in the cost of fuel to the Company would add only 2c per month to the average residential customer."
