CALLED TO BUILD SWIMMING POOL

Upton Voters To Decide Fate Of \$50,000 Issue Saturday

Polls will open at 8:00 a.m. and voting will continue until 7:00 p.m. Saturday, September 19 as Upton County voters decide the fate of a proposed \$50,000 park bond issue.

Should the vote be favorable, the money would be used to build a swimming pool and park for Latin Americans in McCamey. Eligible voters will be those living in Upton County who have paid their poll tax and rendered their property for taxation. A simple majority will be necessary for the issue to carry.

Qualified voters on this issue in the county number 1178 according to tax assessor H. E. "Gene" Eckols. By voting precincts these are:

In Rankin, voting will be held at the courthouse in the county courtroom for voters living in voting precinct no. 1. Judge will be E. C. Higday with Boyd Cox, assistant judge and Mrs. Cox and Mrs. Sam Holmes, clerks.

Voters in voting precinct no. 2 will cast their ballots at the Rankin Park Building with Norman Elrod as presiding judge, Fields Branch as assistant and Mrs. J. T. Bush-

ong and Mrs. J. P. Everett as the clerks.

In voting precinct 3 at the Phillips-Pembroke Gasoline Plant near Midkiff, Mrs. R. R. Calcote will be judge with R. R. Barrett, assistant and Mrs. Barrett as clerk.

In addition to financing the construction of the pool and park, if the bonds are approved Saturday by the voters, Upton County would also maintain and operate the swimming pool in the same manner as is done with the three county-owned pools now in operation. It is estimated that it costs approximately \$3,000 per year to operate a pool. At the present time, two such pools are operated in McCamey and one in Rankin for a period of about 90 days per year.

Red Devils Looking For Third Win Over Stout Eagle Eleven

Their 25-14 win over Rankin Red Devils last Friday night in a game which was one of the best of the Permian Basin.

Using the wide-open offense that always produces good spectator football from a sound win last week the Van Horn Eagles, one of the contenders of West Texas, held a win over the Cowboys and are expected to look for revenge against the Red Devils who defeated them at home field last year.

Rankin in size, the Eagles have the services of a stout line, plus hard runners in 175 pound John Eaker, 160 pound Larry Knight and 175 pound Marion Wilson and several lighter scat-backs. Their bread and butter play is a drive through the line on an off-tackle slant. Last week their passing game was not working to any noticeable advantage but could give the local team a considerable amount of trouble should they become air-minded.

For the Red Devils, who ran up approximately 130 yards the first quarter against Richland Springs and only about 100 the remainder

test against a winning ball club. In their past two outings, the big Red has looked very good at times and very poor at others due to fumbles. On the defense, they have been solid in the line but weak on pass defense.

This week, Coach Leach and his crew has been working hard on a defense for the single wing play. Scrimmages have been carried out with lots of body contact and an effort to improve the pass defense.

Several of the local squadmen are favoring minor injuries with Jimmy Linthicum, the pre-season favorite for fullback still on the injured list. Big Jim Harris has had a bad knee all week and end

Kennis Kennemer has a rib injury.

Generally, the two teams will be picked about even for the contest Friday night with the winner emerging with a considerable amount of prestige and a favorite spot in his respective district.

In their last three encounters, the Red Devils have plucked the Eagles each and every time. Last year it was a hard won 22-14 victor while in 1957, the Red Devils took it easy and won by 18-6 while in 1956 it was a Rankin win by 33-6.

THE SCOOP by Scoop

THE QUESTION—

To swim together or not to swim together—that will be the question comes Saturday, Sept. 17.

Whether it's better to put up with a little intergrated swimming or spend 50 thousand bucks to build another swimming pool, and in so doing, suffer the pangs of about \$3,000 more a year keeping the thing up, is, indeed a danged good question.

Actually, the request by the Latins over in McCamey for a park and pool of their own has merit. If the white folks have one and the colored folks have one, then certainly, the Mexican folks are entitled to one.

But, if you are going to use the county's money to provide segregated swimming for every nationality in McCamey, then it is just as right to furnish the same accomodations for those in Rankin—as foolish as the suggestion sounds.

This is not an appeal for intergradation although everyone will have to admit that it has worked no hardships here in Rankin as far as the swimming pool is concerned. I only point out that this whole thing is not the answer for if one is entitled to it—so is the other.

And Upton County is not a money tree. If these park bonds are voted, the money will either have to come from higher taxes or some of the other county-sponsored park programs will have to be cut—don't let anyone tell you otherwise.

What is the solution? The same as it has always been in what we call a free enterprise—let Upton County get out of the business of providing entertainment for every Tom, Dick and Harry and let Tom and Dick and Harry provide for his own self.

That won't be very popular when just about every organization in the county has a fingure in the pie but it's the only way to stop a thing that can go on and on.

We say the Russians are wrong in taking the children from the parents to raise—yet, we here in Upton County demand that the county furnish all sorts of recreational programs for our children—plus a paid staff in some cases—to look after our kids when they are out of school—which, in itself, is sometimes referred to as a baby sitting institution.

Whatever did happen to the idea of people looking after themselves and their own?

In any case, go to the poll and vote Saturday—don't let this matter be decided by a straw vote.

THE THIRD WEEK—

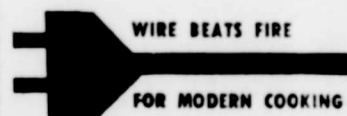

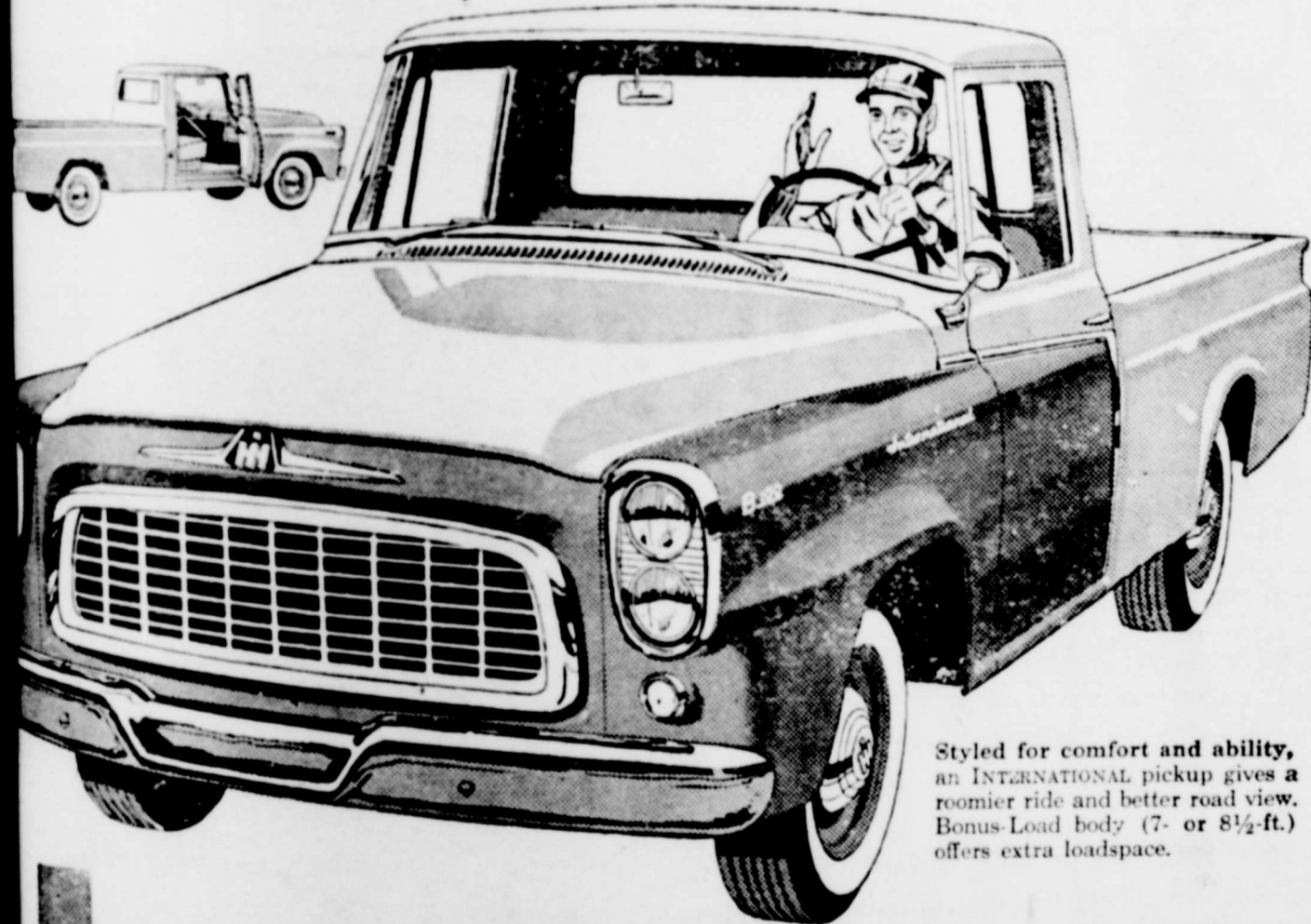

Scholarship Tests To Be Given In Early '60

All 1961 graduates who wish to enter the 1960-61 National Merit Scholarship competition should register now at the school office. Bill L. Hood, principal, announced today. The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test will be given at 9 A.M., Tuesday, March 8, 1960 or Saturday, March 19, 1960.

To be eligible for the test, Rankin High School students must be second-semester juniors or first-semester seniors at the time of the examination. Students must pay a \$1 fee on the day of the test. Any interested student who is unable to pay the fee should consult Mr. Hood.

The tests are given each year by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation as part of the nation's largest independent scholarship program. Last year 550,000 students competed in 14,500 schools for more than \$3.5 million worth of four-year scholarships.

Awards are granted on the basis of intellectual merit, but student financial needs determine the size of the individual stipends, which are renewable each year without further testing.

The NMS exam, administered by Science Research Associates of Chicago, also is valuable to students or selecting their careers or plan-

ning their courses in high school and college. After the test, each participating student will receive an interpretive folder that reports individual test results for comparison with scores of high school students across the country. Thus, a

student may learn his educational strength and weakness—whether or not he plans to attend college.

In addition to the NMSC grants established in 1955 by the Ford Foundation and the Carnegie Corporation of New York, about 90 in-

dustrial corporations, foundations, and individuals give scholarships by means of NMSC.

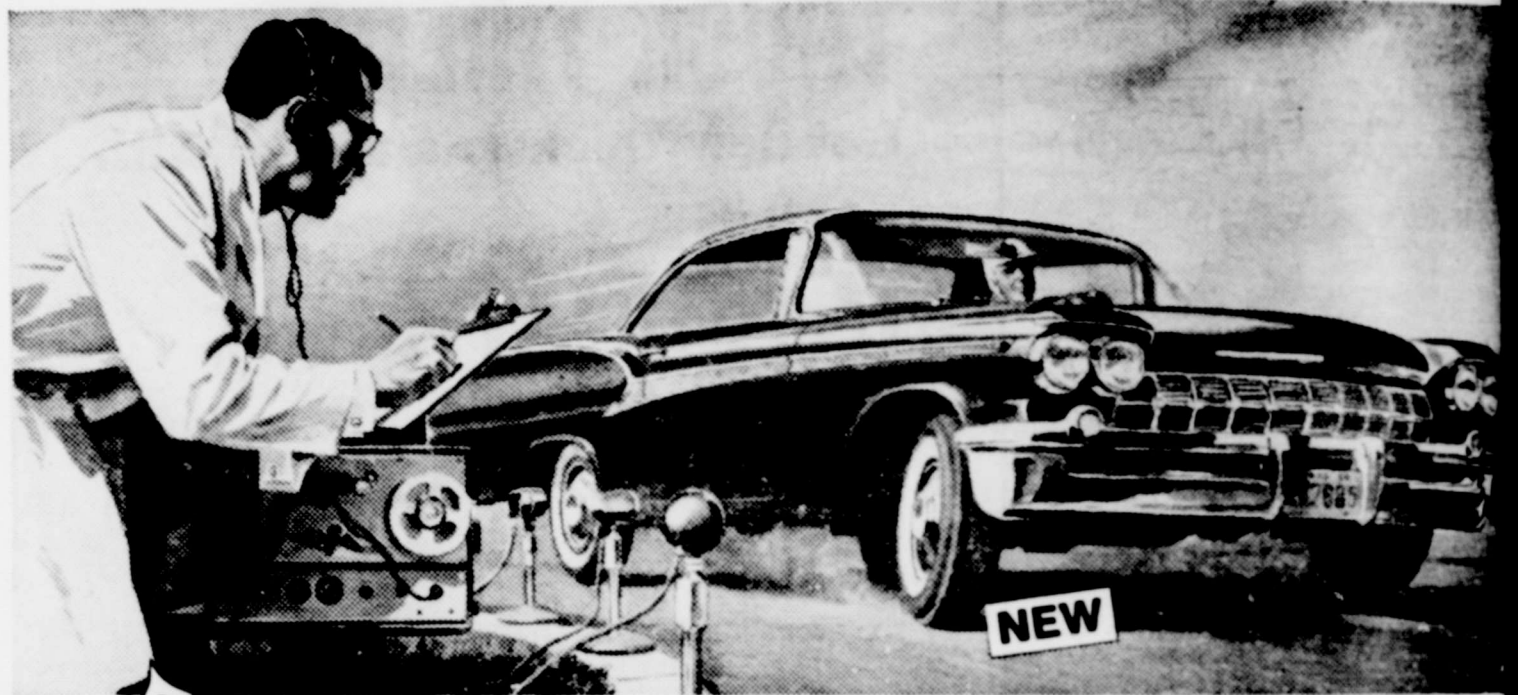

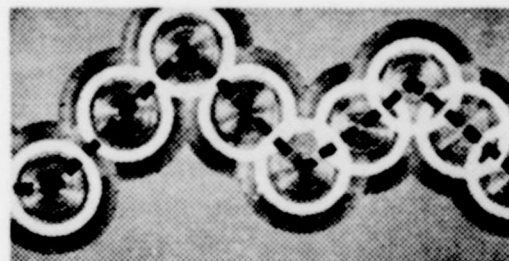

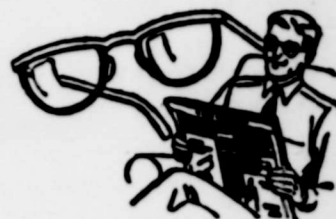
