Rankin Moves Up To Class A

Beginning next school term, Rankin will compete in Class A for all Interscholastic League sports and related events. Biggest change for the local school will be in football.

Next season the Red Devils will compete in District pay with Iraan, Van Horn, Wink, Sanderson and Fabens, the later nearly 300 miles distant.

This will also be the 1st year in the higher class for Van Horn and the first since about 1955 for Wink. Classification of brackets in which school participate are determined by enrollment in high school.

Placing of Rankin in a district that is almost 300 miles wide has not proven popular with a majority of those questioned on the new loop set-up. It was felt locally that Rankin should have been entered in one of the several districts closer to home. However, the new district does have some top rated ball clubs and can be expected to be a strong contender in West Texas.

SCHOOL BUS POLICY ADOPTED BY BOARD

In their last meeting, members of the Rankin School Board discussed and adopted a policy concerning operation of the school buses, the responsibility of the drivers and the passengers. Following is the new policy:

"Bus drivers are in complete charge of passengers at all times. Pupils are responsible to remain in their seats and demonstrate good conduct in order that the driver may concentrate on driving the bus for the safety of all passengers.

If any pupil should refuse to cooperate, the driver has the authority to bar that pupil from riding the bus until the pupil and his parents have reached an agreement on the pupil's future conduct through conference with school officials."

In other actions by the Board, Mrs. Mae Price was contracted to teach in the Elementary School for the 1959-60 school year.

THE SCOOP by Scoop

MURDER—

It is a well known fact that there are lots of screw balls in Austin but the bird—or birds—responsible for putting Rankin in a Class A District that is over 300 miles wide makes even a Looney Bird look brilliant by comparison. With no reflection on the school itself Fabens is almost twice as far away as Van Horn and our sending several bus loads of high school students such distances would be the height of folly.

In the first place it is too long a trip to make in one day in a school bus and then have to play a ball games that will last about two hours. In the second place it is squandering school money to be out the expense of such a trip. In the third place, it is a dangerous road and being as long as it is, adds doubly to the danger of transporting students that far. In the fourth place, parents and fans have a right to see their team play and the kids are entitled to the support of their followers. You could count on your fingers and toes all who could have the time and money to make a trip to Fabens for a football game—even if their own kid was the star of the team. And in the fifth place—if places matter—it's just plain nuts.

Athletics are fine in a school and I for one am probably a little overzealous in their favor but I doubt that the time, money and bother that will go into making a trip to Fabens to play a football game would be spent on sending a science class that far to hear a lecture or visit a laboratory.

And this thing applies not only to football but basketball, girls basketball, field and track events and all the way down to the one-act play. Imagine, if you can, the amount of time and money it is going to take to fill a schedule like that. It's terrible. It stinks and it is worse than nothing.

Better to play outlaw in athletics than have to compete in this thing. We won't likely cut any big swath in our first two years in Class A and maybe—just maybe—the big dogs in Austin could be convinced to make different arrangements after two years.

A circle drawn on a Texas map reaching from Rankin to Fabens.

shows that an equal distance north almost reaches Amarillo—East almost to Fort Worth, and south to below San Antonio. Is it a reasonable thing to go such distances just to participate in contests—especially when better arrangements can be made closer to home? It doesn't seem reasonable—not even practical.

Rankin Schools ought to take all steps necessary to get out of this district and if they all fail—just get out, period.

THE WINNERS—

Here in West Texas nothing stirs the community wide interest like the home team and football. Just why this is true has been debated all over the area with all sorts of explanation—but ture it is. And naturally, everyone likes to see the old home team win.

That brings up an even more interesting debate: What makes a winning team? Year in and year out, certain schools always come up with teams that win. McCamey, and Wink are good examples. Rankin has their share of winners. Van Horn always provides tough competition.

Yet, none of these schools likely have outstanding players year in and year out so there must be another reason for their continually producing good clubs.

For about twenty years now I have had an interest in ball teams of one kind or another and have come to the conclusion that attitude is probably the biggest factor in determining whether a school has good teams or bad. We have all seen ball clubs that had the size, speed and ability to be very good but which never seemed to make much of a showing while on the other hand, a scrubby looking team sometimes is a hard playing group.

Attitude—that's the difference. If a team thinks they can win, it takes some doing to beat them. This, in turn, brings up the question of how a team acquires this "never say die" attitude. A lot of it depends on the players involved and a lot of it likely depends on the coaching.

But a lot of it depends on the fans back of a team. Let the fans get down on a club and it's hard on them to have much confidence in themselves when all they hear is what they do wrong—never what they can do or did do right.

And Rankin is no exception. You can ask any fan what he thinks of our chances in district play and about 90 per cent of them will say: "If we can beat Wink . . ."

Nuts. How in the thunder are we ever to beat Wink if we throw in

EXPLANATIONS OF BRUCELLOSIS GIVEN

By W. M. (Dub) Day, Jr.
County Agent

This week, we will continue our discussion on Type II Brucellosis Control Area—Movement of cattle within a control area—Cattle cannot be moved from one premise to another, except as follows:

Official vaccinates under thirty months of age accompanied by certificates of vaccination and originating in a nonquarantined herd.

All other cattle be negative to the blood test and originate in a non-quarantined herd, except as follows:

Calves under six months of age
Steers and spayed helpers

Cattle consigned to livestock sales under the supervision of the Livestock Sanitary Commission

Cattle consigned to immediate slaughter

Cattle moved by their owner from one pasture to a contiguous pasture also owned or controlled by him.

Cattle destined to points outside the area.

Official vaccinates over 30 months of age that do not react more than incomplete at dilution of 1:200.

Disposition of reactor cattle:

All reactors must be fire-branded with letter "B", reactor tags placed in ear, immediately isolated from other cattle, and sent to slaughter under permit within fifteen days.

In hardship cases reactors may be retained for one year provided:

Reactors are quarantined separate and apart from other cattle.

All cattle on premise are tested at six month intervals, except:

Reactors
Calves under six months of age
Steers and spayed helpers

Official vaccinates under thirty months of age

Animals which have been previously disclosed as reactors to the brucellosis agglutination test may

at request of owner be re-tested by regularly employed United States Department of Agriculture personnel, provided reactors are immediately segregated and request made within 10 days after date of test disclosing reactors. The re-test shall be conducted within 30 days after date of original test and the results conducted within 30 days after date of original test and the results shall be final. The branding, if necessary, shall be accomplished upon receipt of results from the State Federal Brucellosis Laboratory.

REQUIREMENTS FOR AREA RE-CERTIFICATION

All herds that showed infection on the last certifying test, or have shown infection since, will be re-tested;

Twenty per cent of the herds in the area, but not the same herds check in the last re-certifying test, will be tested;

If the combined total number of reactors from the above two categories does not exceed one per cent of the area's cattle or five per cent of the herds, the area will be re-classified.

If more than one per cent of the cattle, but less than two per cent, are found to be reactors, another test will be conducted on the infected herds within 120 days. If at that time the infection rate is down to one per cent of the cattle in five per cent of the herds, the area will be re-classified.

If an area does not qualify for re-certification, it must start over with the methods outlined in Standards For Area Certification.
