# District Championship Crown Will Be Decided Friday Night

Friday night the Rankin Red Devils go for broke. Playing host to the Wink Wildcats in a game that will decide the championship of District 5-B, the Red Devils will be going all out to avenge their rather one-sided loss

in Wildcat land last year when the situation was very similar. Both teams have a 2-0 record for district play and both have beaten the Van Horn Eagles; Rankin by a score of 26-6 and Wink 26-0. Rankin has a 7-3 season record by virtue of the

forfeit by Grandfalls and the win over the Andrews B team last Tuesday night by a 28-20 marker. Wink holds a 6-3 season record. The Wildcats were heavy pre-season favorites to win the district in a breeze while Rankin was not sup-

posed to cut much of a pattern this year. ## Speakers Tell Club Of Russian Travels

Mrs. Tippett was a member of a group of teachers and students sponsored by Texas Christian University of Fort Worth. Her sister is a member of the faculty of the college. They flew to Russia last June.

She gave comparisons of the modes of travel, food, people, churches, dress and laboring conditions of Russia, with these of the United States.

The windows, aisles and all of the walls were filled and lined with people standing. Services were conducted all day long," says Mrs. Tippett.

Mr. Prentice toured Europe with a group of band instructors, studying music and methods of teaching as compared with ours. He lectured and showed films of his travels.

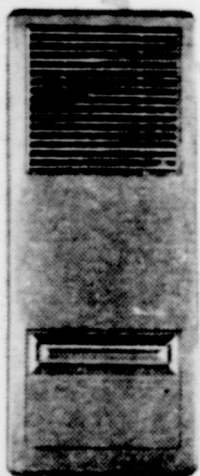
## HOOD, COOK ON HAND FOR PRINCIPALS CONFERENCE

## FOUR FROM RANKIN AT RECENT CONFERENCE

The Science and Math Conference attended by Mr. Dobbs, Mr. Carmichael, Mr. Ted Walker and Mrs. Thersa Hurn in Austin on October 29-31, had several outstanding scientists of the nation to speak on various subjects dealing with the teaching of science and mathematics.

## TIME TO PLANT ROSES

Anyone can grow roses, according to A. F. DeWerth, head of the Department of Floriculture at Texas A&M College. They may be planted in the fall or spring, but in

Texas, fall planting is generally preferred.

Aim for quality and you may also get quantity. More gardeners try to grow too many varieties or too many plants. Given careful attention, Mr. DeWerth says that 10 well chosen varieties will produce as many flowers and give far more pleasure than 50 poorly-tended plants.

Details on selection, soil preparation, pruning and care of roses are given in TAP-1, ROSES FOR TEXAS," written by Mr. DeWerth. We will be glad to send you a copy.

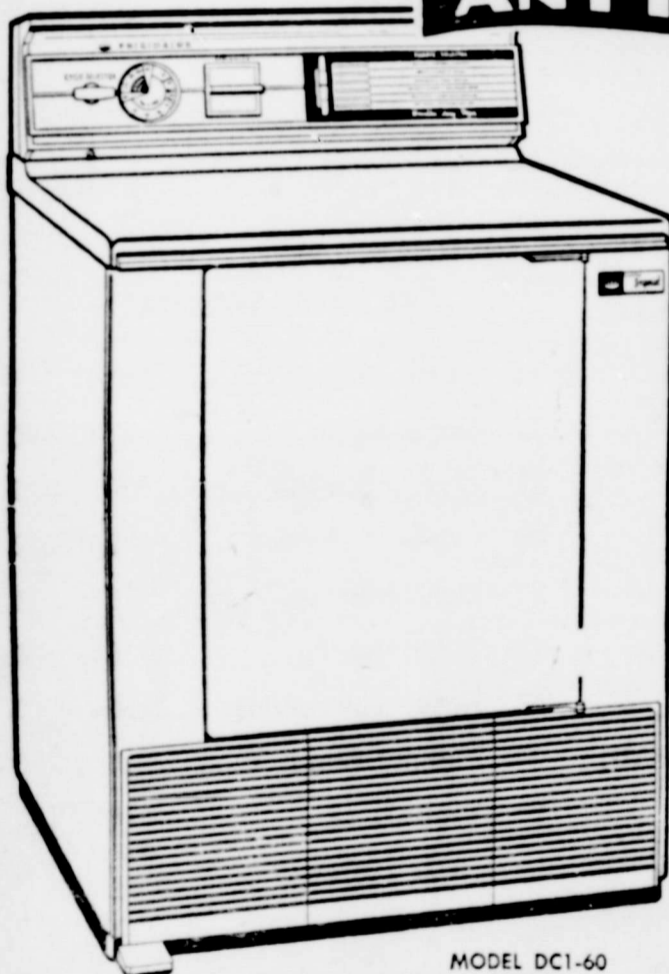

# ERASTUS "DEAF" SMITH

Scout, Soldier and Hero of San Jacinto

In 1821 people did not usually come to the untamed Texas Territory for their health. But one man did just that — Erastus Smith, from New York by way of Natchez. He wandered over the wild frontier country, learned its topography, made friends with Anglos, Mexicans and Indians. He grew strong and well, but never regained his hearing. When Texans began their fight for independence from Mexico, "Deaf" Smith — scout and soldier — took his place with Fannin, Bowie, Travis, Milam, Sam Houston and the other champions of freedom. His best known service to his chosen country was the destruction of Vince's Bridge, just before the battle of San Jacinto. Bridging Vince's Bayou, then in flood, it offered the only means of communication between the Texan and Mexican armies and the remainder of Texas. When Deaf Smith destroyed it, on the morning of April 21, 1836, he effec-

tively isolated the Mexicans from reinforcements and prevented an orderly retreat. The fact that it also isolated the Texans was of no importance to Smith. He and his people would win. They were fighting for liberty and the right to live as they chose.

Today Texans still demand and get their right to choose the way they want to live.
