THE GREAT FALSEHOOD—

Ike is in Paris at a flubbed-up sideshow called a "Summet Meeting"—or was when this column was written. Why in the world the president of the United States would make himself a party of any such farce is hard to see in the first place but even more disgusting is the hang-dog attitude of Ike and those with him toward the Rus-

sians and the rest of the group on hand for the propaganda grinding. Evidentially we are supposed to be in the position of the little boy caught stealing apples and who has just had his bottom busted and is making his first appearance before the crowd. Emarrassed might be the word.

And for what . . . because one of our planes was downed in Russia while on a spy trip. Spying is as old as recorded history. The Bible has a number of good spy stories in it. During the last war it was considered a mark of distinction to be associated with any of the hush-hush boys. Now, all of a sudden, it's a crying shame to be spying.

And one wonders why? Why all of a sudden do we hide our face in shame? About the only reason I can think of is that we have let a few facts get misplaced.

To begin with, the Russians are not now and never have been, noted for their aggressive fighting. In World War I they were kicked all over the place. Somewhere back in history, the Japs almost but them clear out of the navel business. In the thirties, they did have nerve enough to jump on Finland, about as poorly prepared a country as it was possible to find—and the Finns kicked the pants right off them—almost with their naked hands.

At the beginning of World War II, the Russians, under Stalin—a man who was supposed to be extremely vicious—did not take a hand in any of the fighting until it was forced on them. They went into Poland only after Hitler had done the dirty work—and bluffed him into a share of the spoils. At the very last day of the War with Japan, the Russians rushed up to beat the United States out of a goodly lot of loot in Manchuria.

While fighting the Germans, they lost on every turn until there was more pressure in the rear than the German could stand and he had to turn away from the Bear.

At the end of the European fighting, the Russians again rushed up to the counter and demanded the biggest do-nut—which they got and for which we are still paying.

and served hot French Market Do-
ughnuts to a group present for the
Delta Kappa Gamma meeting. The
women wanted the recipe and re-
quested that we put it in the
paper so that they might all have
a copy. So here it is. By the way
they are sometimes called Croqui-
noles. They are the famous trian-
gular shaped doughnuts served at
the French Market in New Orleans.

1/4 Cup Shortening
1/2 cup sugar

1 teaspoon salt
1 cup boiling water
7 1/2 cups flour
1 package yeast
1/2 cup lukewarm water
1 cup evaporated milk
2 eggs

Pour boiling water over shorten-
ing, and salt. Add milk. Dissolve
yeast in the lukewarm water. When
shortening-milk mixture is luke-
warm, add dissolved yeast. Add the
beaten eggs. Stir in four cups of
flour, beat hard. Then add enough
flour to make a soft dough, cover
with waxed paper and a lid and

Fluor Corp. Starts On Sheffield Gas Plant

Representatives of the Fluor Co-
poration and representatives of
the construction locals met in a
pre-job conference on May 10 at
the Lincoln Hotel, Odessa, to dis-
cuss the starting of work on the
gasoline plant south of Sheffield.

Ken Wesson, Labor Relations
representative for Fluor, said the
job would start Monday, May 16,
and is to be completed in Decem-
ber. The job will employ about
200 men at the peak of construc-
tion, and the installation of the
300 tons of pipe will be the larg-
est item.

The main topic of discussion was
the lack of housing facilities near
the job. Bill Vann, Superintendent
of construction in the Los Ange-
les office, said that he and Man-
ual Passmore, project superinten-
dent, had made a tour of the
entire area making a survey of
housing. The possibility of instal-
ling a trailer park near the job
was discussed.

The plant is being built by El
Paso Natural Gas Company.

keep in the refrigerator until ready
for use. When needed roll dough
to 1/4-inch thickness, cut with pas-
try jagger and fry in deep fat at
375-400 degrees. Do not let dough
rise before frying. Drain on ab-
sorbent paper, roll in powdered
sugar. Dough may be kept in the
refrigerator for several days and
used as needed. We have kept it
as much as two weeks in a refrig-
erator that stays very cold.

The French market might not a-
gree with us but we think they
are also good when kept over and
reheated in the oven. The result-
ing product is much more hard and
crisp very much as a French din-
ner roll but we think they are good
that way.

MILLER BUGS—

Having trouble with miller bugs?
Sorry we can't give you a sure fire
way of getting rid of them. That's
one question the entomologists have
not figured out yet. But, you can
probably keep them pretty well out
of your house by picking them
up with the vacuum sweeper each
day and being careful to keep doors
and cracks closed so far as possible.
They leave walls very difficult to
clean and if they are not kept out
it may cost you a paint job.
