Small But Helpful Projects in Sight --

Local Business Prospects Improved for Second Half

Prospects for the second half of '60 looked somewhat brighter for Rankin despite the so-called summer slump that usually characterizes the months of June, July and August businesswise. In an average year, the closing of schools has signified a general slow-down in all phases of activity here.

This year, however, three prospects are in sight that could give the summer months a shot in the arm.

These would include the pipeline work which is just starting and which will see a number of men working out of Rankin. A headquarters for the work has been established at the old Cliff Jones property just South of the Western Company. This work is expected to last for approximately 45 days.

A second item, a road work job that is to start in June, gives ad-

ded promise. Contract was signed last week with The City of Rankin to furnish some 500,000 gallons of water daily for this work, indicating a rather large operation. One section of road to be worked is the Midland Highway from the city limits north to the Upton County line.

Final new prospects for this time will be a volume of school construction, bids for which are to be called for in June. The exact scope of this work has not been defined by the school board but it is expected to be a fairly large job.

Northeast of Rankin, two rigs are now working, others are rumored, a new service station—one of the most elaborate on Highway 67 in this area—is to be built, and if the rainy weather keeps up, there may be some ranch

work taking place.

Businesswise, there is now at least prospects for something better than a summer slump.

Only two voting boxes will be open in the county; one at the courthouse in Rankin and the other at the McCamey School administration office.

Only one race will be up for

voting in Upton County, that of Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals in which Lloyd W. Davidson is opposed by W. T. McDonald.

Little or no interest in the race has developed locally with no absentee ballots having been cast as of Tuesday morning. Absentee balloting lost at midnight, Tuesday.

Dub Day, county agent, has said that all is ready for the All-Kid Rodeo and Quarter Horse Show here next week-end. Day stated that all phases of the event are drawing good entries and that the horse show in particular has promise of being a "dandy".

Upton County has made the headlines all over West Texas—all with a bad smelling flavor—and the press and public barred from hospital board meetings.

And we still have a mess. It's high time—and passed—to bring this cockeyed thing to a screeching halt.

What do certain people want, anyway? They have had everything they asked for. The commissioners court has bent over backwards to try to please "the citizens" of the county. Good men have had their names dragged through the hog wallows of public ridicule. Doctors have been insulted and public money has been

wasted. And still the ones who carry the stick keep on prodding. Why? For what purpose causes grown people to act like the kids in the neighborhood block fussing over who gets to bat first in a scrub game of baseball?

Now an outsider from Austin has been called in to give his two-bit opinion and he says the whole mess is illegal. Well, I say nuts to him.
