## L. G. Arledge Services Held Here Sept. 26th

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church in Rankin on Monday, September 26 for Leonard George Arledge. Arledge died at 6:00 a.m. at the Memorial Hospital in Alpine on September 23. He had been in poor health for several years, especially the last two or three years when he had been ill many times. Death followed an illness that began as he worked on a job for the W. E. "Billy" Rankin Company at Marathon.

He was born December 12, 1912 in Beukiss, Lee County, Texas. He moved with his parents to Rochelle in 1919 where he lived until 1936. On March 21, 1934, he married Miss Oma Belle Kemnitz at Placid, Texas and in 1936, they moved to Sheffield where he did ranch and maintenance work.

The family moved to Rankin in 1953 where he worked in the construction and dirt moving business. He was a member of the First Christian Church of Rochelle.

Arledge is survived by his wife, one son, Wayne of Abilene, one daughter, Mrs. Betty Jo Chandler of Rankin, one granddaughter, his father, O. M. Arledge of Brady, a brother, W. T. Arledge of Austin, and two sisters, Mrs. H. E. Crawford of Brady, and Mrs. J. D. Brooks of Odessa.

Burial was in the Rochelle cemetery.

Mrs. Lynn McAden's father, B. A. Raymer, of Coleman, passed away September 20 at 2:00 p.m. in Overall Hospital in Coleman. He had been a resident of Coleman County since 1909 and has resided in the Voss Community until the fall of 1959 when he moved to Coleman because of his health.

Mr. Raymer was a stock farmer and owned his home in Voss until he had to sell his property, being unable to operate the farm and ranch due to his health. He reared his family in the community.

He was a long-time Methodist, serving as an official in the Voss church for 51 years. He was often the delegate representing his church to the annual district conferences held over this period of years.

Mr. Raymer was also a long-time member of the Masonic Lodge, Number 1001, of Voss. He was very faithful to his church and the lodge and gave his support to these institutions until the time of his death. He was also active in civic and community interests of that part of the state.

## Local Duffer Gets Rare Hole-In-One

Leo Tieman, the leading south-paw golfer of the Rankin Golf Club, scored a hole-in-one last Sunday afternoon, October 2. This is believed to have been the first and only ace made on the local course since its installation some eight years ago.

Tieman, playing with Ed Welch, Noble Harkrider, Dub Gregg, L. Z. Tittsworth and J. B. Hutchens, got his Eagle on the Par 3 No. 7 hole which measures 179 yards. He was using a 5 iron and this was his first hole-in-one in his four year of golf play.

Needless to say, he won the hole and shot a 37 for the nine-hole match. His playing companions all agreed that it was bad enough to have to cope with a hole-in-one but it was just plain embarrassing when it was done left-handed.

Tieman will now be eligible to have his name recorded in an exclusive listing of golfers from all over the US who score holes-in-one during the year. He will also be eligible to receive several small prizes and mementoes from various sporting goods houses.

# THE SCOOP by Scoop

## THE PLATFORM—

Last week the two candidates—Republican and Democrat—for President, appeared on a nationwide TV debate. Most of those who have commented on this "show" were unimpressed by either or by the facts brought out—it was all common knowledge beforehand.

I was impressed, however, by Mr. Kennedy and his sincerity. He never once dodged the question of what his feelings were toward the socialistic platform now being offered under the name of the Democratic party. He was most firm in his statements that he would do his level best if elected to put into action all of the many promises made under this platform to first one group and then another. I believe the debates were of considerable worth to those who have been undecided on how they want to vote.

Do you want socialism as rapidly as possible—whole hog or none—or do you prefer to move into it slowly with at least a bridge or two left standing across which we might at some later date turn and retreat? Shall we move into a society where there is little hope left to ever make a million or do we prefer to leave the possibility open even though 99.9 per cent of us will never make it? Do we prefer a nation where the individual is relieved of all responsibility except paying taxes or are we willing to take the risks involved to say that we made whatever we have on our own hook? Must we have a society in which the lazy can live off the industrious? Do you want to support your own family plus a foreign relation or two plus an even greater bunch of government planners, plus every bum in the nation?

Do you want your schools run by directives from Washington? Do you prefer the membership of your clubs and organizations forced open to one and all? Do you want a federal agency that has the power to take your children from you and raise them for you? (This is not a joke—it's actually in the platform.) Do you want to be forced to contribute to insurance plans devised by Washington plan-

ners? Do you want a handout?

Do you want to be an individual or just one in a group?

These ideas or not mine. They are all included in the Democratic platform drawn up by those who have taken over control of the party and call themselves Democrats.

This is the choice and it has been laid out clear and clean.

## THE PLAN—

If Mr. Kennedy and Mr. Lyndon B. are elected to office in November, I have a plan whereby the little newspapers of the nation will no longer have to print a newspaper with one hand and fight off bill collectors with the other. We will organize.

As the matter now stands, we are just a bunch of individuals—each doing the best he can to get along. Whenever we organize and get together, we will be a special group and according to Mr. Kennedy and Mr. Johnson, groups—whether they're labor, farmers, or what have you, are important.

As Allen Shivers said: "We've had some of their taking care of" and it ought to be clear by now to Texans that LBJ is for LBJ—all the way.

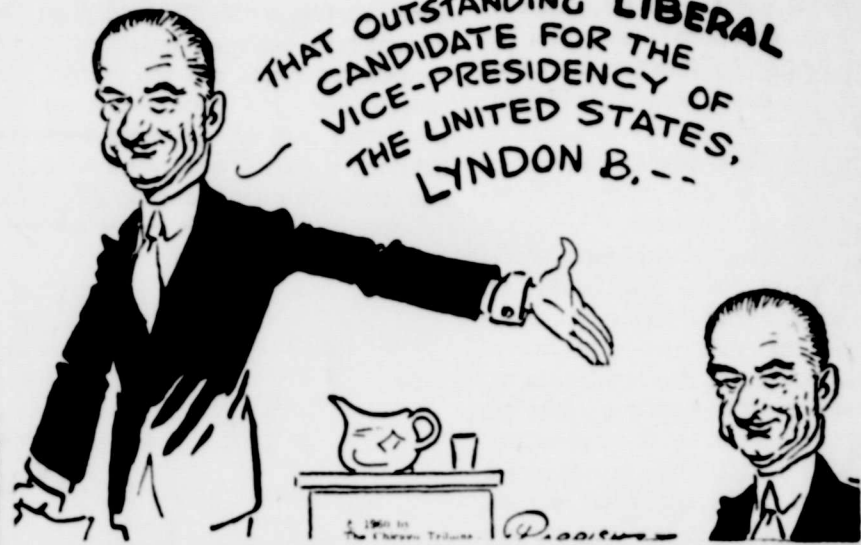

## Statistical Reports Available On Sheep And Wool Trends

If you are in any phase of sheep and wool production and marketing, there are sure to be some statistical reports of the Agricultural Marketing Service that will be of interest and value to you.

Perhaps you have questions like these: How many sheep and lambs are on farms? How many lambs were saved from this year's lamb crop? Where are they raised? How many animals were slaughtered?

These questions are typical of those asked by farmers, marketing agencies, meat packers, cold storage firms and others.

If you are a farmer, you will be interested in the January 1 inventories of all sheep and lambs and their value for each state; number of sheep and lambs on feed; number of lambs saved, number of sheep shorn and pounds of wool produced. There also is an annual report on inshipments, on farm slaughter, deaths, marketing, cash receipts, gross income, and value of home consumed mutton and lambs, by states. Reports are released in the Spring on the early lamb crop in the important early states. Prices received by farmers for sheep, lamb and wool are reported each month.

If you are a processor, the report will give you statistics on the number and live weight of sheep and lambs slaughtered in each state. Also, for the United States, cold storage holdings of mutton and lambs, and pounds of wool pulled are issued.

The vast amount of statistical information shown in these reports comes from the farmers and ranchers themselves, as well as
