TO DISCUSS RANKIN'S NEEDS --

## Second Public Meeting Scheduled Monday Night

On Monday night, November 28, the Rankin Board of City Development will hold the second in a series of public meetings at which plans and discussions on working toward economic and civic improvements in Rankin will be discussed.

Time for the meeting has been scheduled for 7:30 at the Elementary School auditorium. Mr. Earl Kerr, manager of the Retail Merchant's Association of Lubbock is to give a brief talk after which a town-hall type meeting will be opened to participation by those

present.

Purpose of these meetings is for the local citizens to get together and discuss the problems facing Rankin and to discuss ways and means of working toward their solution. All ideas and remarks are welcomed.

Special invitations have been issued to the Rankin Lions Club, the Rankin Study Club, the P-TA and all other local civic organizations as well as the general public to attend this meeting.

At a similar meeting of this type held earlier this month, some 30 area residents were on hand and partial plans were made and discussed. The BCD feels that still more people need to be heard on this matter since it is of prime importance to the community as a whole.

"We need the thinking of as many people as possible on this matter of trying to make Rankin into the type of town we all want and to secure the civic improvements that a majority of folks feel we need," J. L. Manry, Jr., president of the BCD has stated.

"If you will lend us your help we have a mighty good chance of making progress here," he said.

He further pointed out that all area residents will be welcome to attend, not just business men or property owners since this is a community project.

"We wish to extend a special welcome to the people living in the community, especially those of the surrounding camps, to come and join," he said.

Several have expressed the desire for the club to purchase a reloading tool that will handle every type of shell so that the cost of practice will be economical. 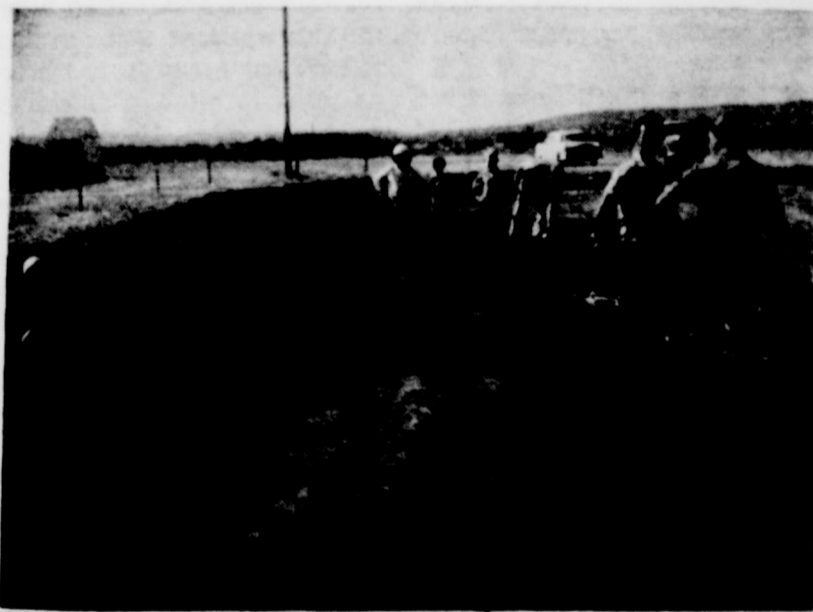

# THE SCOOP by Scoop

## EQUALIZING—

By now everyone has heard that the Rankin Board of City Development has been taking suggestions from citizens on what is needed to improve Rankin. So far one of the things most frequently suggested has been more adult recreation.

Now there is a tough one. What is adult recreation?

Some like to rope calves, some like to golf, some like to run the go-karts, some like to play pool, some like to knit, and on and on you could go but would you have answered the question of what constitutes adult recreation?

Among the suggestions that have been made for this type of recreation is a bowling alley. Well, it is said that such things cost from \$30,000 and up and that it costs an average of \$3.00 per person to have an afternoon of bowling. It would be nice if we had a bowling place but it definitely would not solve the adult recreation quest for there are those who could not afford it, those who would be too old and those who would not care for bowling if it was available.

Others have said that Rankin is too far from lakes which would offer boating and fishing but, then again, that would not satisfy the recreational problems of all adults since not everyone cares to fish or boat.

That question needs a lot of study and a lot of folks will need to make up their minds as to what constitutes adult recreation.

Rankin has about as much to offer as anywhere else along this line when you consider the matter in its proper light. Take as an example a city approximately the size of San Angelo with a population of around 50,000—about 25 times as large as Rankin.

Aside from the fact that San Angelo is located on rivers that have been made into lakes,—which is something that Rankin cannot do much about—Rankin offers more facilities per person than a larger town.

No? Well a city the size of San Angelo would have to have 25

swimming pools to compete with the facilities offered in Rankin. They would have to have 50 baseball parks, 25 municipal golf courses, 25 go-kart tracks and rodeo arenas, 25 youth centers, a public park building 25 times as large as Rankin's, 125 churches with at least 125 ministers, some 150 civic clubs and societies, 50 tennis courts, a school system 25 times as large as Rankin's.

Their post office would have to be 25 times larger than ours and have 100 employees to offer the same accommodations. Their city hall would need to be 25 times as large as ours with 75 employees to offer the service available to Rankin citizens. Their fire department would need 50 trucks and about 800 firemen to offer the protection we have. Their police department would need some 150 officers and their county facilities would need to be 25 times greater than ours.

You could go on and on. The fact is, Rankin has a fine base of civic facilities on which to build a mighty nice community and if I was trying to figure out the one thing that would provide more adult recreation, I'd say it would be for the adults to take a more active part in the things that are available to them. We have study clubs, we have social clubs, we have home demonstration clubs, we have church organizations, P-TA groups, dance clubs, roping clubs, golf clubs, ceramic clubs—even poker clubs—just to mention some.

Surley, in all of this there ought to be a place for everyone who is looking for something to do. And if you haven't tried joining one of these groups and working with them you can't truthfully say whether you would like it or not can you?

Next Monday night, the Rankin BCD has scheduled a public meeting for the purpose of hearing from the citizens of the community. Why not start out by attending this meeting? You don't have to have any earth-shattering ideas or plans in mind. You can just come and listen. If you do have

a thing or two you'd like to say, feel free to do so or get someone else to bring it up for you if you don't want to make a speech.

Let's get the ball rolling and see where it bounces.

## ROADS—

Right at the present time, Rankin is enjoying a road building boom. Roads to the north, east and west are being improved and overhauled. The Midland road is of particular interest when you ask yourself why the State is apparently giving so much attention to a road that heretofore was little more than a farm-to-market road. When this job is finished, the Midland Highway will be one of the best roads in this area.

Could it be that the State is convinced that a heavy flow of traffic from north to south is in the prospect for the future. It is not hard to speculate that Highway engineers have figured out that such will be the case and about the only reason that would seem to make this true is the plan to build the huge dam near Del Rio.

If such is the case, and a lot of folks feel it is, then Upton

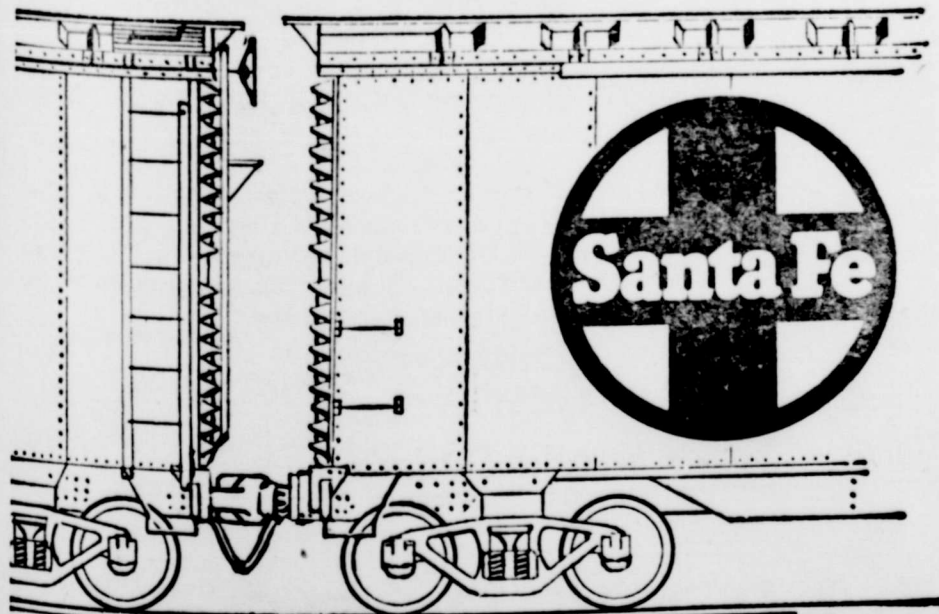

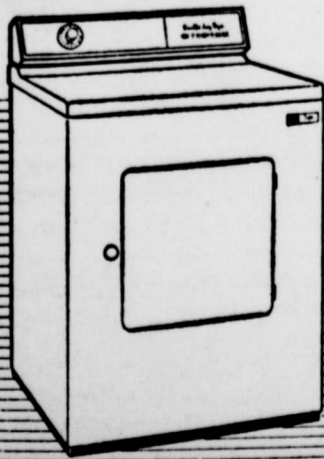

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
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
