County Agent Believes Rankin Ideal Tomato Growing Area

is ideally situated for "hot-house tomatoes", so County Agent Dub Day is a fair-sized experiment that tends to prove his

his experiment last year. He tested five different varieties of hot-house plants. This year,

he has settled for a Michigan-Ohio Hybrid — a special greenhouse tomato, and an experimental species from Texas A & College on which he is testing.

Using a frame structure 46 x 21 feet and covered with plastic, Day has 200 plants now growing. He planted the seed on the last day

of July, made the transplant on September 1, had the first fruit set on on September 20 and on November 20, picked the first ripe tomato. He estimates that each vine will produce approximately 15 pounds of vine-ripe tomatoes during the 120 days they are expected to bear. During the main part of the season—just about now—the 200 vines yield an average of 2 bushels per day of ripe fruit with each tomato averaging a little over 1/4 lbs. in weight.

To prepare the ground, the agent used 6 inches of cotton seed burrs and 2 inches of chicken-house guano as fertilizer. He has two heaters in the structure and irrigates from a garden hose. He has had to water only three times since the plants were set out and his gas bill has also been relatively light since the sun provides most of the heat needed.

Day says he believes such a venture could be developed into a highly successful financial undertaking in this area since the climate is more ideally suited than would be areas which have high humidity that would cause disease in the plants. He feels that one individual could work about 10 greenhouses the size of the present one he has in use.

"In speaking of an industry for Rankin, this might be well worth looking into," Day said.

RESULTS GIVEN ON FLUSH FEEDING WITH COTTONSEED MEAL & PELLETS

In a progress report just released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Sonora, the advantage of flush feeding of range ewes at breeding time is still somewhat in question.

In the 1959-60 trials, there were seven ranchmen that worked with the station in setting up this demonstration of flushing ewes at breeding time. These demonstrations were in Kerr, Glasscock, Pe-

cos and McCulloch counties.

In Pecos county, Mr. Phillip Robbins was the demonstrator. The date of the enitial records was 9-11-59; date of final record, 4-28-60; started on feeding 9-25-59; close of feeding was 11-20-59. The rams were turned in 10-17-59. Age of the ewes was 50 percent yearlings, 50 percent aged. Condition of pasture: dry. Method of flush feeding: cottonseed meal. The following data is from the Robbins ranch:

In four of the seven trials, the increase in lamb crop for flushed ewes ranged from 13.9 to 26.7 percent, but in three of the trials, the lamb crop was decreased from 4.1 to 9.3 percent. The average lamb crop for the flushed ewes

was 94.94 percent and for those not flushed, 87.43 percent.

A six to seven percent increase in lamb crop was required to offset feed cost for flushing.

This report is in the County Agent's Office and your are welcome to study it at any time.


