Windbreaks Save 'Miss Scanty Suit' Vegetable Garden On High Plains

A good windbreak is an answer to the problem. Sadie Hatfield, exist for Texas A. & M. College, says that a windbreak on the two sides of the house from which the most destructive winds blow will pay dividends in more ways than one. They add to the beauty of the home and protect livestock and poultry from hard winds, as well as cut down on the destruction of gardens. The occasional thinnings which are necessary will furnish wood for fuel

r construction. Plant the windbreak 75 to 100 feet from the house. That's to keep it from cutting off cool summer breezes. Miss Hatfield says that in the southern part of the state, athel, native pine and other native trees make good windbreaks. In the Pandhandle and Great Plains counry, the western yellow pine, Chinese edars and apricots or other seeding ruits, are among the many varietie ch will help break the strength of the wind.
