### The Bible

Do you ever stop to think when you pick up the Bible, that you are handling the greatest and dearest book ever presented to mankind—a volume for which people have been stoned, beaten, unmercifully tortured, and even killed, to insure its preservation?

Yet nowhere within the pages of Holy Writ can we find the word "Bible," this word being a translation of the Greek "biblos," meaning "a group of books." Because of the extreme importance attached to the Holy Scriptures, the volume has been called "The Book" or "The Bible." However, within the pages of inspiration there are many titles ascribed to "The Book." In Psalms 119:105 it is called, "A LAMP unto my feet and a LIGHT unto my path." James calls the Word of God a "Mirror" (Jas. 1:23-25), pronouncing a blessing upon the one who "looks into the Perfect LAW of LIBERTY and continues therein." In Jeremiah 23:29 we read that it is "Like a FIRE and a HAMMER," showing the destructive and constructive qualities of the Word to man. Paul calls it a "SWORD" (Eph. 6:17) and "Sharper than any two-edged sword" (Heb. 4:13). In the parable of the sower in Luke 8:11, Jesus calls it the "SEED" which when planted in good and honest hearts brings forth fruit. In other places it is called "Scripture," "Oracles," "precepts," "Living Oracle." It is therefore proper to speak of God's word in any of these terms, but the title designated by man is "The Bible."

How much bigger speculation do you want than that? Remember, this land will not eat you up in taxes, as by the constitution, taxes are \$2.40 on 640 acres.

TITLES GUARANTEED!  
\$100 cash will secure you a section and you can pay the balance in four months when you get your patent. Don't delay if you want to join the party in a big speculation. Don't carelessly read this and throw it away, but think about it and see if you know anything better. Maps, circulars, etc., showing locations free. Call on or address:  
Then followed the name and address of the land company, doing the advertising.

The above advertisement was probably an exaggeration of conditions existing at that time, and, in all probability the prophecy was fulfilled and will not be so hard for some of our Frionians to believe to believe as compared with conditions locally within the past few years.

I had hoped to be able to quote one or two more clippings, but my time and space are both used up. What this column may contain next week, is as yet unknown, unless foreordination is a fact. But I shall try to see to it that there shall be nothing to harm anyone.

## Texas 4-H Girls Set New Records For Work in '47

COLLEGE STATION, Feb. 10.—More than 59,588 girls were enrolled in 1947 in 2,701 girls' 4-H clubs in Texas. And each one of them worked on a demonstration which would be a progressive, practical example of better homemaking," Lorene Stevens reports.

Miss Stevens, girls' 4-H club leader of Texas A & M College, says the demonstrations selected by the girls varied according to their individual tastes, and included such projects as clothing, production, preparation and preservation of foods; beautification of home grounds; home management, home furnishings and room improvements; health, child care, home industry, arts and crafts, and junior leadership. Miss Stevens' annual report shows some outstanding totals, and that apparently the homemaking demonstrations were the most popular. More than 25,000 girls conserved 1,261,000 quarts of food; 38,528 made and re-made more than 150,000 garments; 29,436 prepared and served 1,850,000 meals; and 10,042 were interested in home industry, arts and crafts. Gardening, poultry and home improvement demonstrations ranked next in number of girls enrolled.

The training of future leaders is an important part of the girls' 4-H club work, Miss Stevens says. More than 2,700 girls were trained to serve in positions of leadership in their clubs and communities, while more than 3,000 training meetings were held over the state. On the fun side of the picture, there were 198 county and district-wide 4-H girls' camps held during the summer months and more than 6,000 girls attended.

"Through the encouragement and voluntary assistance of parents, adult leaders, older club girls, local school systems and civic organizations, the 4-H club girls of Texas were able to accomplish outstanding results in 1947," Miss Stevens says. "They look forward to an even better year in 1948."

Boys doing the best job with their chicks will receive prizes, furnished by the Sears Foundation. The club boys will pay back to the Sears Foundation, one third of the initial value of the chicks, when he makes his final sale of cockles. Contest is open to all 4-H club boys in Parmer County."

Up to February 1, 1948, the Tax Collector for the Friona Independent School District had collected the sum of \$69,929.13, which is 97.27 percent of the 1947 tax roll of \$71,686.77.

Delinquent tax that is collectable, is the lowest in the history of the District, being \$2,056.61, for 1925 through 1946. This low figure will be reduced considerably when the proceeds of the recent tax sale are finally completed.

### 2 Escape Injury In Crash Near Friona Yesterday

Two Ohio youths narrowly escaped serious injury yesterday morning a mile east of Friona on Highway 60 when their car, a 1947 Studebaker convertible coupe, crashed into a highway culvert.

Driver of the car was Paul P. Huffman, 24, and his companion was Paul Edwards, 22. Both gave their address as Columbus, Ohio. Huffman was admitted to the Deaf Smith County hospital in Hereford Wednesday morning and was discharged after receiving emergency treatment for minor injuries. Huffman told highway patrolmen that he had fallen asleep at the wheel, and waked just in time to see the culvert ahead. He attempted to swerve the car back on the highway, but crashed into the concrete culvert. The car was badly damaged.

The accident occurred about 5 a. m. on Wednesday morning. Huffman and Edwards were picked up by an east-bound bus and taken to Hereford to the hospital. Both were suffering slightly from exposure in the blizzard which swept the area yesterday.

## FARM NEWS

Four cars of 20 per cent Superphosphate are being unloaded in Parmer County this week. Producers are receiving this fertilizer under the Purchase Order Plan whereby the farmer agrees to apply it to permanent pasture or alfalfa and PMA pays the majority of the initial cost.

We have orders for three more cars of phosphate which will also be delivered this month under the same program. It has been proven that Plains areas need something besides water to maintain fertility and this program is designed to introduce the use of modern fertilizers.

Now we have something besides the weather to talk about. We can discuss the price of wheat.

The first Parmer County 1947 conservation program payments were received the first of this week. Applications are sent to the state office where they are processed and mailed to the Disbursing Office at Dallas. Checks are mailed directly to the farmers from there.

The first group of payments received totaled over \$45,900 but don't be alarmed if your payment has not been made. The balance of the payments is expected in the near future.

We received 100 pounds of Love Grass Seed this week for sale to our local farmers. Most of this amount was sold before the seed was shipped. In view of the shortage of this seed and the large demand, farmers are advised to order now. If we can receive requests for as much as 100 pounds, we can deliver it to the farmer at a savings to him.

### Epidemic of Rust In Wheat Fields Forecast By A&M

COLLEGE STATION, Feb. 7.—The stage is all set for a severe epidemic of stem rust—or black rust—in the wheat country next spring. That's the warning from the agronomists and plant pathologists of Texas A. & M. College and USDA's Bureau of Plant Industry.

It all depends on the principal actors—the rust spores and the right weather. The combination of wheat germinating so late on the High Plains, together with the large acreage of earlier wheat in the Rolling Plains areas east of the Caprock, makes a favorable situation for the development of stem rust on late wheat if the spores develop sufficiently on the early planted wheat. Nothing can be done about the weather, of course, but the situation can be greatly aggravated by the planting of stem rust susceptible varieties of spring wheat and barley, the specialists say, as such varieties

would make prolific sources of stem rust spores, which in turn might affect wheat farther north, as none of the hard red winter wheat varieties are immune to stem rust. Agronomists recommend planting of oats in place of spring wheat or barley. They say the yields of spring planted oats are much more certain in Texas than either spring wheat or barley and stem rust of oats does not affect wheat. Varieties of oats such as Fultex, Kanota, New Nor-tex or Ferguson 922 are good selections. The specialists point out that in view of the great need for a bumper wheat crop in 1948, every possible precaution should be taken to reduce the possibility of a stem rust epidemic.

Insured fire losses for 1947 total \$20,903,000. This does not include uninsured losses, the Commissioner advised. "These deplorable losses are growing more alarming every day," he said. "The only way to combat this useless loss of life, property, resources, man hours and resultant higher cost of living is for each

Texas to assume an individual responsibility in seeing that fire hazards are removed. At least 90 per cent of our fires are due to carelessness." Over half of our fires have been in homes. The condition is especially grave in the face of the housing shortage. Matches and cigarettes were the

number one cause of fires in 1947. Electricity was the next greatest cause with trash and rubbish third. The fourth most frequent cause was kerosene and fifth gas stoves. Hall said gasoline and kerosene fires are on the increase as well as heating equipment fires, such as gas, oil and kerosene stoves and heaters; chimneys, and water heaters.

### Texas Fire Loss High and Costly In '47 Says Hall

AUSTIN, Feb. 7.—Fire burned to death 541 people and destroyed nearly 21 million dollars in Texas in 1947, today reported Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner. "Even these unbelievably high figures are not complete," Hall declared. "The monetary loss is already three million dollars higher than losses for any one year in the history of our state." Deaths from fire also threaten to break all records, he believes. A few death reports are still coming in. Loss of life in the Texas City disaster is not included in the above figure.



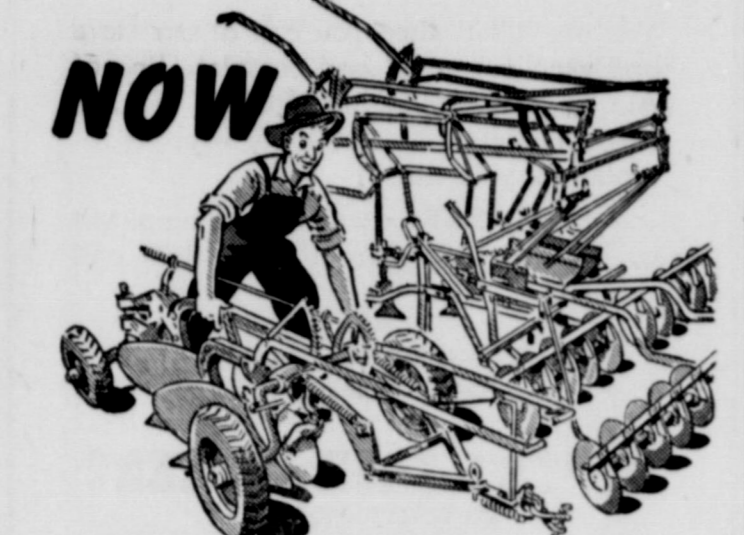

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### Advice on Care Of Pot Plants During Winter

COLLEGE STATION, Feb. 10 -- Many homemakers have had trouble in keeping house plants in good condition through the winter months. Sadie Hatfield, extension specialist in landscape gardening of Texas A. & M. College, says that the trouble is usually caused by too much or not enough care.

A good potted cyclamen, Miss Hatfield says, will bloom for several months if kept at a temperature of 65 to 68 degrees where it can get morning light. Never allow the soil to dry out completely while it is

### Home Freezing of Food on Increase In Texas Areas

COLLEGE STATION, Feb. 9 -- The freezing of home-grown products is becoming more and more important in the food picture of

blooming, but when it starts to lose leaves, let the soil dry and then store the plant in a cool, dark damp place to carry it over a second season.

A begonia needs full light from windows during the winter months. The everblooming begonia will bloom through the entire year, even in warm rooms with dry air. Primroses need much light in winter and do best at about 65 degrees. Too much watering rots them, but do not allow the soil to dry out. The Jerusalem cherry and ornamental pepper like cool temperatures, too, as well as moist air and plenty of sunshine. Smoke or gas in the room will cause the leaves to drop.

Azaleas last much longer if kept in a cool moist air during the day, and thrive best at a temperature of 50 to 60 degrees. A moderate amount of water is necessary. The soil needs to be kept acid and if the leaves start to turn yellowish green, dissolve one teaspoon of alum to a gallon of water, Miss Hatfield says.

African violets need a sunny window during the middle of winter, but can be put in the shade about the last of February. Let the soil dry before watering, then use water several degrees warmer than room temperature. Miss Hatfield points out that care should be taken in watering african violets to be sure that no water gets on the leaves.

Texas families.

In his annual report, Roy W. Snyder, extension meat specialist of Texas A. & M. College, says there are 515 frozen food locker plants operating in Texas, and approximately 15 more are under construction, an increase of 112 plants in 1947, the biggest jump in any single year since the freezing of food became popular in 1939.

About a half of the plants have killing facilities, Snyder says, and can give complete service in killing, cutting, rendering lard, and making sausage as well as in the packaging and freezing of all kinds of food products. The locker plants are uniformly distributed, with the greatest number found in the north-central part of the state.

More home freezer units were available in 1947 than in previous years, Snyder says, and county extension agents have reported that 9,877 home units were bought in 192 counties. More than 61,000 families in 197 counties were given assistance with the freezing of food for their home use.

Meetings at which demonstrations on the preparation of meats, fruits and vegetables for freezing, and frozen food problems, were discussed were attended by 7,937 people in the state during the year, Snyder reports.

More and more people are realizing that frozen food lockers are not luxuries, but a good investment which can contribute toward the family's balanced home food supply, Snyder's report ends.

### Ranchers Warned To Watch Cattle For Disease

LUBBOCK, Feb. 9 -- Any rancher or dairyman whose cattle evidence symptoms of hoof and mouth disease should call a veterinarian immediately, according to Dr. F. G. Harbaugh, veterinarian at Texas Technological College.

"I am not trying to frighten people," Dr. Harbaugh stated, "but it is entirely possible that the disease may spread unexpectedly from to Texas despite all efforts to prevent it. And if it should, no useful purpose would be served by trying to hide diseased animals. They should be killed and properly disposed of."

Symptoms listed by the professor are blisters around the mouth, accompanied by slobbering, or blisters on the udder or hoof. All symptoms are not necessarily present in any single diseased animal.

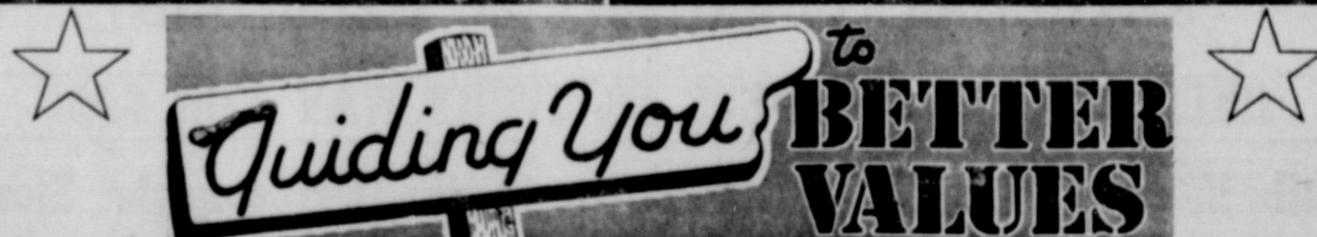
