teachers' salaries. In addition, administrative salaries will amount to about \$23,800.00 while other salary expenses will be \$3,700 for health service, \$11,800.00 for pupil transportation salaries, plus \$2,000.00 to be paid for contracted pupil transportation.

Operation of plant salaries are to amount to \$18,500.00, maintenance of plant salaries, \$5,100.00 and \$3,300.00 for food service salaries.

This gives an approximate grand total of all salaries paid by the District of \$304,360.00, making the Rankin Independent School District one of the largest employers in Rankin.

Second largest item in the budget will be debt service which is to cost the school \$103,000.00 for the coming year. Capital outlay has been set at \$10,000 while \$4-000.00 will be paid out for outgoing transfers, primarily for the Negro students attending the Mc-

Camey schools.

This budget is approximately the same as last year's with the exception of an increase in teachers' salaries made necessary in party increment pay increases and mostly by the increase voted by the Texas Legislature which amounted to some 20,000.00 additional for the Rankin District.


