Civil Defense Study To Be Offered Locally

RANKINITES ENJOY BENEFITS OF COOL SNAP

Rankinites had a new spring in their step Wednesday a.m. as they sipped their lemonade and enjoyed a nice, cool 8 degrees above zero.

The swimming pool was closed for the day.

Monday it registered near 80.

Program is now being worked out to put it in action here. The first step will be a meeting for the public on Thursday, January 25. This meeting will be open to all interested persons and will be held primarily to determine whether or not the local citizens want an education program on Civil Defense.

Rankin Schools will send two teachers to an area meeting in Fort Stockton in early February where they will take some eighteen hours of Civil Defense instruction under the Texas Education Agency program. They, in turn—and if the local citizens indicate that they so desire—will hold a Defense course in Rankin in the early part of the spring.

"We believe that this program is the most sensible one offered on Civil Defense," Mayor J. B. Pettit said this week. "We are not trying to force a study of Defense on anyone but want to make a sound and reasonable study available if the people want it—That is the sole object of the January 25 meeting—to see if the citizens want to study Civil Defense," he said.

SALARIES SET

As is their custom on the first meeting of the year, the Upton County Commissioners Court last Tuesday set the annual salaries for all County office holders and employees at the same basis as 1961 with the exception of the two librarians in which case an adjustment from \$3300 per year to \$3600 per year was made. They further set all J. P. salaries at \$250 per month with the exception of one in McCamey which was set at \$1 per month.

The court also authorized a salary of \$300 per month for a secretary for offices of Home Demonstration, County Agent, County Treasurer and Auditor.

West Texas Utilities Co. Makes Personnel Changes

E. L. Edgar, serviceman for West Texas Utilities Company in Rankin since 1948, assumed his duties as local manager on January 1. He succeeded Fred W. Welling, who retired from active service with the Company on the first of the year. The announcement was made by District Manager W. K. Ramsey of McCamey.

The new local manager was employed by WTU in January, 1948 in the service department in Eldorado and was transferred to Rankin in March. He has served as a company serviceman here for the past thirteen years.

Born in Wellington, Texas in 1926 he worked as a grocery boy while attending high school and

was graduated from Vernon High School in 1944. He was employed as a clerk in the men's department at Montgomery Ward Company before joining the Armed Forces in 1945 for service in World War II. Edgar served in Leyte and the

electric service for the customers. He was also in charge of both the water system and gas system from 1924 until 1930.

When WTU sold the utilities properties in the Panhandle to Southwestern Public Service Company, Welling was transferred to Rankin where he has served as local manager for the past fifteen years.

Born in Breese, Illinois in 1895, he came to Texas early in life and worked for the old XIT Ranch in the Panhandle. He serv-

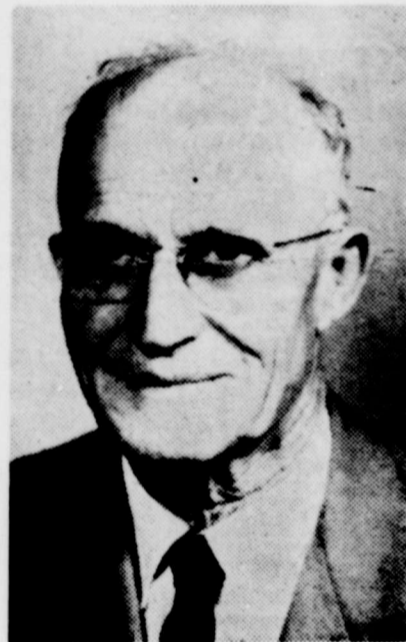
South Pacific in the Ordnance Department and was discharged in December, 1946.

WELLING IS A 39-YEAR VETERAN—

Fred Welling will close a 39-year career with West Texas Utilities Company under the Company's retirement plan. It was almost four decades ago when he was employed in 1922 as a power plant operator in Texline, Texas. In 1924 he was promoted to chief engineer and local manager in Texline. At that time there was no transmission line service in Texline and Welling operated the diesel plant in Texline to provide

FOREMAN GIVES SUPPORT ON RACE CONGRESS

Conservative businessman and out-

spoken candidate, Ed Forman, announced his candidacy for U. S. House of Representatives in West Texas' 16th Congressional District.

Forman said he is running because of a strong belief in a principle of conservative government—that preserves individual freedom for the people.

Forman said he is running as a Republican and will seek that nomination in the May 5 primary. He challenges incumbent J. T. (Slick) Rutherford.

Forman: "After having served the 16th Congressional District extensively in the past and personally visiting with many of West Texans, I am convinced that a majority of the people want conservative representation in Washington, D. C.

Forman has not had conservative opposition by the present incumbent who has generally followed the dictates of the liberal majority."

the Navy, Foreman returned to Odessa to help establish an oil-well drilling fluids company. At 28, Foreman is an officer with 4 oil industry-related firms.

Active in civic affairs, Foreman is chairman of the Ector County Heart Association and is a director of the Odessa Chamber of Commerce. He is also a member of the Crane, Andrews and Fort Stockton Chambers.

He was named Boss of the Year by the Howdy Pardner Chapter of the American Business Women's Association, Odessa, in 1961.

Foreman is a member of several Odessa Chamber committees, the Odessa Chuck Wagon Gang and several professional associations.

He resides with his wife, Barbara, and their two children, Kirk, 5, and Rebecca, 2, at 1413 Emerald. They attend the Highland Methodist Church where Foreman is a member of the Board of Stewards.

"I am an American first, a conservative second and a Republican third," Foreman said.

"I am a conservative because I am for progress and because I believe in conserving for the individual his rights, liberty and freedom.

"I am a conservative because I believe in limited federal government, states rights, government economy, sound money and private enterprise. These policies of individual initiative and opportunity have made America a great nation," Foreman said.

Foreman said he a Republican because the Republican Party "is the most effective political movement today dedicated to preservation of Constitutional principles which protect individuals from government.

"Our present congressman is the man who voted for packing the House Rules Committee, even though he had assured West Texas as he would stand strong against it. This helped open the gate for house approval of President Kennedy's legislation," Foreman said.

"He helped the Kennedy Administration push through a \$5.6 billion housing and urban renewal

bill, extension of unemployment compensation and liberal social security amendments.

"The incumbent voted for federal electric generating power expansion and for a larger government role in public works."

Foreman said he was opposed to all of these measures.

"I pledge to give the people of West Texas strong conservative representation, independent of political pressure dictates of the administration. As your congressional representative, I will continually fight for sound, conservative government and freedom for the individual."

Foreman strongly criticized the "liberals' idea" that problems can be solved by "throwing money at them." He expressed complete opposition to federal aid to education and medical care for the

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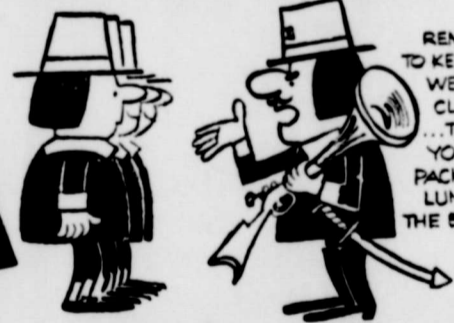
