Six Candidates Contest for Two Seats on Board --

School Election On Tap For Saturday Balloting

Voters residing within the limits of the Rankin Independent school district will cast ballots Saturday, April 7 to elect two members to the Board of Trustees for three-year terms. Polls will open at 8 a.m. and voting will continue until 7 p.m. Ballot boxes are to be located at the Rankin High School lobby and in the recreation hall of the Phillips Gasoline Plant in Midkiff. Mrs. Sam Hol-

mes is election judge of the Rankin box while Mrs. Moore Jones presides in Midkiff voting. Absentee voting ended in the election last Tuesday with 22 ballots having been cast, according to County Clerk Nancy K. Daugherty.

In a drawing for places on the ballot, held some time ago, the order of the names of candidates as they will appear are: Lloyd R. Harlan, R. J. Shannon, W. C. (Box) McDonald, Sam Bean, Jr., L. L. (Tex) Collins and Joe Simpson. Simpson is the only one of the group seeking re-election. Harlan and Shannon are from the Midkiff area while the other three—as is Simpson—are Rankin residents. Shank Bloxom, the retiring board member who did not seek re-election, was serving out the unexpired term of Johnnie Hurst who had resigned. Other board members are A. B. McGill, W. O. Adams, Ed Edgar, Carl Shaffer and J. D. Gossett.

Both Harlan and Shannon are employees of Phillips Oil Company and have been active in school P-TA affairs and related activities. Harlan is also a member of the Rankin Hospital Board and was recently appointed for another term by the Commissioners Court.

Simpson, present secretary of the school board, is manager of The Halliburton Company in Rankin and has served several terms on the school board.

Collins and Bean are employed by Texas Natural and are interested in school activities here. Box McDonald is an employee of Upton County, has served in the past on the Rankin board and on other school boards, and has been active in many youth organizations in Rankin.

Upton County To Be Awarded Certificate

From the office of Governor Price Daniel it has been learned that Upton County is among the 14 Texas counties and 24 Texas cities to be presented special award certificates for their death-free traffic safety records during 1961. Citations are being sent to the county judges of Borden, Brewster, Delta, Hansford, Hardeman, Kent, Lipscomb, Loving, Mason, Rains, Roberts, Somervell, Sutton and Upton Counties for their death-free traffic records last year. Loving County remained on the top of the list for never having a traffic fatality since its organization in 1931. It is the only county in Texas with such a record. Loving County had 171 registered motor vehicles last year which operated over 28 miles of state highway, 17 miles of farm-to-market roads and numerous miles of county roads.

Heavy Turnout Puts New City Mayor Into Office last Tues.

On a very windy day last Tuesday, a possible record number of voters turned out in the city election to pick a Mayor and one City Councilman for two-year terms. Voting in the Mayor's race gave E. B. Bloodworth 171, J. B. Pettit, Jr., 104 and Billy A. Brown, 49. Incumbent Marcus Price had 143 for councilman; R. L. Bell, 75; Eddie Yocham, 63; and D. L. Trowbridge, 38. Bloodworth, a former tax assessor-collector for Rankin Independent School District, made an active campaign for the Mayor's office and will be sworn in at the next regular meeting of the City Council scheduled for Monday night, April 9 at which time the election returns will be canvassed by the commission. This will give a city council of Bloodworth as mayor and Marcus Price and Mike Hughes as councilman. Each member of the board has one vote in matters pertaining to city decisions.

THE PECOS FRACAS—

Now the area newspapers have gone to great expense and given much space in their write-ups on Billie Sol Estes—several of them pointing out what an industrious fellow Billie Sol is—or was—and how he made his first million before he was 30—off the government.

All this publicity shows how newspaper people stick together in giving write-ups to one another. Actually, there is not so much difference between one newspaper editor and another or between Billie Sol and myself. Sure, he is supposed to have several million dollars. So what? I must owe 40 or 50 thousand myself—not including my share of the national debt—which ain't bad for a little fellow. Billie Sol pulls off great financial deals. So do I. My method—which just might be used by one or two others in Rankin,—is to go down to the bank and borrow \$200 every time they will let me have it—pay back \$100 when the time runs out—and the next day or so, go back and borrow \$300. See how easy these high finance rackets work out?
