County on the day of voting, June 2, or that he will be unable to go to the polls because of sickness or other physical handicaps. In the latter case, a doctor's certificate must be furnished stat-

ing that the person in question is physically unable to go to the polls to vote.

Persons who are unable to appear in person at the clerk's office to request absentee ballots, may do so in writing. Their ballot will be mailed out to them—it cannot be delivered—and they

must cast the ballot and have in back in the clerks office, post-marked not later than midnight, May 29.

A heavy turnout of absentees marked the first primary and Mrs. Daugherty said Monday that she had already had requests for the second primary ballots.

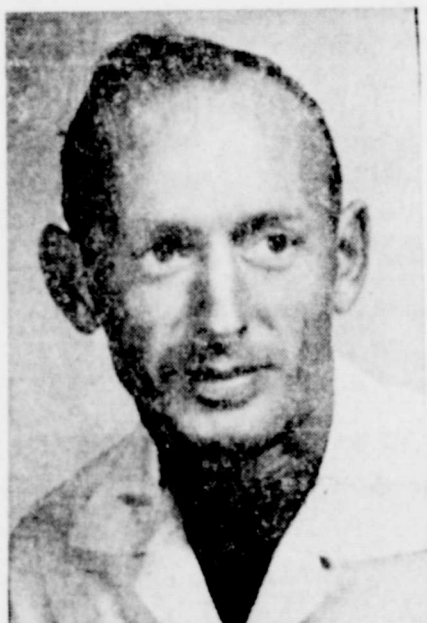

TOO LATE TO PLACE—

He's a little young and tender but like learning the truth about Santa Claus, he might as well find out now that all the days have been spoken for and that there's just no more room left on the calender for a Brother's Day—although it's not a bad question and I expect that with a little agitating in Washington we brothers could have a special law passed making room for the day—or at the very least, get up a Congressional investigating committee to hold hearings and find out who it is that's so set against brothers that there is no Brother's Day.

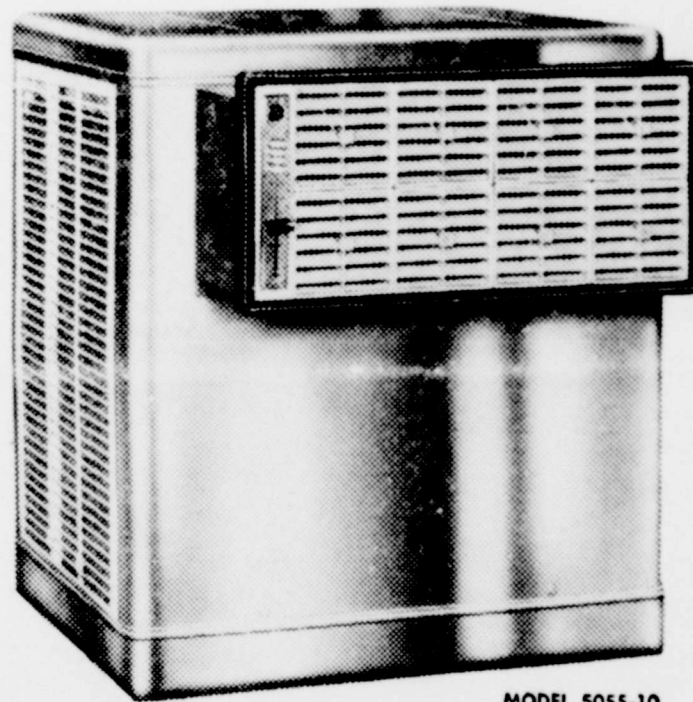

What Are The Clear Facts ?

is a reprint of a circular dated some 36 hours before the Primary Election. Study it. Does it imply that we are on a Current Cash Basis with a balance of \$18,703.15 at the end of the year in our county books and that we are not in debt? No, it doesn't, but if you believe that, you were not alone in your belief.

Actually, it is as stated in the circular, only for the Calendar Year 1961. What isn't stated in the circular is that \$72,449.19 surplus dollars in our Road Bond Fund and Road and Warrant Sinking Fund were transferred to our road and bridge fund during the year 1961. These include the transfer of \$72,449.19 in the net receipts, we spent our budget in the amount of \$53,746.04. If it doesn't include the transfer of surplus, then we should have had a balance of \$18,703.15 and \$72,449.19 transfer for a total of \$91,152.34 to apply to our back debt.

What Back Debt?

Page 5 of the 1960 Audit of Upton County by J. B. Donnell, the auditing firm summarizes: "Although disbursements were substantially exceeded, they exceeded the current year's receipts by \$72,940.-

73". (They very tactfully omitted that this included the excess receipts of the sinking funds and that \$86,500.00 was transferred prior to January 31, 1960, as shown in their exhibit but left out of their summary.)

And, at the end of 1961, after \$72,449.19 surplus dollars had been transferred to our road & bridge operating fund, the county was still \$63,644.03 in debt just as I had previously stated in a prior issue of the Rankin News.

More Important To Me

For the past few weeks, some person or persons began a rumor that I would either close down or relegate our hospitals to a First Aid Station if I were elected County Judge.

If it were told as a fact, it was a lie. If it were told as their belief, then it was only the fancy of their imagination and they are using it in an effort to defeat me in this election. Con. Rutherford Says "Many Thanks"

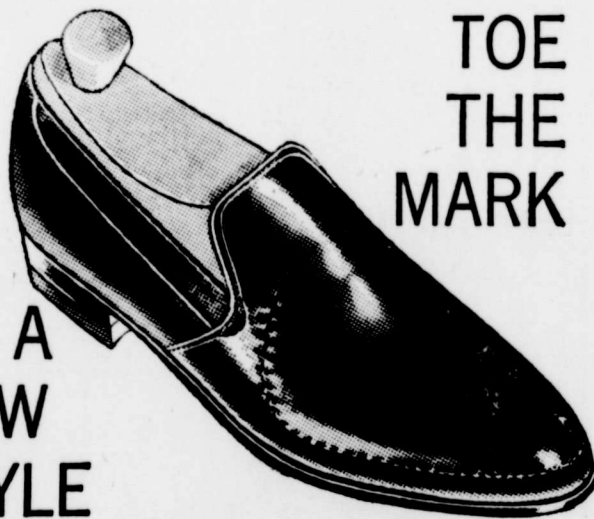

THIRD LANE OF FOODWAY—

Having considered milk and meat, we're now ready to consider the bread-cereal group, or the third lane of our highway of good nutrition. Included in this group are breads, cooked cereals, ready-to-eat cereals, cornmeal, crackers, flour, grits, macaroni and spaghetti, noodles, rice, rolled oats, and quick bread and the other baked goods if made with whole grain or enriched flour. Do not forget the rye, corn and oats group as well as the wheat products.

From these foods choose four servings daily. Does that seem like a lot? It won't when you look back over the list and remember how many baked products contain flour. Don't forget to read the label to see whether or not the

product is whole grain or has been enriched. Much of the vitamin and mineral content has been removed from the highly refined products. Some of this is replaced in the enriching process.

Foods in this group furnish worthwhile amounts of protein to add to that from the meats, milk, and other animal products. Iron, several of the B vitamins and food energy, also come from these foods. Iron shortage in the diet, one cause of simple nutritional anemia, is still fairly widespread. Making good use of whole grain and enriched products help to avoid this—gotta have iron to build rich, red blood, remember.

School Board Puts Changes into Effect

In a recent notice to parents, Rankin Schools pointed out the following has been adopted by the Board of Trustees for the high school schedule for the 1962-1963 school year.

1. The high school schedule is to operate under a 7 period school day, ending no later than 4 p.m. and beginning approximately the same time as now scheduled. The length of class period will perhaps be a few minutes less per period. The regular activity period is to continue to be scheduled with some time adjustment.

2. All students shall be required to participate in regular physical education classes—grades 9-12—unless a physician's excuse for non-participation is offered for exemption.

3. All coming into high school as freshmen, will be required to take one semester of health instruction. For the freshman year, physical education and health education is to be alternated by the semester.

4. Beginning with the summer of 1962, drivers education is to be offered only during the summer months.

5. All boys organized athletics are to be scheduled after 4 p.m.

Local graduation requirements are also under study by the board at this time. It is explained that the object of the seven-period school day schedule will offer more student choice of subjects offered by RHS.

The school has issued an invitation for anyone having any questions or suggestions, to contact the high school principal.

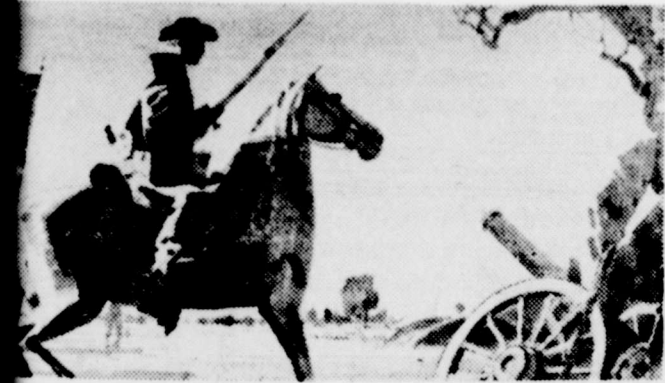
