Absentee Voting May Be At All-Time High

Big Turnout Indicated For Saturday Run-Off Balloting

Saturday will see the finals in the Democratic Primary Elections with almost all the state candidates selected by the Democrats headed for Republican competition in November. Local races will be uncontested in November unless by write-ins.

Polling places in Upton County will be the same as on May 5 in the first primary with the same election officials in charge of the vote counting. Polls will be open

from 8:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

Absentee voting in the county has already marked up a substantial total with 157 ballots having been cast or mailed out at the clerk's office early in the week. Final totals could not be obtained since the courthouse was closed Wednesday in observance of Memorial Day but a new high could well be set for absentee voting in the county.

Interest in the election has not been particularly high in Rankin for the past week or so but is expected to pick up considerably the last few days prior to voting. The County Judge's race continues to be the main topic on the local scene with the JP race in Precinct Two having two hard-working candidates. Preston Smith for Lieutenant Governor seems to have the most active workers on the scene for the state races. He carried every county in West Texas with the exception of El Paso County in the first Primary.

In the first primary in the County Judge's race, Bud Fisher led the four-man ticket with a total vote of 692. Moore was the second man at 486 votes while Norman Elrod polled 278 and Joe Guthrie had 158. Both candidates have made strong pleas for the outstanding votes.

New Minister To Arrive In Rankin

THE FINALS—

Saturday will be final exams for the candidates still in the run off—to see whether or not they have been able to gather new votes. Half of them will flunk the course.

In several races, the turnout on election day will have a lot to do with who wins. This could be very true in local races. Rankin—for some reason, failed to turn out very well for the first primary on May 5. This may have been because the ballot was large, complicated and filled with some candidates who were just not interesting to the voters. This will not be the case this Saturday. The ballot will be very easy to cast with only two selections in each of the half dozen or so races—depending on which precinct is being voted.

It won't take up much of your time to vote in this election so let's turn to and take care of this duty. Just a few votes could well be the difference in some of the races and yours could be the one that did the trick for your man—or it could be the one he needed to have won instead of lost.

In commenting on the races, it looks like Lyndon B. wins again for governor with John Connally

getting the nod over Don Yarborough. For my money, it is not much of a selection but Yarborough is tied in tooth and toenail with every radical liberal group in Texas, has done nothing but promise more spending—which is going to mean more taxes—as we will someday all learn, and he just plain has no experience at all in governmental affairs.

In the Lieutenant Governor's race, it is with a good deal of pleasure that I highly recommend to you Preston Smith as I did in the first primary. He is one of the few men in Texas politics today I really feel safe about. He is an honest, straightforward—and I might say, simple man—who will come as close as he possibly can to representing the people of Texas as a whole. Turman is a group man. He will work for and support any group he feels will be of benefit to him.

He has always paid his income tax just as you and I have, it's the filing of a return that he has refused to do and I think it's high time we have men somewhere who will stand up to the high-handed methods of tax collections being imposed on the public — methods that are getting more severe instead of better, methods that demand more and more from the taxpayer to the point that whenever a question about one's tax return is raised, he is now guilty until proven innocent—a switcheroo in our form of justice. Bean is an experienced man and although he will never get very far in his efforts to secure a more just tax collecting system, it's good to know that we have men who will speak up and be heard. It would be of great benefit to have such a man for Congressman. It would be a far cry from those now serving us who sit back and refuse to lift a finger.

Look at the hurricane that hit Galveston in 1900. It took 5,000 lives and \$17,000,000 damage. The one in 1961 took 46 lives and

\$200,000,000 damage, just a drop in the bucket compared to 1900. And why? Because it was broadcast early enough so that those that wanted to could get out.

A person must use a little common sense when these alerts are sounded. It's just the same as going to a sale, you have to use a little judgment. Naturally, if the stars are shining you can expect to live a little longer, but if there are dark angry looking clouds, then use a little precaution and keep your eyes open.

I have my first time yet to hear a forecaster say a tornado will hit in one certain spot. My radio and television say a "general" area and "possible" tornado or hail.

Personally, I give these radio and television stations a big Texas size "Thank You."

Last week-end 6 people drowned over Texas and one was killed by tornado. The drownings were buried in back-page reports while we got the full treatment on the "big blows." Not too long ago, a civil defense worker in San Antonio—a lady—called a business house here in Rankin and said that the weather reports indicated that a tornado would strike in Rankin momentarily. She asked the man to be sure and call her back if he saw any signs of it. He looked out the window, could not see a cloud in the sky and assured the good woman that he'd take time to call her if he saw one coming. A pretty good case of wild pinpointing of tornadoes.

And have you ever tried explaining to a small child who has overheard some wild-eyed report about "general area" and "possible" storms?

the vegetable—Fruit group, one of the most important lanes for every one and especially those who want to control weight.

From this group we need to choose four or more servings each day. These four servings should include one serving of a good source of vitamin C, one serving of a good source of vitamin A, and the remaining servings of any vegetable or fruit including potatoes.

Fruit and vegetables are valuable chiefly because of the vitamins and minerals they contain. They are counted on the supply nearly all of the vitamin C needed and over half of the vitamin A. Vitamin C is needed for healthy gums and body tissues. Vitamin A is needed for growth, normal vision and healthy conditions of skin and other body surfaces.

Good sources of vitamin C are grapefruit or juice; oranges or juice; cantaloupe; raw strawberries; broccoli; green pepper, and sweet red pepper. Good sources of vitamin A are dark green and deep yellow vegetables and a few fruits. They are: apricots, broccoli, cantaloupe, carrots, chard, collards, cress, kale, persimmon, pumpkin spinach, sweetpotatoes, turnip greens and other dark

green leaves and winter squash. These are fair sources of vitamin C and two servings of these may be substituted for one serving of a good source. Fair are honeydew melon, tangerine and juice, watermelon, asparagus tips, brussel sprouts, raw cabbage, collards, kale, kohlrabi, potatoes and sweetpotatoes cooked in the jacket, mustard greens, spinach, tomatoes and tomato juice, and turnip greens.

One serving of one-half cup of vegetable or fruit; or a portion as ordinarily served, such as one apple, banana, orange, or potato, or half of a grapefruit or cantaloupe.

There's the foodway—the milk group; meat group; bread-cereal group and the vegetable-fruit group. For a good diet, choose all four each day. For controlling the weight, don't neglect any group—just watch the amounts used.
