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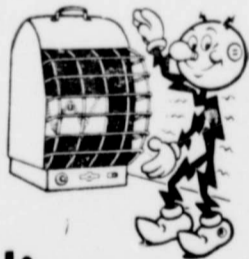

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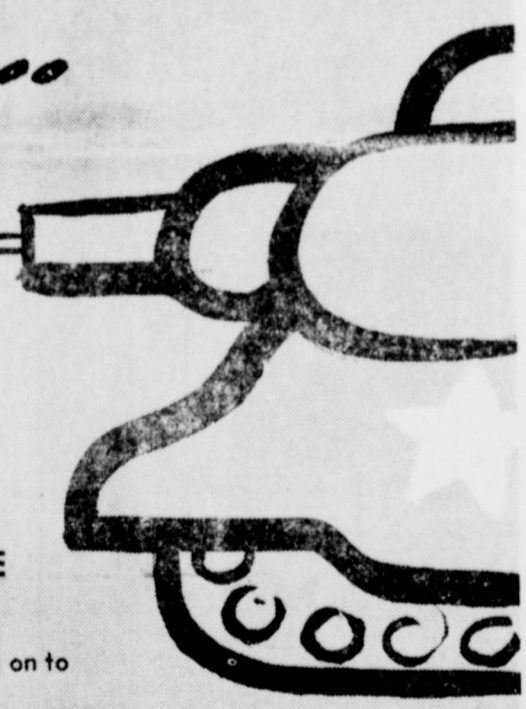
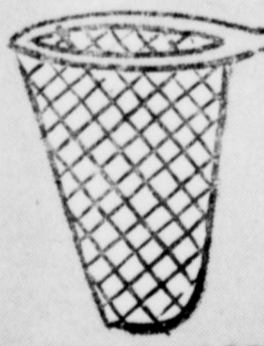

UPTON COUNTY TREASURER'S REPORT

Have Gun--Will Travel is Dangerous For Teenage Group

The Texas Safety Association today urged students to use caution in handling firearms and reported a "shocking" 50 per cent increase in teenage firearm fatalities.

"The increase in firearm fatalities among teenagers is alarming, particularly since the total firearm fatalities in 1961 decreased 14 per cent over the previous year," a TSA spokesman said.

According to the records, 24 youths between the ages of 15 and 19 were killed accidentally from firearms in 1960.

"Last year, Texas firearm fatalities in this age group totaled 36, a shocking 50 per cent increase over the previous year's figures."

Figures from the first seven months of this year show nineteen youths have died from firearm accidents. Total firearm fatalities in 1961 were 166 and in 1960 there were 194 firearm fatalities.
