## Seventh Rankin Tournament Opens Play At 2:30 Friday

Action opens at 2:30 p.m., Friday, in the Rankin Boys Basketball tournament. Iraan will go against Wink at that time. Slated for the second game in the first session is Big Lake and Sterling City. Time is at 4:00 p.m. 7 p.m. is the time for the second session. Ozona will test McCamey at that time. Imperial and Rankin round out the first day's action at 8:30 p.m. Admission prices are 50c for adults and 25c for students, per session. Admission prices to the

finals on Saturday night are 75c and 35c. Action Saturday opens at 9:10 a.m. with other games at 10:30 a.m., 12:45 p.m., 2:05 p.m., and 3:25 p.m. Finals will start at 6:00 p.m. in the consolation bracket, 7:30 p.m. for 3rd and 4th place, and 9:00 p.m. for the championship match. Rankin started the current invitational tournament in 1956 and it has been held each year since that time. McCamey won the first 2 in '56 and '57; while Ft. Stockton took the next three, '58, '59 and '60. Big Lake, defending their 1961 first place, is favored to follow the trend and make it two in a row this year. The highest finish for Rankin in their own tournament was a third place win in 1956 and the consolation winner in 1958. Rankin furnished the high point individual in 1956 with Debs Gambelin while Grandfalls had that honor the next three years, followed by Big Lake for the past two. Iraan had the 1956 outstanding player award in Lindy Lyles. Ft. Stockton won it in '57; Johnny Rameriz took the title for Rankin in '58; Ft. Stockton repeated in '59, Big Lake's Bobby Hubbard was tops in '60 and Hal Long won it for Ozona last year.

McCamey holds the record for high tournament team score of 198 points in 3 games in 1956. Iraan in 1959 ran up 88 points for the high one game team score—and in 1958 posted 21 points to also hold the record low one game score. 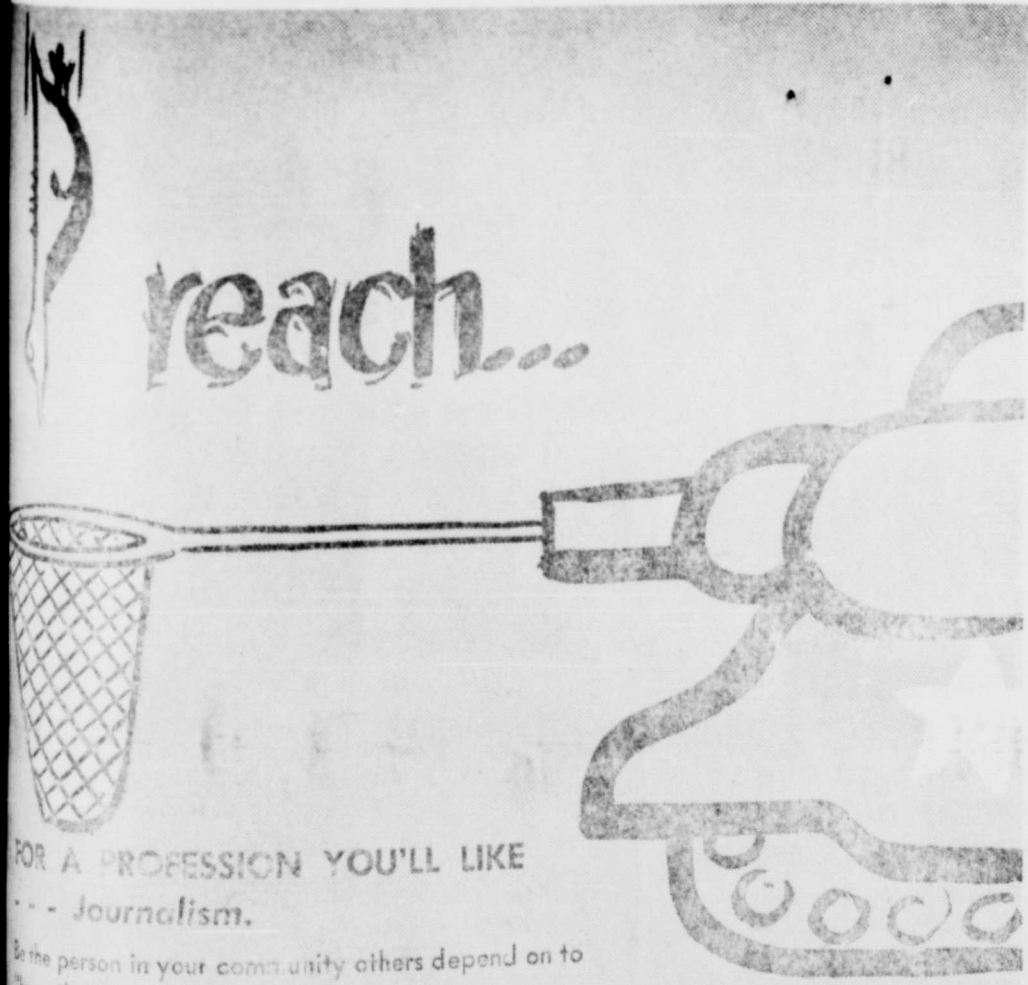

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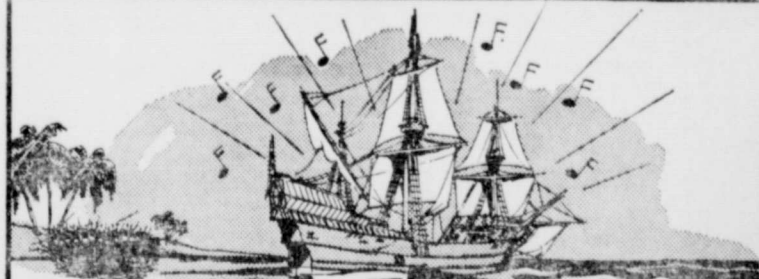

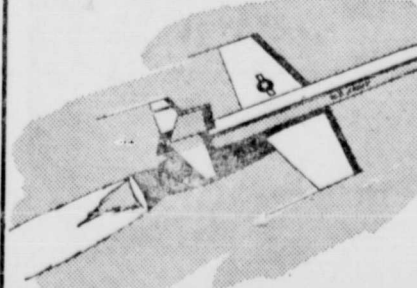

## Tips Given On How To Properly Care For Fresh Game

What kind of reception do you receive, "Mr. Hunter," when you take home your bag of game?

Does your wife throw up her hands in disgust?

If she does, says Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist, the fault may rest with the hunter. The mishandling of game after the kill often makes impossible a tasty preparation job in the kitchen, and the putting of meat on the family table as you would like it.

Immediate and proper bleeding of game animals is most important in improving meat flavor, the specialist points out. The same is true, he adds, for ducks and geese and most other game species. This practice will do much, Cooper says, to remove the strong, gamey flavor which some people dislike.

The specialist recommends field dressing immediately after the kill, especially if the weather is relatively warm. The sooner the animal is dressed, the better for immediate dressing means fewer chances for meat spoilage or undesirable flavor or odor.

Keep the game clean, advises Cooper. Avoid letting hair, feathers, dirt or other trash or debris come into contact with the meat. Before the blood dries, wipe the body cavity clean with either a dry or slightly moistened cloth rather than by washing with water, explains the specialist.

should be put into cold storage as soon as possible. If it is held just above freezing for several days, the meat will become more tender and have less of the undesirable "gamey" flavor. A deer, adds Cooper, should be aged in cold storage for several days—much the same as the carcass of a beef animal. Omit the aging process, he says, and your wife will have good reason for hoping you don't bag a deer this year.

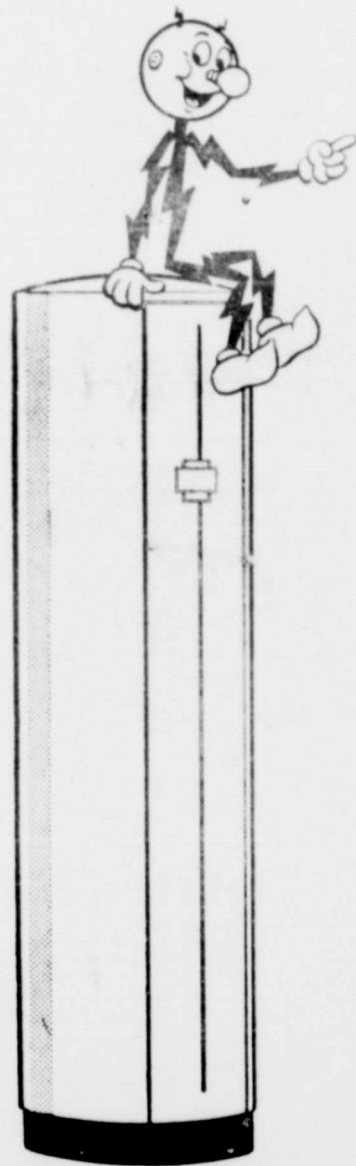

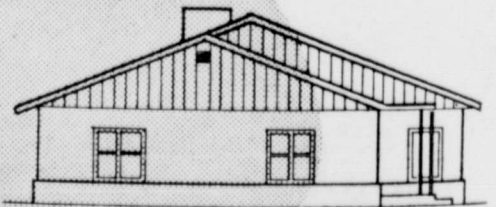
