Classes Open Tuesday For New School Session

With eleven new members in the school "family", the teachers' pre-school workshop got underway on Monday, August 26, in the high school auditorium. After a welcome from superintendent Bill J. Hood and the introduction of personnel, the teachers and their principals settled down to the week-long preparation for the beginning of school.

High school led the buildings in the number of new personnel with four: Mr. Robert Farrer, English and speech; Bill Shafer, social studies and English; Mrs. Jean Shafer, home ec; and Miss Lynette Schroeder, social studies and girls physical education.

Elementary school had three new teachers plus a practice teacher to start the year: Miss Edra Walls and Miss Nancy Procter, fourth grade teachers; Mrs. Merita Hart, second grade; and Mrs. Billie Brown, practice teaching in

the Rankin elementary school for eight weeks in cooperation with Sul Ross State College.

Junior high and high school classes will begin at 8:25 each morning and elementary grades will begin at 8:30. The principals have stressed that these are the times which classes start, not the times which first bells ring.

The first day of school, Tuesday, September 3, will be a full school day with busses running at

approximately the same time in the morning as they did last year until the schedule and the routes can be determined more positively. First and second grade students will be dismissed at 3 p.m.; third grade students at 3:25; and grades four through twelve at 4:00.

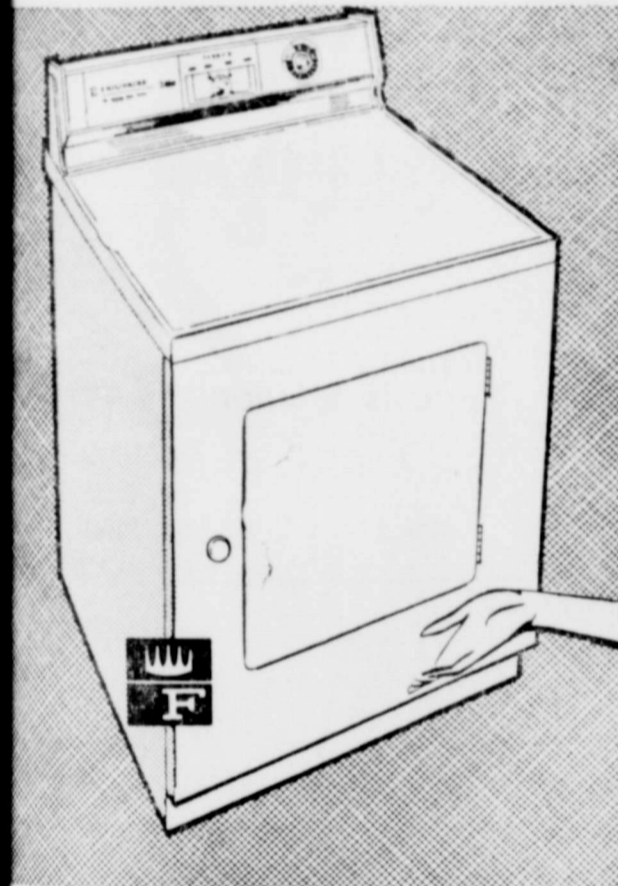

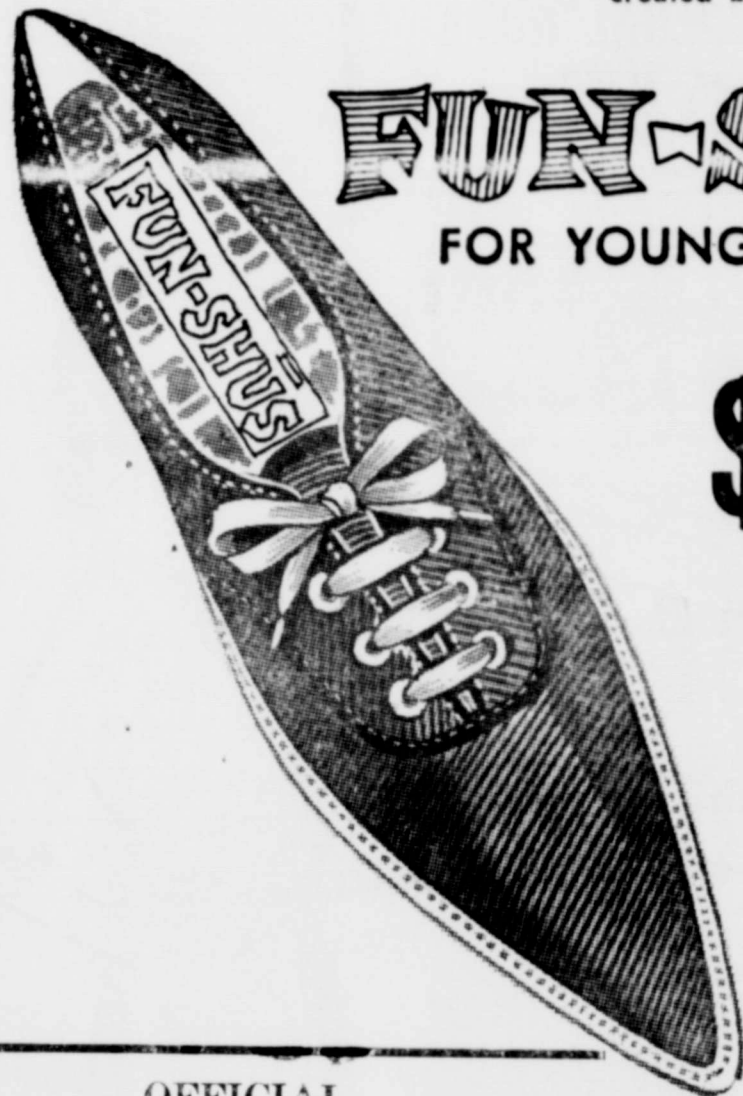

**Red Devils Work
Hard to Plug Holes
In Football Line-up**

The Rankin Red Devils rolled on into their second week of workouts for the opening of the season of September 6 in Bronte. They have scheduled a scrimmage game in Robert Lee on Friday, August 30.

How do they look? This is the question most frequently asked by those who have not attended the workouts.

Most of those who do watch the Red Devils go through their paces agree that they look fine in spirit, that they are working hard and complaining little, that there have been few drop-outs so far, and that their lack of experience shows up. Holes left by graduation and moving of prospective starters are hard to plug with the boys on hand. There are plenty of boys with the potential but few with the experience as attested by the fact that the two Ivey twins—both freshmen—were working with the first unit last Monday. Several other freshmen were pushing for starting slots

and will probably see a lot of action during the season. Boys up from last year's B team added a bit more punch.

But there were bright spots. The very fine ball handling of quarterback Roy Winters has been impressive and the performances turned in by Larry Braden, Sam Bean, Jerry McDonald and Robert Brummett as ball carriers has led fans to forecast that Rankin will likely score more points this year than they did last season. That leaves the big question of defense open and here again the Red Devils will be hurt by losses. It is also very possible that Ran-

kin will have more points scored
