Bulldogs Have Big Bite--

Red Devils in Home Stand Against Strong Coahoma

Friday night the Red Devils will make their first home appearance of the season when they host the highly regarded Coahoma Bulldogs. It could be a wild one.

Gametime is 8:00 p.m.

Coahoma shelled the Red Devils last year to the tune of 22-6 and smothered their opponent of last Friday night, 54-0. On the same night, the Red Devils were having their troubles containing a Bronte team in a tussle that ended in a 14-14 tie. Last year, the Rankin crew whacked Bronte by a 30-0 mark.

It should be a wide open ball game. Both teams use much the same offense and Coahoma likes to run wide and try to turn the ends. This will mean plenty of thrills for fans. And the Bulldogs have the boys with the speed that makes this type of football work. Scouting reports indicate that in Quarterback T. Denton at 150 pounds, and Halfback J. Gibson at 146 pounds, the visitors have to very speedy customers. Their alternate Quarterback, N. Williams at 130 lbs. is said to be good at passing.

On defense, they will put up a lot of beef in the center of the

line, favorite territory for many of the Red Devil running plays. In this position, the can post 190 C. Ogle at center, 196 pound E. Wolski at guard, 197 pound T. Cearley at guard and toss in 185 pound G. Null for good measure.

Against this line-up—and being on the short end of the scales is nothing new to the Devils — Rankin will go with a club that has shown marked improvement in practice this week. In their quarterback, Roy Winters, Rankin has one of the most accomplished ball handlers in this area. He will be supported by Jerry McDonald at fullback and Sam Bean and Robert Brummett at the halfback posts. A lack of speed, plus experience, in the line will hurt the Devils on their

downfield blocking and will result in most of their ground yardage coming in the form of three and four yard jaunts.

In the passing department, the Rankin crew should have the better of the evening and it could well be that this phase of the game will have to pay off if the locals are to chalk up a win.

As of Wednesday, all Rankin's players with the exception of senior halfback Mike Poyner, were reported in good condition for the encounter. Poyner is expected to be ready for service next week.

better on defense than expected. Iraan served notice that they are to be reckoned with this year and Eldorado may yet be as good as they are billed.

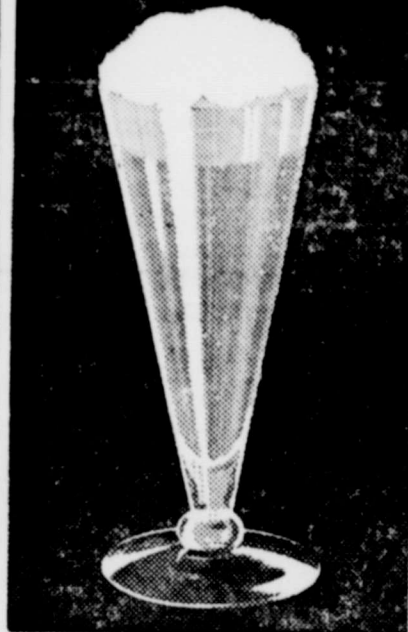

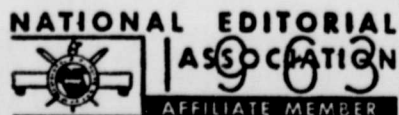

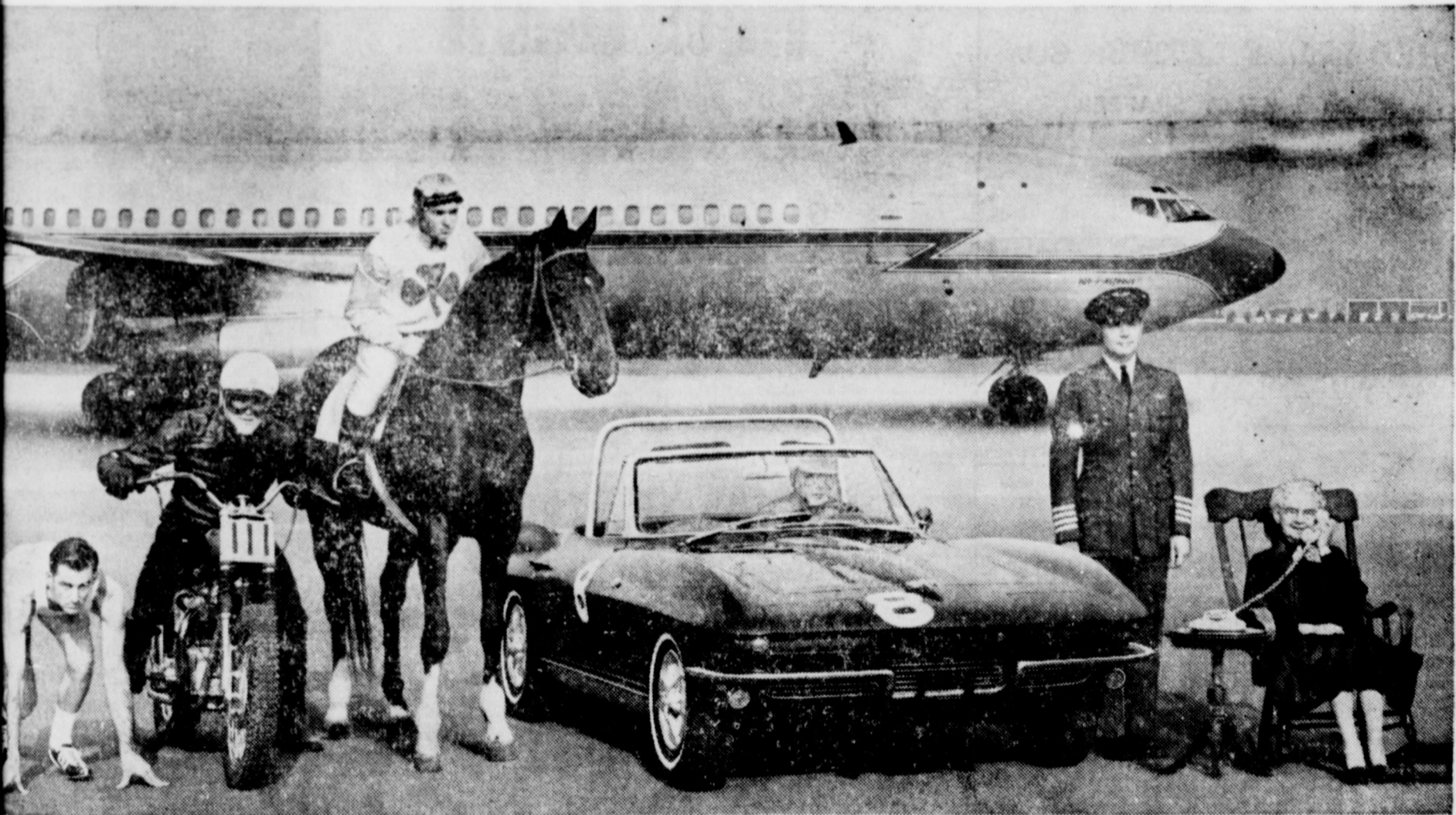
