### No Commitments On Beef Ceiling After June 30 Says Vance

Producers of beef cattle should take notice that no definite commitment is being made or will be made as to what ceiling prices or subsidies will be subsequent to June 30, 1946, unless authorizations are continued beyond that date, according to B. F. Vance, state director of AAA.  
This announcement is made for the purpose of literally complying with the commitment by Stabilization Administrator Vinson that no downward revision will be made in over-riding ceiling prices or in the maximum of the stabilization ranges for beef cattle without at least six months advance notice to producers, Vance said.

And it is my sincere conjecture that people all over the United States, and probably throughout the civilized world will think oftener and more seriously of "Red Cross" than during any other one week of the entire year, and justly so, for it will be brought to their attention more frequently and in more ways than during any other week of the year.

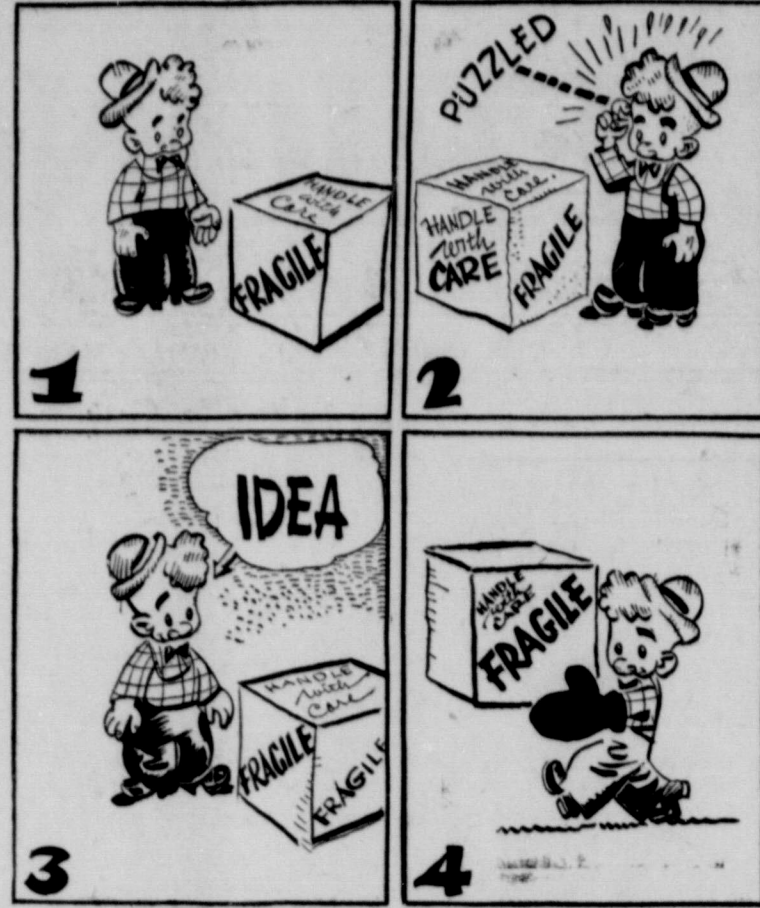
But, I am wondering if that condition was true of the past week, which was to have been observed as "Brotherhood Week." I do not remember that I even heard the fact mentioned during the entire week. I feel pretty sure that I did not mention it to any of my fellow-men with whom I conversed last week, and if my memory serves me rightly, they were just as "mum" on the subject as I was. Shame on us.

Sure—I realize that Red Cross is, in a way, very much akin to Brotherhood, but it is, to us as individuals, a more distant relative than a brother, a sort of a first or second cousin, so to speak. I will just mention at least one difference, which, in itself is also a similarity, as I understand the term "brotherhood." Red Cross looks, more especially, and may be only to the physical needs of humanity, while "brotherhood" devotes its influence more toward, what seems to me to be the mental peace, and the moral, and what may be termed, the spiritual needs and relations of the individuals, and where its influence and effects goes deeper and farther than that of the Red Cross. Is the fact that if the true spirit of brotherhood was practiced by all of God's creatures throughout the entire world, there would then be no call or need for such organizations as the Red Cross. But, Alas! that is not the true condition, and that calls for the existence of the Red Cross and similar organizations.

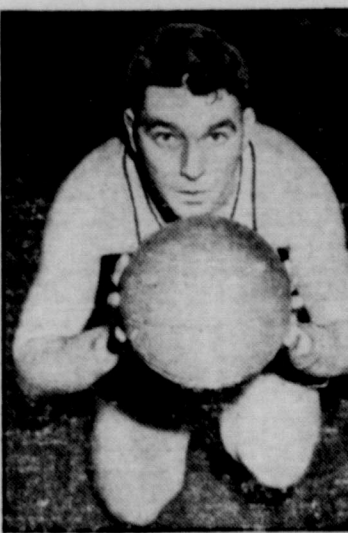

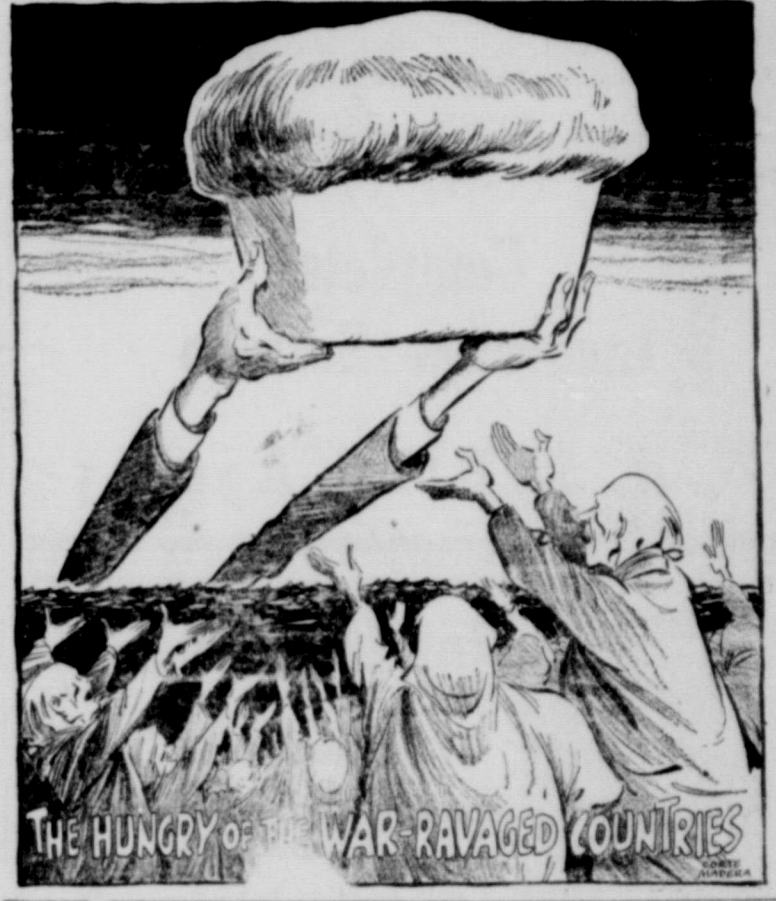


**'Truman Loaf'**

Arguments favoring Federal designation for State Highway 51, the "International Parks Highway," were heard by the Texas State Highway Commission at a meeting in Austin last Thursday morning.

County Judge Fred W. Baird headed a delegation from Deaf Smith county which appeared before the commission at that time to urge request for federal designation. With Judge Baird were county commissioners Troy Moore and H. D. Culpepper; J. E. Hill, president of the International Parks Highway Association; T. E. They were joined in Austin by other members and officials of the International Parks Highway association.

The delegates suggested to the Highway commission that Texas should take the lead in attempting to secure Federal designation for the highway, which crosses the United States north to south from the Canadian to the Mexican border; since a major part of the road lies in this state.

The Commission appeared favorable to the suggestion, Judge Baird reports, but no definite commitment is expected immediately.
