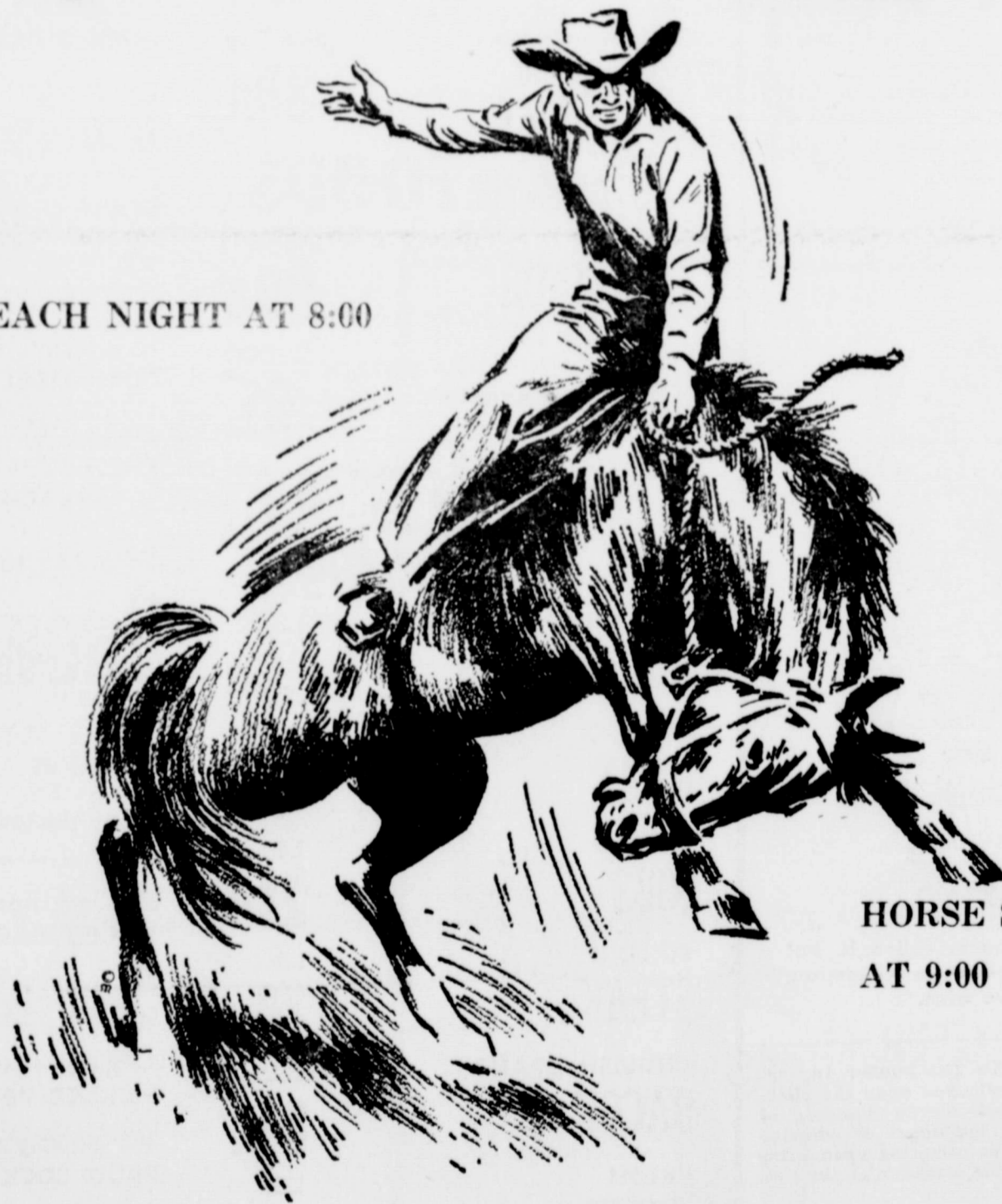

# THE SCOOP by Scoop

IT'S GREEK—

In scanning the exchange newspapers last week, I ran across the following tid-bit in George Baker's column in the Ft. Stockton Pioneer:

Sez George: "We read the other day about a clever little custom the ancient Greeks employed to limit both senseless and damaging legislation.

"When a lawmaker introduced a measure he submitted himself to a rugged test. He was placed on a scaffold with a hangman's rope around his neck. If the bill found favor with a majority of the other legislators and carried the rope was removed; if the bill lost the platform was removed, along with the legislator."

Now you gotta admit . . . right there is a practice that has much merit considering some of the legislation that is being passed these days and some of it that is being attempted but so far has not passed.

One of the best examples of a fellow needing the platform removal treatment that I can think of was the recent bit of hanky-

panky so ardently supported in the Texas Legislature by our own State Senator, Dorsey B. Hardeman in which he would have all but barred the press from reporting that a crime had been committed. The good Senator just couldn't see where it was any of the public's business if John Doe shot Elmer Pudd in front of Dirty Dan's on June 1. At least the Senator was willing to pass a law that would have prohibited any lawman, attorney or judge—and assorted other—from giving out any of the details of a crime to the press.

Hardeman said that he didn't want the cases tried in the newspapers before they went before a jury. On that point I can agree with the Senator. The case should not be tried in the newspapers. All parties concerned ought to have their day in court. But a gag on the press was not what was needed. After all, it is not now a law that any lawman, attorney, judge, has to dis-

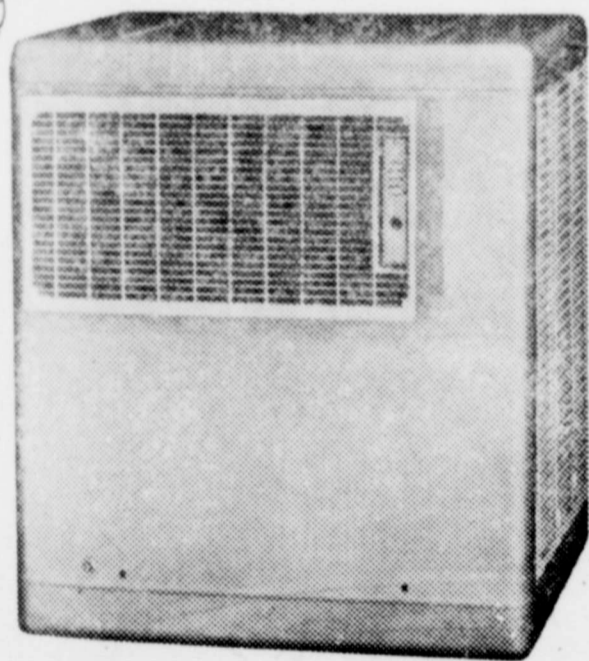

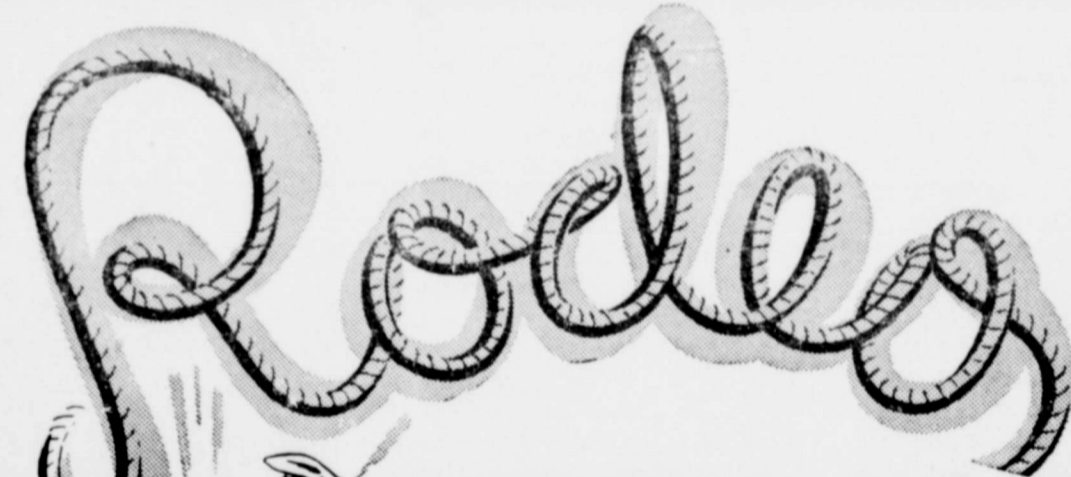

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Ten-Cent Tax Rate Cut Promised --

# School Budget Revealed; Reduced Slightly from '65

At a hearing on the proposed 1965-1966 Budget held at 8 p.m. in the high school auditorium on Tuesday night, June 1, Rankin Schools revealed figures that indicated an overall cut in expenditures in the district of \$2,173.08 for the coming school year. In the term just past, the budget amounted to \$525,788.08. For the operations next year, the figure proposed is \$523,615.00.

Along with the lower figure is a proposed 10-cent reduction in the school tax rate—from \$1.50 last year to \$1.40 this year. A major factor in the tax cut is increased values in the district due to new oil discoveries and production increases.

Proposed for raising the money for next year's operations is \$40,000.00 per capita state aid, \$3,000.00 for Vocational and Title III aid, primarily Federal Aid, a \$3,139.00 surplus from the 1964-1965 budget, and \$492,243.00 from local taxes—the largest portion of which will be paid by oil company operators within the Rankin Independent School District. From the above amounts, it is estimated that \$14,767.00 will be allowed in deductions for early payment of 1 percent and 2 percent non-collections.

### RAISES GRANTED

Following the Rankin School's policy of keeping salaries to local teachers at approximately \$1,000 per year above the state level for beginners, raises were granted to all professional personnel of the school plus other employees. An increase of \$1880 was made in the Superintendent's salary, up from \$9,200.00 to \$11,080.00 per year. To the business manager, an increase of \$1280 per year was granted, up from \$6,400 to \$7,681. The Elementary School Principal received an increase of \$1250, up from \$7,750 to \$9,000. An increase of \$1050 each went to the Junior High and High School principals, making the salary figure of \$9,100 for the high school job and \$9,050.00 for the junior high. Salaries for individual teachers were not revealed in the budget.

Overall, the system will employ 32 teachers next year as compared to 34 this past year and this difference resulted in an overall decrease in total salary outlay in some instances. Elementary teachers will receive \$76,352 next year, down from \$77,521.00 this past year. High school teachers are to be paid \$68,674, down from \$70,364; while junior high is to register a gain from \$62,701.00 up to \$66,440.00.

In other salary changes, the secretary to the Superintendent and the business office secretary each had increases from \$3,800 to \$4,200 per year. Health service salaries remained at \$3,900 while the bus custodian and driver was lowered from 5.050 to \$4,950 and outlay for regular bus drivers was decreased from \$5,901.00 to \$5,025.

Custodians' salaries were increased from \$20,305.00 to \$20,625.00. Salaries for maintenance of plant were lowered from \$5,450 to \$5,350.

### IMPROVEMENTS

Total capital outlay—improvements to school property such as buildings, playgrounds, etc., was cut from \$10,696.08 to \$11,750.00. In this amount to be spent is some \$3,500 for a new playground facility on the south part of the elementary grounds. There, an area 120 feet by 200 feet is to be paved with asphalt to provide an area for outside activities during wet weather for the 3rd and 4th grades and for court games. No other major expenditures are set up in the budget for next year along these lines.

Debt service, which includes the principal on money owed by the district, plus interest will amount to \$69,500.00 next year—also a decrease from \$71,700.00.

Plant maintenance was another category that was increased, up from \$18,100.00 to \$23,600. Part of this expenditure will be for repairs to the roof of the high school building.

In student body activities, a cut was made from \$16,800 to \$13,480. Most of this reduction was reflected in the fact that new band uniforms were purchased last year.

In the meeting attended primarily by oil tax men, there was no opposition to the budget other than the fact that the cost of education per pupil runs high in Rankin Schools, according to the oil men. Generally, however, they said that they were glad to see a lower budget and urged the school to continue to reduce expenditures where possible.

On Wednesday, the industrial tax payers of the school district met with the board of equalization to work out exact amounts for each individual firm on the new budget.

# Rodeo--Still a Kid Show It's a Big One Now

adult leaders of the County 4-H Club's All-Kid Rodeo, which has been of much interest in Rankin for sixteen years. The club members, not to records of the rodeo and passed down Main Street

The records do not say to what extent the show succeeded but it can be assumed that enough interest was generated to make a few of the adult leaders of the club sit up and take notice. included; but overall, it's still a kid rodeo with the young cowboys and cowgirls having a lot of responsibility shoved their way and plenty of adult backing. This year even one of the clowns is to be a 4-H Club member and a junior at that.

A lot of improvements and refinements have also gone into the physical equipment of the show as well as its actual operation. Now officially named the Dub Day 4-H Club Arena, the rodeo grounds are much improved over the original more or less vacant

lot. New pens of iron pipe have been erected and painted, a new announcer's stand and officials box is mounted over the pens and is reached by way of an elevated catwalk. A new and larger concessions stand serves the public and is a busy place during the performances. Better grandstands are in place and more inside parking has been provided.

All in all, the Kid Rodeo has all the earmarkings of having gone Big Time.

And comes Friday, the shiny trailers with their horses, the young rodeo hands in their Western best, the many visitors, all will begin arriving in Rankin in high hopes and good cheer. They will come early and stay late—some unrolling their bedrolls at the rodeo arena for the night. And both Friday and Saturday, the old town will go strictly wild West again.

Among the events to be staged this year will be calf roping, hair pulling, ribbon roping, pole bending, steer riding, barrel races and boot scrambles. The horse show begins at 9:00 a.m. Saturday with the halter class. Performance class competition is to start at 1:00 p.m.

A special 8-years and under class will be held this year in pole bending and in barrel racing. Entry fee for each event is \$3.00 and performances are to be held at 8:00 p.m. each night.

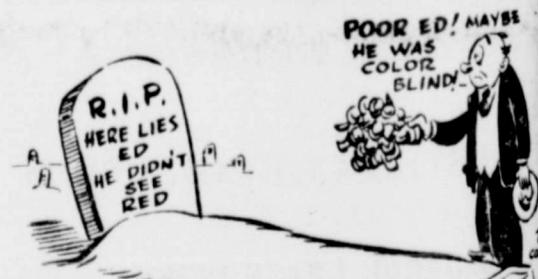
