AFTER ALMOST FORTY YEARS --

Facelifting Scheduled for Wes-Tex Utility Office

Work was to get under way this week on remodeling of the West Texas Utility office in Rankin, according to company officials. Contract for the work was awarded recently to a San Angelo firm.

Among the planned work to be done will be enlargement of the building, lowering of ceilings, air conditioning and replacement of that frontage of the structure presently facing Main Street. Total cost of the expansion was not available at this time.

This is the first remodeling of the structure since it was erected in about 1928. West Texas Utilities Company began operations in Rankin in 1927 and built the present office the next year. The company was awarded the franchise to sell electricity in Rankin in '27 and was given 15 days in which to begin operations. In order to meet this deadline, a temporary transformer unit was erected on a site just north of the present Hale's Garage. Some of the old concrete foundations on which equipment was mounted can still be seen on the property.

Company records show that among the first customers to the service were Mrs. Effie Earnest and the late Mrs. J. W. O'Brein.

...be better for all there wasn't any of with.

Personally, if I had a piece of property in Rankin that someone wanted to buy in order to move a house onto, I'd be mighty easy to trade with for the days when such chances are going to

be available—to Rankin or any other oil patch town—are getting further and further apart and the last one could well be at any time.

This is not to say that Rankin's days are numbered. Not at all. We will be around and still kicking for many years yet. But the days of the oil fields supplying jobs for large numbers of families may well be drawing to an end.

Be that as it may, Rankin still has a much better chance of surviving the rush to the big cities than do some of our neighbors in West Texas. Time and time again, it has been proven that Rankin is evidently in the geographical center of the so-called lower Permian Basin. One can tell this by looking at any map showing oil activity.

And it can be determined in other ways. Hardly any organization, such as the bridge clubs, the coin clubs, the rodeo folk, the golfers... all can prove with actual figures that more people will attend a gathering in Rankin than they will in surrounding towns. And this is not because we may have nicer facilities or all may use "Heavenly Midnight" bath water. It's simply because we are easily reached from surrounding towns. Out in these parts where fifty miles is considered next door, Rankin is hardly that far from any of a number of adjoining neighbors. At any given meeting of the Castle Gap Coin Club, it's very possible that we will have folk in attendance from Iraan, Big Lake, McCamey, Ft. Stockton, Odessa, Midland, and San Angelo. True, this doesn't happen every time but it has happened and I don't know of another club in all of West Texas that can make a similar statement.

And it's not that coin buffs are any nuttier than any one else who has a hobby and is willing to put in some driving time to attend a meeting. The bridge players say the same. So do golfers and I believe the All-

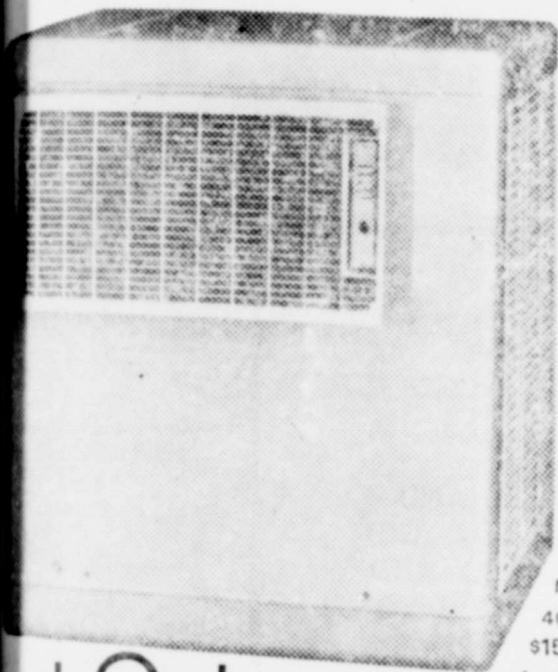

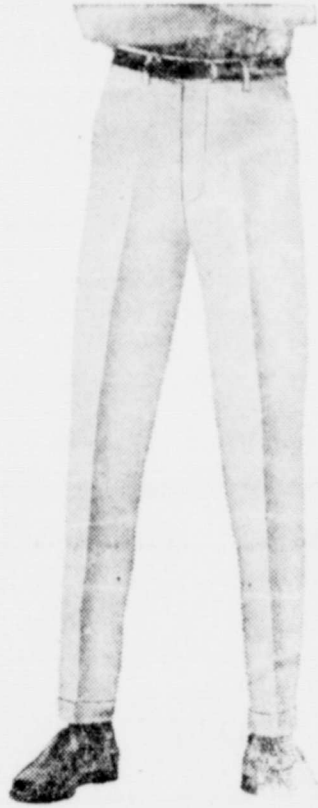

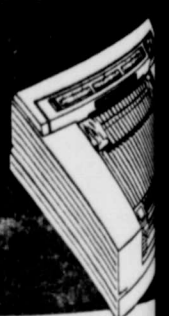

Planning any new construction on your farm or ranch? You will likely profit if you check with your county agricultural agent. He can tell you about the farm building plan service available from Texas A&M University's Agricultural Extension Service and can show you what plans are available.

The plans are for typical farm service buildings and are listed in the new 1965 Catalog of Building and Equipment Plans. These plans were developed over many years on the basis of research and field experience.

Agricultural engineers at A & M say most farmers build not more than one major size building of any one type during their lifetime. Therefore, reliable information is necessary to help plan and construct the best building for any one specific purpose.

In selecting plans, the entire farm operation and probable use of other buildings must be carefully considered. Any building

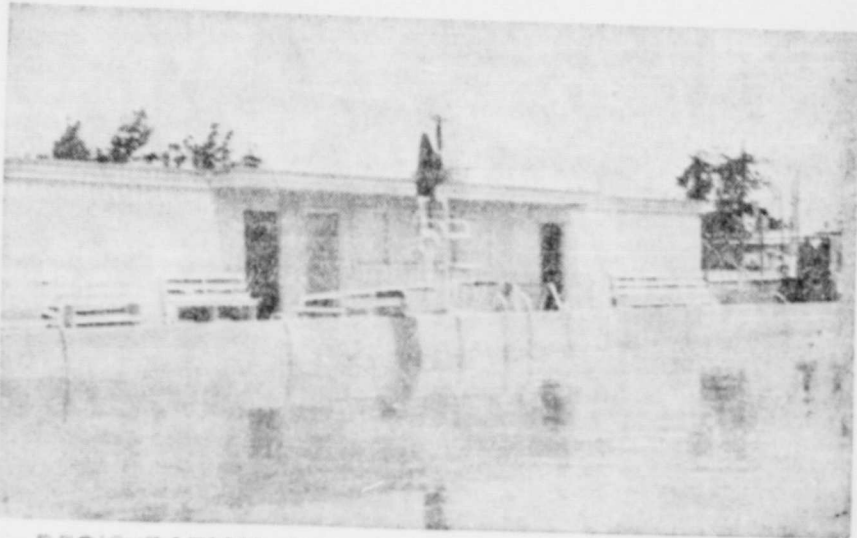

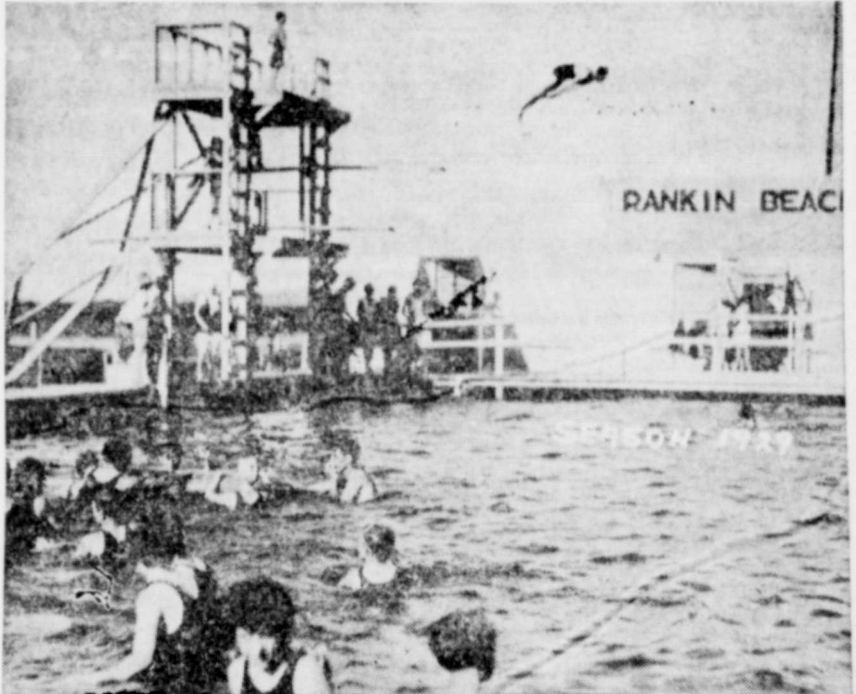
