County Appoints Two Health Officers

Actions taken by county commissioners at their regular meeting on July 12, was the appointment of D. Gossett of Rankin and Dr. Cooper of McCamey as health officers.

L. Porter Johnson's Sets July Clearance

A semi-annual event that usually draws a good bit of attention both locally and from out-of-town is scheduled to get underway at 8:30 a.m. Thursday, July 15. It's the July Clearance Sale at L. Porter Johnson's. A similar sale is held each January.

Porter Johnson, owner and operator of the department store, has said that there will be some mighty good bargain offered in this year's July Clearance. And he has also called attention to the store policy that is in effect for these sales: no returns, no refunds, no approvals, no exchanges and all sales final, please. Mr. Johnson stated that the low prices in effect for the sales makes it prohibitive for the store to extend these privileges to their customers for the clearance selling.

"We appreciate our many loyal customers," Mr. Johnson said, "and we hope they will find bargain gains to their liking at this year's July sale."

Board Approves Track; Hires Four New Teachers

The Rankin Independent School District Board of Trustees met on Knob Hill last Thursday evening, July 8, and officially accepted the track construction project from the contractors, Workman and Wheeler of Rankin. During their inspection of the facility, they noted where several horses had been either ridden or otherwise permitted to walk across the asphalt track bed. The weight of the animals on the soft surface of the track has left deep impressions which damage the surface. The board has asked for

the cooperation of the public in keeping their horses off the track at all times.

In other business the board released \$75,000 of U. S. Treasurer Bills deposited by the First State Bank of Rankin with the Texas Bank & Trust Co. of Dallas and employed the certified accounting firm of Cherry, Eckert and Story of San Angelo to audit the school district's transactions for the 1964-65 school year.

The trustees voted to enter into a practice teacher contract again with Sul Ross State College. The school did not have a practice teacher from Sul Ross last year although a similar contract was in force. Superintendent Bill J. Hood states that he believes the student-teacher program gives as much benefit to the participat-

ing school as it does to the student-teacher or the sponsoring college.

Four teachers were employed. Mrs. Susie Davis of Rankin; Ray Skidmore of Almagordo, New Mexico; and Mr. and Mrs. Odes O'Rear of San Angelo. Mrs. Davis is to teach the fifth grade, being changed in assignment from high school Spanish to the junior high; Mr. Skidmore is to be the junior high coach with some teaching assignments in the high school; Mr. O'Rear is to teach sixth grade and Mrs. O'Rear will teach the first or second grade.

The board accepted the low bid on a 60-passenger bus submitted by the Superior Coach Sales, Inc., of Dallas for a delivery price of \$4,911. A 1955 school bus was traded in on this transaction.

First State Bank has Gains Over Year Ago

A number of gains were registered by First State Bank in their financial statement covering business up to June 30, 1965 over that of a year ago. On that date in 1964, total assets at the local bank stood at \$4,229,278.26. In the report released this week, total assets as of June 30, 1965 were \$4,546,919.42 for a gain of some \$317,590.16.

Total deposits were \$3,720,112.04 last year and \$4,016,160.60 this year for a gain of \$296,048.56.

Total liabilities were \$3,757,531.96 at the June, 1964 call and up to \$4,058,502.00 this year. Total capital accounts were \$471,746.30 in 1964 and \$488,316.42 currently. Of these, \$193,316.42 is undivided profits as compared with \$180,509.33 in undivided profits a year ago.

Loans and discounts were also up on the statement to \$1,916,750.33 from last year's figure of \$1,734,179.62.

TREES—

Last week the City announced
that they would spray Elm trees
for homeowners for \$1 each. This
is a very reasonable price—some
had paid over \$100 to get two
sprayings by commercial spray
operators which was nothing less
than highway robbery—and is an
action much to be commended.
If you have ever driven into a
West Texas town that has few
or no trees at all, you know how
utterly desolate the place can
look.

As pointed out last week, the
Elm tree may not be the most
desireable tree to have on your
property but it does grow well on
a small amount of water— or
did until the bugs hit some three
years ago. Since that time, a
number of people have gone out
of the tree business. Some have
replanted with pecan or the fruit-
less mulberry—both of which do
well also in this particular part
of West Texas.

And, as the cost of spraying
the Elm trees—plus the bother—
continues from year to year, it
will probably lead to more and
more folk putting the ax to the
trees. That's their business. I may
do the same. But if you do have
trees and cut them down, please,
lets make an effort to plant others

in their place.

And along this line there might
well be a project for a Lions club
or some other civic organization.
If it could be worked out, the
sponsoring group might act as a
sort of clearing house—getting the
individual orders of all who want-
ed to set out—say pecan trees—
then combining the orders into
one large order which should re-

sult in a considerable savings on
the individual trees. It might be
worthwhile to give some thought
to putting out some on Main St.
or other public places as has been
done in the city park.

A good tree will last a mighty
long time and it would be hard
to picture a town with too many
trees.



Bugs Can Damage Lawns Extensively; Control Necessary

If homeowners notice yellow or brown patches in their St. Augustine grass, they should check for chinch bug infestation. Many severe cases of lawn damage by chinch bugs have been reported in Texas this year.

Chinch bug damage is usually caused by nymphs (young) which congregate on sheaths of lower leaves and suck juices from grass plants. This results in wilting and eventual death of the grass.

Adult chinch bugs are one-sixth of an inch long, have black bodies, reddish yellow legs and fully developed wings. Newly hatched nymphs are bright red with a whitish band across the back.

If chinch bugs are present in sufficient numbers to cause yellow or brown patches to appear, they can usually be found by parting grass in damaged areas and making observations. They will appear as small black or red bugs with white markings on the back.

A gallon can with both ends removed can be used as a sure detection for chinch bugs. This is done by forcing one end of the can two or three inches into the ground and filling it with water. Any chinch bugs present will float to the surface within five minutes. The can should be placed at the edge of the damaged area.

Control measures should be started immediately if chinch bugs are found. Ethion, Trithion and Diazinon are among several insecticides which may be applied either as a spray or dry granular form. Lawns should be wet when sprays are applied. The granular forms do not require lawns to be

wet when applied, but they should be washed into the turf mat after application.

The entire lawn should be treated thoroughly, giving particular attention to areas obviously infested. Continued observation for chinch bugs should be made because one insectidal treatment rarely prevents damage for an entire season.

Check with your local county agent for recommended insecticides and method of application for chinch bug control.

How to liven up potato salad
