# Court Inspects Plans for Expanding Upton Hospitals

At their final October meeting last Monday, the Upton County Commissioners' Court heard a delegation speak out in favor of calling a bond election for the purpose of building a new hospital in McCamey and greatly enlarging the Rankin one. Present were McCamey Chamber of Commerce members, the McCamey and Rankin Hospital Boards and the two hospital administrators.

Each hospital had on hand their plans which they went over with the Court. McCamey has their plans completed and approved by the Texas State Hospital Board while the Rankin plans are still in the tentative stage, a fact that would not have any direct bearing upon a bond election trying to raise the necessary money.

As presented to the Court, the McCamey outlay would come to \$65,000 while the figure for the Rankin alterations reaches approximately \$250,000. Included in the Rankin proposal is a nurses' quarters which, as explained by Rankin administrator, Mr. Leon Feuge, is an optional matter at the present time and may be cut out entirely before the actual vote is taken on the bonds.

Claude Brown, president of the McCamey Chamber of Commerce spoke out in favor of calling the election and expressed the opinion that improvements were needed by both hospitals.

Others present pointed out that it was the thinking of the McCamey board that a new hospital would enable them to secure the services of more doctors and that the hospital would, consequently, make more money and thus would cost less for the county to operate. Currently, operation of the two county hospitals runs about \$70,000 a year in the

### PETITIONS TO BE DRAWN

Minutes of the Upton County Commissioners' Court, dated 25 October, 1965, reveal that the Court informed both Hospital Boards that Jack Brown of the Dunbar Investment Company would be notified to meet with the boards concerning the drawing up of a Petition to be presented to Upton County Tax Payers, relative to calling an election.

expenditures for operations in the two units.

McCamey is basing their belief on more income on the assumption that a new hospital will attract at least one more doctor to the community. In the past recent years, the town has had as many as three but presently has only one. McCamey boosters admitted, however, that there was no guarantee that a new hospital would attract another doctor nor that the improvements would automatically bring in enough new money to offset the loss in operations. As stated: "it is hoped that the results will be an improvement in operations."

Both Commissioners Wheeler and Workman raised the question of what this would do to the present tax structure of Upton County and whether or not (Continued to Page 7)

## Deposit at All-Time High at First State

Dunn Lowery, president of the First State Bank in Rankin, said that he would have to do a good bit of record-checking to be sure, but he believed that the current financial statement of the bank showed the largest total assets ever registered on a bank's financial statement in Rankin. In referring to the statement published in this issue of The News, Lowery noted that total deposits as of October 13 stood at \$4,414,812.47. Total assets were just shy of five million dollars at \$4,987,093.28.

Undivided profits on hand at that time amounted to \$232,224.95. Lowery said that he expected still further gains in all departments before the end of the year.

All voting boxes in the county will be in operation and the polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. A current Texas Poll Tax or exemption will be required for one to be eligible to cast a ballot.

# THE SCOOP by Scoop

ON AGAIN—

The proposed expansion of the two Upton County Hospitals—an affair that has been off and on for almost a year now—is on again and it looks like this time there will be some definite action.

Claude Brown, president of the McCamey Chamber of Commerce, put it this way: "Let's get this thing off the ground... get it before the people and decide one way or another."

Backing him up in an appearance before the Commissioners' Court last Monday were members of both the McCamey and the Rankin Hospital Boards plus the two hospital administrators.

So it's very possible that within a short while, you may be asked to put your signature on a petition to be presented to the Commissioners' Court asking them to call a bond election for some \$650,000 to enlarge the Rankin Hospital and build a new one in McCamey. Hear the man out who asks you to sign before you say no. There's a good bit of merit in the proposal and even if you don't personally approve of it, signing the petition does not bind you to vote either for or against the measure. It will be more or less a formality and you won't be springing anything drastic on

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the Commissioners' Court with its presentation. They are the ones who will have ordered it made up in the first place.

As stated above, don't start out on a crusade to defeat the issue until you have heard all the facts. In the first place it's not as drastic as it sounds and in the second place, it may well be that there is a need for something of this kind. Both Hospital Boards and the Commissioners' Court expressed a desire to fully inform the public on the matter before it is voted upon. For the present, an open mind would help one to get a better understanding of what is proposed and decide for himself whether or not there is a need for spending the money.

Incidentally, Brown also urged the Court to get going on the proposed Castle Gap park. He said that he had commitments from two State agencies to put in the road and develop the park if the county would secure the right-of-way and necessary land.

issue before election, summariza- tion of the issues will have to be brief.

Two of the proposals definitely ought to be defeated. These are Nos. 4 and 10 on the ballot and they would extend the terms of office for the Governor (No. 2) and the Representatives (No. 10) from 2 to 4 years. This is parti-

cularly bad in the case of the Governor who appoints so many office holders in Texas. Given 8 years in office—most are re-elected for a second term—one man could almost control such things as education in Texas by appointing "his men" to the various boards. The same would be true of every appointment made. This would not be desirable no matter who the governor happened to be. For Representatives, we need all the control over our government—not less—that we can get. Four year terms would give us less.

Four of the proposals merit passage. They are No. 2, Veteran's Land Fund, a program that has been of much benefit and very little cost in Texas; No. 5, Teacher Retirement System that would enable teachers' retirement funds to be better invested and thus worth more money; No. 6, Student Loan Fund a program much in need for students who cannot get adequate financial help to attend college; and No. 8, Judges' Retirement and Removal, giving authority to turn judges out to pasture who do not perform properly.

The other four proposals are somewhat questionable in that all are costly. No. 1, the College Building Program would exactly double ad valorem taxes in Texas. This wouldn't be much of a tax but anytime we approve the doubling of a tax, we're taking a big step out into the woods. The colleges, however, do need the added building funds.

No. 3, State-Federal Welfare Programs. It seems that every-time we turn around, there's a new request for welfare money. This amendment would merely authorize Texas to take part in Federal Welfare programs and in that respect, might be called a formality. I only wish they could come up with some new word other than "Welfare".

No. 7, Tax Exemption for Charitable Trusts. The charitable trust is sometimes a dodge used by certain groups to gain tax advantages. Every time some group is exempt from paying their fair share of the tax load, the rest

of us have to split up the tab. Yet, if it's truly a charitable trust, it ought not be taxed.

And No. 9, Salary for Lt. Governor and Speaker—Per Diem Increase for Legislature. Almost as regular as Welfare, we are asked to raise salaries for members of the Legislature. It used to be said that this would attract better men but the same ones are still in office in many cases. But I guess it takes a good bit of jack for a Legislator to live like a Legislator should these days—however that is.

In any case, take fifteen minutes Tuesday and GO VOTE!

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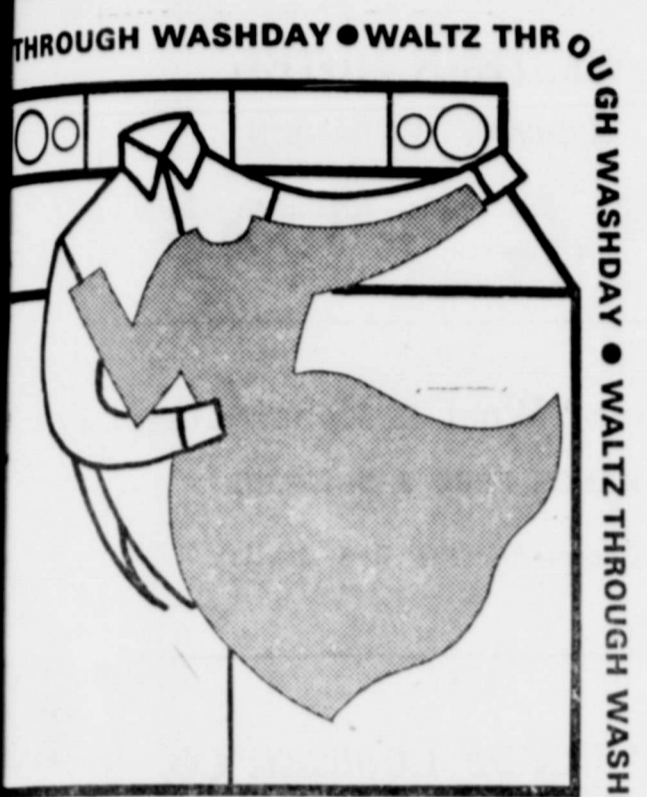
### Trains in Germany

Cockerham was graduated from Hadley High School in 1961.



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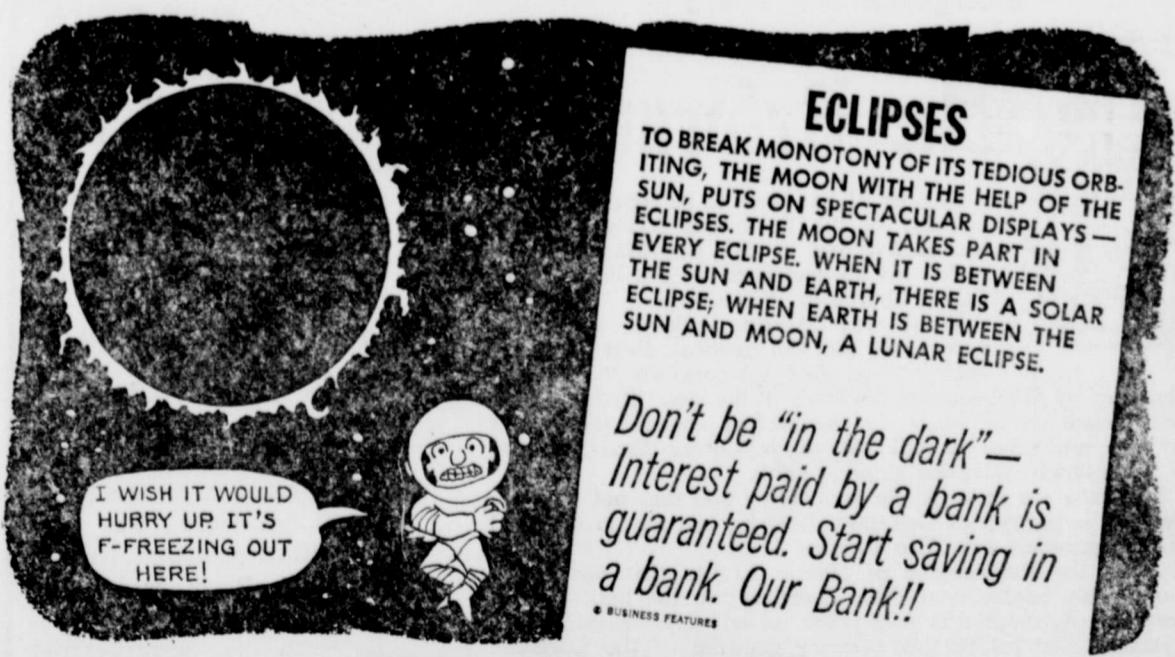

### POLECAT BALL—

I guess you could call it a football game, that set-to held last Friday night in which, but for some good officiating, Rankin would have trounced pore ole Sanderson a possible 92 to 0. And the Red Devils sent in everybody except the cheer leaders to hold it down that much.

Whether or not that means that the Red Devils have found themselves on offense remains to be seen. Sanderson just wasn't much of a test. Comes next Saturday morning, we will know.

But, perhaps the most refreshing thing of last Friday night's game was the "polecat" football formations brought out by the Red Devils. The fans particularly like it because it was wide open and you didn't have to guess as to what was going on. Then they boys had a pretty good time with it too.

For those who were not present and who never saw the "Polecat" formation, it consists of the center over the ball in approximately the middle of the field with the quarterback standing ten to fifteen yards back. Two more players line up on the far side of the field and the other seven bunch up on the near side. From there, it is Go!—anywhere. And that's what Rankin did.

Later on, talking to one of the Rankin coaches, 4th and 10 asked him if the Red Devils plan to run any Polecat ball at Eldorado. He sorta grinned and said, "Not likely."

Well, I hope they don't chunk the formation all together. It's a barrel of fun to watch.

So . . . can Rankin beat Eldorado. Well, why not? We have the hosses. the next six years or by 1972. At the present time, the county owes slightly over \$400,000. Moore expressed the opinion that the new tax bonds, if approved, would affect the present tax structure very little if any. He based his

reasoning on the fact that by 1967, the County will have retired two different bond issues currently being paid out and that new valuation is being added to the county tax rolls in the form of new oil developments. He expressed the opinion that any tax increase that might come from the sale of new bonds would be only a temporary one of approximately one year. He did stress, however, as did other members of the court, that the money for the improvements would have to be paid by the tax payers of the county. bond and no taxes. The bonds have to be paid off."

After discussing the proposal for a bout an hour and a half, the court told the delegation to start winding up their plans and to get ready to circulate petitions calling for the election. Considering the time it takes to properly call the election, it was estimated that the earliest possible voting date would be sometime in early February, 1966.

At the same meeting, Brown asked cooperation from the Upton County Commissioners Court in cleaning up the McCamey airport and stated that Congressman Richard White is trying to secure a glider training school for McCamey. Brown also said that the Texas Highway Department was willing to build a road into Castle Gap and that another state department was ready to
