Following their presentation, a question and answer session will be held and anyone may put forth any inquiries they wish to make.

\$594,000 Asked for McCamey-Rankin Work --

Petitions in Circulation for Hospital Improvements

Petitions calling for a \$594,000 bond election in Upton County to finance hospital construction and improvements in McCamey and Rankin were in circulation this week in both towns. In order for the petitions to be presented to the Commissioner's Court, ten percent of the eligible voters who are property owners in the county must sign the petitions. In Rankin, it is said that signatures are being added at a good pace.

Signing of the petitions to call

the elections does not obligate one to vote for or against the bond issue once the election is held.

Following is a copy of the petitions:

PETITION
THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF UPTON

TO THE HONORABLE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF UPTON COUNTY, TEXAS:

We, the undersigned, being more than ten per cent of the resident, qualified, property tax-

paying voters of Upton County, Texas, hereby respectfully petition your Honorable Court to provide for the enlarging and equipping of the County Hospital and for all other necessary permanent improvements in connection therewith, and within thirty days from the date this petition is presented to your Honorable Court, to submit to the resident, qualified property taxpaying voters of Upton County, Texas, owning taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, at a special election the following proposition:

"Shall the Commissioners' Court of Upton County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said County in the amount of \$594,000, to become due from their date, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding five (5%) per cent per annum, as may be determined and fixed by the Commissioners' Court, for the purpose of providing funds for the enlarging and equipping of the County Hospital and for all other necessary permanent improvements in connection therewith, as follows: \$350,000 for constructing and equipping a hospital building in McCamey and \$244,000 in Rankin; and shall the Commissioners' Court of Upton County, Texas, be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually while said bonds or any of them are outstanding a tax upon all taxable property in said County sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund for their redemption at maturity?"

RANKIN DROPS NURSES' QUARTER

In their last regular meeting held earlier this month, the Rankin Hospital Board instructed their architect to drop from the Rankin remodeling plans, blueprints and specifications for a four-bedroom nurses' quarters. In the first estimates of the hospital's needs, the construction of the quarters, at a cost of \$25,000, was planned to be carried out just west of the hospital.

This portion of the Rankin remodeling was dropped after it more or less became a matter of controversy in Rankin and parti-

cularly in McCamey. Members of the McCamey Hospital board, in their recent joint meeting with the Rankin Board and the Commissioners' Court, were outspoken in their objections to this portion of Rankin's estimated needs.

Rankin plans must yet be approved by the state Health Department. This approval is necessary in order for a hospital to be accredited and thus be eligible to handle insurance claims.

No vote on the bond issue is expected before mid-February of next year.

Utility Company to Enlarge Area Plant

McCamey—A major expansion at the Rio Pecos Electric Generating Plant was announced today by West Texas Utilities Co. The generating capacity of the plant will be increased to more than 2½ times its present size.

The \$8 million construction program was announced by Roff W. Hardy, WTU President, who cited this new construction as evidence of the company's continued planning and building to provide power for West Texas growth and development.

Hardy said, "While we are still working to complete the second unit of the new San Angelo power generating station, our Engineering Department has been busy on plans and designs for this new generating facility at the Rio Pecos Plant."

PETITIONS—

The petitions for calling the hospital bond election are being circulated for signatures and the general reception is said to be favorable toward putting the matter before the citizenry. That way we will either get going on the needed expansions or we can crawl back in our little shells and forget about it.

A few of the "anties" have refused to sign the petitions calling for the election and I guess this is to be expected; although I can't imagine anyone—regardless of how he feels about the actual approval of the bonds—refusing to sign a petition to put the question before the voters. Voting to settle a matter is one of the most basic American concepts and yet . . . well, some times you wonder.

And another thing that strikes me as odd has to do with those who will oppose the issue—as they have every right to do—and yet most of these same folk will make big talk about such

things as local responsibility vs. Federal intervention. Still, when they are called on to contribute a little something toward that local responsibility kick, they get all up in the air and do their damndest to kill the thing. Like I say, that's their privilege and I would certainly not want to see it otherwise but I cannot understand how their actions justify their thinking—if that's actually what they think. I sometimes wonder if those who are always anti everything don't have the feeling that being their brother's keeper somehow doesn't apply to them.

I'm not out to say that everyone ought to support the bond issue. We have approved some in the past and we've defeated some. Usually, I think public opinion is correct on such matters—provided it's informed public opinion and not just the "aginners." Oppose the issue or

 begins years before actual construction is started. The Company is constantly planning five to ten years in the future to provide for our customer's electrical needs.

The new unit, to be added at the Rio Pecos station which is located seven miles west of McCamey, will be a conventional re-heat steam turbine-generating unit. The unit will have a capacity of 95,000 Kilowatts and the steam turbine is being designed to operate at 1,450 pounds pressure per square inch and at 1000 degrees F. temperature and 100 degrees F. reheat temperature.

Construction of the new unit is scheduled to begin in June, 1967 with the target date for completion in May, 1969. The major items for the plant, the steam turbine-generator and the steam boiler, have just been purchased.

The Rio Plant was originally built in 1927, with new units being added in 1954 and 1959. Currently the plant has a generating capacity of 59,500 KW and is operated by a crew of 27 employees under the direction of J. C. Carroll, plant superintendent.

In addition to the Rio Pecos Plant, West Texas Utilities operates seven other modern generating stations. These stations, which are interconnected with 138,000 and 69,000 volt transmission lines, supply energy for 167 towns and communities in fifty West Texas Counties.

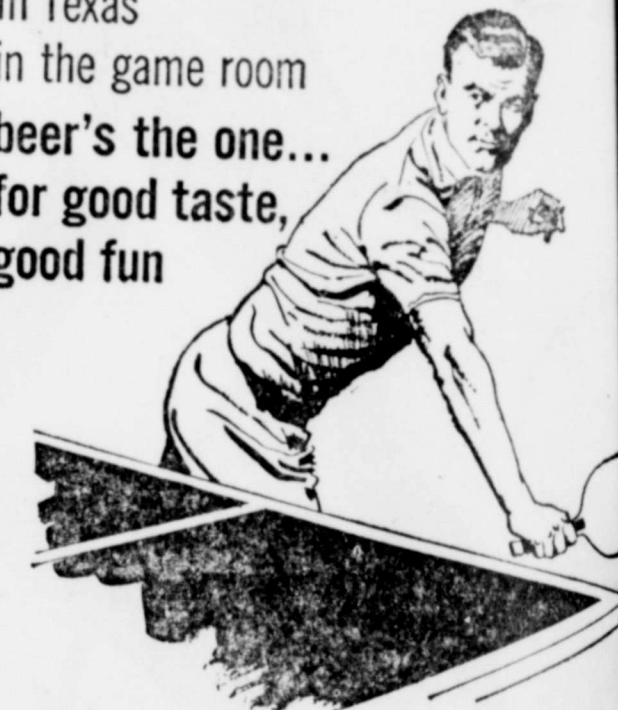

**Know Your Grasses
Available at Office**

A new publication entitled
"Know Your Grasses" is now a-
vailable from the county agent's
office. Discussed in the bulletin
are 76 grasses which are of great
importance in Texas.


The information is designed to
better acquaint the ranchman
and stock farmers of Texas with
grasses. The most important na-
tive and introduced grasses of
Texas are illustrated. Publication
editors are G. O. Hoffman and
B. J. Ragsdale, Extension range
specialists at Texas A and M.

Knowing range grasses, like
knowing livestock, is the founda-
tion of the ranching business. A
ranchman is in the grass busi-
ness and livestock and wildlife
are his salable by-products. Good
palatable grass is the cheapest
feed that can be grown. Certain
pasture grasses are indicators

like signs on the highway.
The ranchman must know the
kinds of plants growing on the
range, their forage value, and
when to utilize them properly
with the right kind of livestock
at the proper season.

The publication is designed to
at least acquaint the ranchman
with the key or important spec-
ies in their area. It is also hoped
that the material will be useful
in helping 4-H members in grass
judging.
