LOOKS LIKE ANYBODY'S GAME --

Red Devils to Test Marfa in Gridiron Season Opener

According to old records at the
News office, Friday night's open-
er between the Rankin Red Dev-
ils and the Marfa Shorthorns may
turn out to be a bit of a grudge
battle with either side capable of
winning.

The last accounts that can be
found of Rankin-Marfa competi-
tion date back to 1958. That year
the Red Devils made the long
trip to Shorthorn country and put
their largest scoring record ever
in the books when they hit the
"Horns" for a 53-14 victory.

But next year, in 1959, it was
Marfa's year to win and they iced
the game, played here in Rankin,
in the last 60 seconds of play
when they came from behind a
7-6 deficit to score not only a 6-
point touchdown but run over a
2-point conversion and even up
the series at one game each. Ac-
cording to the write up on the
game, Rankin fans and football
team was more than a little put
out in dropping the match in the
last 60 seconds—ala Ozona.

For the Friday encounter which
gets under way at 8:00 p.m. in
the Shorthorn corral, there is no
easy way to measure the two op-
ponents. Rankin holds scrimmage
wins over Stanton and Wink but
little is known about the Marfa
squad. Last year, they did not

live up to expectations but this
could well have been due to the
fact that they played most of
their season without four of
their starters who were injured.
Reports indicate that they will be
at full strength for Rankin and
they are said to be big and tough.

For the Red Devils, however,
the size of the foe doesn't worry
them too much since they can
put up a pretty hefty line them-
selves. Nor does the running game
of the opponent give much cause
for worry since they have been
able to pretty well contain all
comers on the ground for the
past season and ought to be even
stronger this year.

Main fret for the local squad
is their own offensive ability and
the fumble bug, plus any passing
that a strong-armed opponent
might develop.

All the Red Devils are reported
to be in good condition. Halfback
Jimmy Pettit has a sore foot, the
result of an accident in which he
received a gash that took three
stitches to close.

Some forty-three boys are now
in the football program in high
school and about all that is need-
ed is a good opponent on which
the squad can test their skill.

From all indications, Marfa is
primed to provide that test comes
Friday night.

Enrollment Climbs in Rankin Schools

Enrollment figures continued to
climb at Rankin Schools Monday
and have already passed the
marks reached last year on Sept.
1 at the beginning of school, and
on May 25, at the end of that
term.

Total enrollment as of Wednes-
day morning, Sept. 7 stood at 576,
up from the 561 at the end of
school last year and the 516 at
the start of school last year.

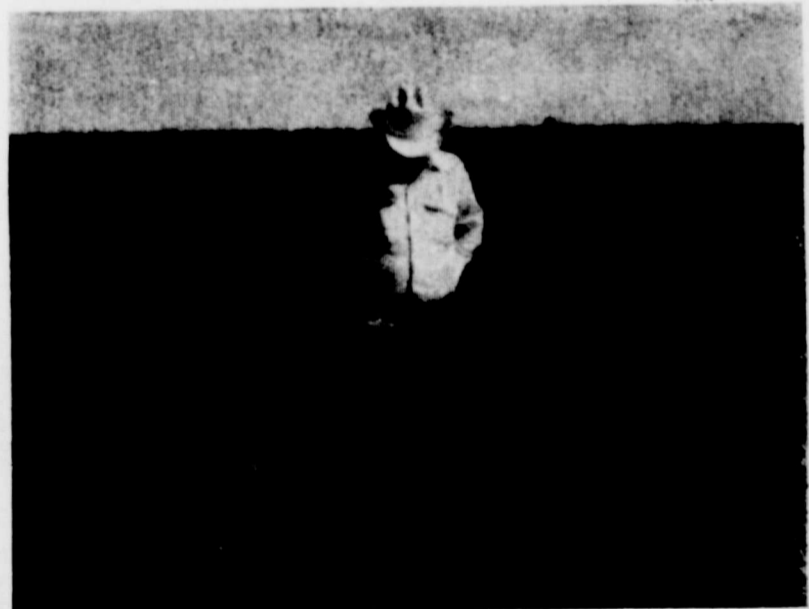
Leading the gain has been the
elementary sections which have a
current enrollment of 235 as com-
pared with 228 at the end of the
term last year and 206 at the
start of the 1965-66 term.

On Sept. 1, 1965, Junior High
had 161 enrolled. At the end of
the term on May 25, 1966, this
figure had risen to 183 and on
Wednesday, it had climbed up-
ward to 194.

In the high school, the figures
have remained almost constant.
That department started off with
149 in 1965, reached up for one
more to 150 at the end of school
and presently has 145 enrolled.

An enrollment of about 600 had
been anticipated for this year.

COTTON PICKING—

On Page one of this week's issue of The News is a picture of a cotton patch. Now to some of us, a mere mention of a cotton patch brings a twitch to the back that recalls days that most had rather forget. Strangely enough, they are referred to as the "good old days" by everyone over forty.

But to get on with the story, this particular cotton patch has an item or two related to its short history that is worth putting down for the record. To begin with, it's the closest cotton patch ever to Rankin. Good cotton farms have been in operation for several years in the Midkiff area and over around the dinosaur-prairie dog town of McCamey but this particular one is the closest one to the "capital"

of Upton County.

And then, too, this cotton patch has proved that it is a typical farm operation. It has been hailed out two different times.

The patch belongs to Ray Barrett who farms and ranches in the area around Midkiff and now on the Midland Highway. Ray has two irrigation wells on the place and enough water for about 40 acres of cotton plus a grass spot. He plans to increase his "diggings" by about 30 more acres next year.

At the time he was putting in the land last February, there were a number of those among us who—like the editor—had always looked upon farming as it

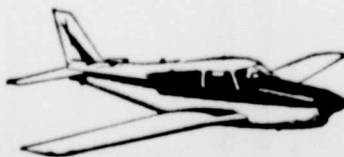

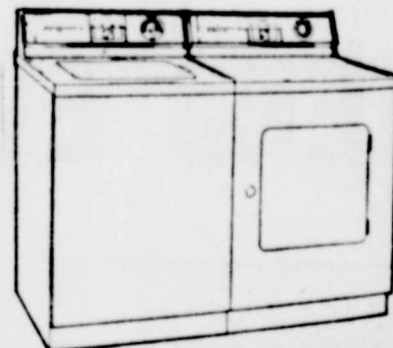

the wool payment itself, which has been extended by law thru 1969. The voting will determine whether growers want to continue financing wool and lamb market-promotion activities for the same period through deductions from the wool payments they receive. Deductions under the new agreement would be up 1½ cents a pound on shorn wool and 7½ cents a hundredweight on unshorn lambs, compared with 1 cent and 5 cents in the past. The higher deductions, recommended by most of the State and regional sheep organizations which are members of ASPC, would be necessary to finance ASPC's proposed programs.

The market-promotion activities are carried out under an agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the American Sheep Producers Council, as authorized by law. The proposed new agreement will be approved if it is favored by having at least two-thirds of the total number of producers voting or by producers having at least two-thirds of the volume of production represented by the total vote.

All growers should receive their ballots through the mail by September 9. Any producer who believes that he is eligible to vote and who has not received his ballot should get in touch with his ASCS County Office right away.
