

SCHOOL ENROLLMENT JUMPS MIDLAND TRANSFERS

Rankin Schools increased Monday the addition of transfer students from Driver Camp

in the southern part of Midland County.

Total enrollment for the system is now 592. Elementary, grades 1-4, have 245 enrolled with sixty-

nine first graders, fifty-five in the second grade, sixty-two in the third, and fifty-nine in the fourth. Eight of the Driver students are included in these figures.

Grades 5-8 received six new students making an even two hundred enrollees. Fifth grade is now at fifty-seven; sixth, forty-nine; seventh, forty-six; and the eighth grade has forty-eight.

High school received four of the transfers and now shows a total of 147 enrolled. Freshmen are most numerous with forty-four. Juniors number thirty-eight while the senior class has thirty-five. The smallest group is thirty in the sophomore class.

FOR IRAAN HOMECOMING AFFAIR --

Red Devils to Bravesland for Friday Nite War Party

Friday night at 7:30 in Iraan, two old football rivals will renew a gridiron battle that has produced many thrilling moments of play. For more than ten years now the Red Devils and the Braves have contested with Rankin having won nine times and Iraan taking four out of the current series. No records are available on games past 1953.

There has never been a tie between the Red Devils and the Braves and there has been only one shut-out for Iraan against Rankin and two for Rankin against Iraan. Some have been fat and some have been close.

Rankin has scored a total of 272 points to 182 for their opponents from Pecos County.

At least on paper, Rankin will have a big edge going into the game. Thus far in four games—three of them against Class AA opponents—the local crew has remained unbeaten, scoring 152 points to their opponents 8. One was last week's 68-0 shelling of Sanderson in the district opener.

On the other hand, the Braves lost to Big Lake and McCamey—teams Rankin has shut out—got a tie with Stanton, a team defeated 6-1 in scrimmage, and lost

last week to Junction. This loss however, was to a team that has been looking better all along and may prove that the Braves are beginning to take shape.

In addition to having the home field advantage, Iraan has also put the Rankin game up as their homecoming event. This coupled with the fact that the Devils put the damper on their homecoming last year 2-0, will undoubtedly give the Braves much desire to upset the favored Rankin crew.

In their walk last Friday night against Sanderson—in which one starter was out due to injuries—the Red Devils found that their biggest bother was trying to keep the score down. This week they expect no such advantage as they meet an old opponent that has almost always given them a hard fight—and as, perhaps, they look just a bit ahead to their own homecoming and the Sonora encounter October 14. think they could. Or would you?

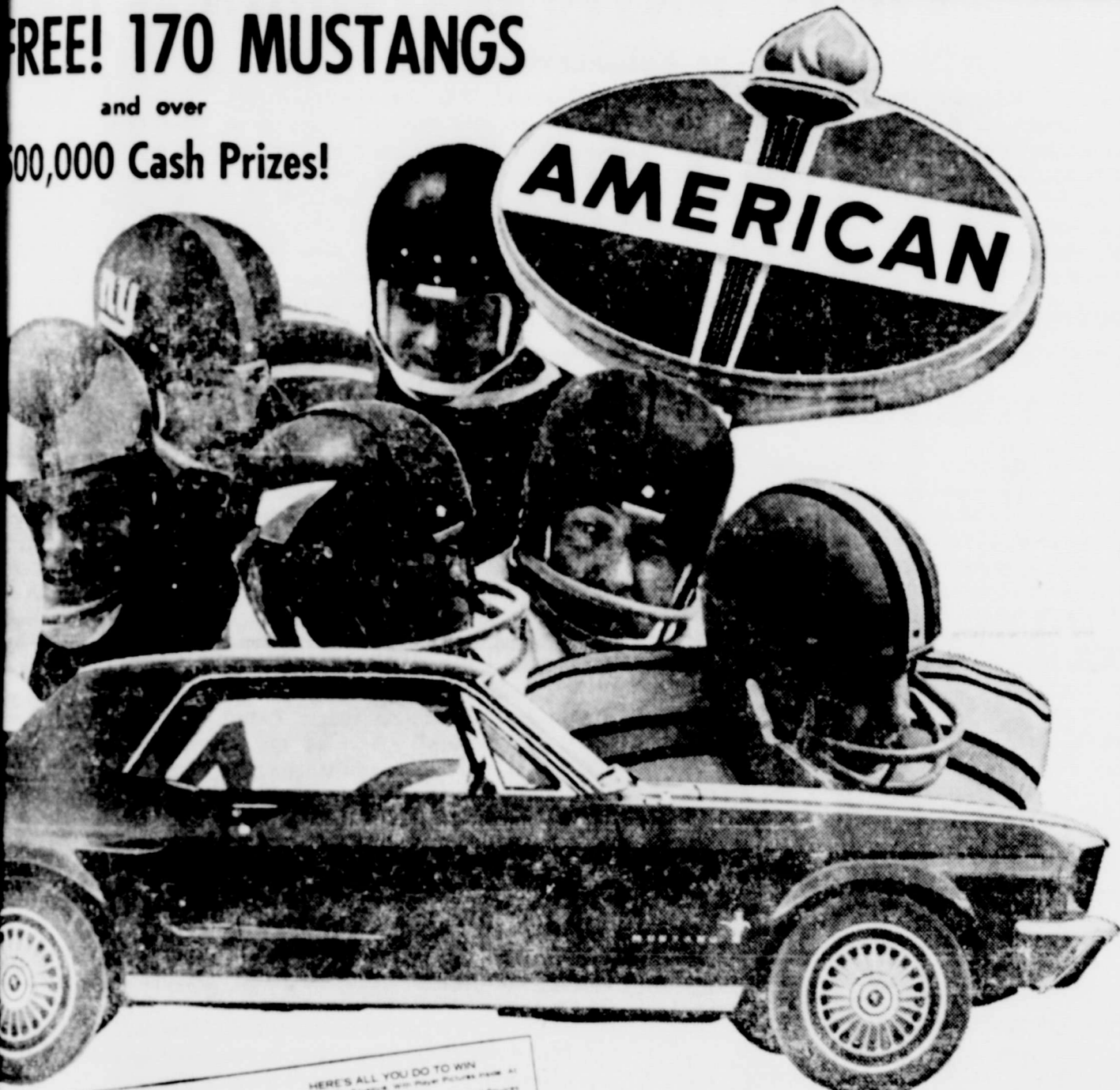
There is, however, one comfort-

Free Hunt Drawings Slated in Austin for Seven Wildlife Areas

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department announced that applications are being accepted for public hunts on seven wildlife management areas although the public drawings to determine the participants will not be held for another three weeks or so.

The free shoots involve primarily deer but also include javelina, turkey and quail. The Department noted that practically all the inquiries to date were about big game. Surplus inhabitants on the management areas are harvested under supervision as a part of the experimental activities covering many phases of wildlife management.

The public hunt sites will be Kerr Area near Kerrville, Black Gap Area in Brewster County, Engeling Area near Palastine, Angelina Area (Cherokee Unit) in Cherokee County, Sierra Duablo Area in far West Texas, Gene Howe Area in the Panhandle, and Matador Area near Paducah.

Interested hunters should submit their requests for application forms to the Parks and Wildlife Department, John H. Reagan State Office Building, Austin, Texas 78701. Deadline for acceptance of applications is 5:00 p.m., Monday, October 24, in the Austin headquarters.

The Department advised prospective participants that 17 yrs. is the minimum age. A maximum of four may apply for the same hunting party but none of these should apply for hunting on a second area. Number of the 1966-67 hunting license must be given along with full name and address.

The recent wool referendum in Upton County passed by a substantial majority according to the ASCS office. Eight ranchers voted to continue the wool promotion deductions that are deducted from the incentive pay-

ments. There were no votes in favor of discontinuing the deductions. The National Wool Council promotes wool and lambs via advertising purchased by the wool promotion deductions.

Also this week, the ASCS office is urging ranchers to apply for cost-sharing under the ACP program.

"Conservation is important if Upton County ranchers are to increase their productivity," said a spokesman for ASCS.

CHECK STRIPE DESIGN FOR BALANCE

Colorful, gay and interesting stripes may have an influence as you choose winter garments. A few guides can help you whether you buy stripes by the yard, or as a ready-to-wear garment.

Know how to recognize the two types of stripe designs, balanced and unbalanced. To tell whether a stripe design is balanced or not, fold the fabric in half along the main or dominant stripe to see if the stripe color and width are the same repeat. If the design, coloring and width repeat exactly, the stripe is balanced.

An unbalanced stripe design varies in the pattern, spacing and color. You need special care in

layout and cutting a garment from unbalanced stripe design.

Lay the pattern pieces on the striped fabric so that the tops of the pattern pieces point in the same direction, just as you would on a napped surface fabric. Be certain that notches to be matched fall on identical portions of the stripe design.

Balanced stripes on fabrics without nap are easy to work with. The stripes are evenly spaced and can be folded lengthwise or crosswise when you lay out your pattern. Use the cutting layout for fabric without nap.

Have the corresponding pattern notches on identical portions of the stripe design.

County Agent Day recently received information from the Screwworm Eradication Agency that indicates a possible increase in the confirmed screwworm cases in Texas. Day says that 48 confirmed cases in Texas from 22 counties. This is more than reported in Texas for any period than has been since the last week of 1963.

All livestock produced to be especially possible screwworm collect specimen and mail to the Screwworm Eradication Laboratory, Texas. The county via for submission of the Misonon Laboratory obtained at his office courthouse.
