Housing to Second Stage

With the Preliminary Planning
phase of the Rankin Low Rent
Housing Program scheduled for
completion by March 1, the local
Housing Authority this week com-
pleted the necessary forms to go
into the Annual Contributions
Contract which will include the
acquisition of property and the

actual construction of the units.
Present plans call for ten units
in Rankin and estimates approv-
ed by the Federal Housing As-
sistance Administration set their
total cost at \$150,051.00.

Estimated schedule to be follow-
ed in the development program
calls for acquisition of the land
within 90 days after execution of
the Annual Contributions Con-
tract; submission of final plans
and related documents within 200
days after the signing and com-
pletion of construction within 200
days after receipt of a Notice to
Proceed from the Federal author-
ity.

Plans drawn call for a total
of 41 rooms in the ten units with
21 of these designated for the
elderly and 20 for general occu-
pancy. Units will consist of six
one-bedroom homes, two two-bed-
room and two three-broom.

Type of building construction is
to be concrete foundations with
monolithic slabs, exterior walls of
brick veneer and rough cedar
board and batten. Roofs are to
be wood trusses, decked with ply
wood and finished with a built-
up roof and surface. Walls are
to be insulated, slab doors are to
be used, windows will be alumin-
um, counter tops in kitchens will
be laminated plastic as will areas
around tubs and showers. Mech-
anical systems will be gravity and
forced warm air furnaces with
ducts as required.

An administration building will
also be included in the program.

Estimated rents—and it is to
be understood that these are not
firm figures—put the three-bed-
room units at \$46 per month, the
two-bedroom units at \$42 per
month and 1-bedroom at \$30 per
month. Included in the rents are
all utilities with the exception of
electrical and telephone. Estimad-
ed amount that will be paid City

ORDINANCES—

Last week began the required publication of a batch of ordinances that are to go on the books at City Hall. They deal with requirements for a building code—primarily.

And from some of the reaction, a lot more folk read such notices than one might expect. And more than one of the readers apparently are a little upset. They fear that the new ordinances may turn Rankin into something like you find in the "big towns" where you must get a permit or pay a fee for such things as erecting fences, putting on an extra room or even planting a tree. In some places, all of these operations would have to "pass inspection."

Well, I don't think we are going to have to worry about this for quite some while in Rankin. The ordinances are necessary in order for the City of Rankin to comply with regulations necessary to get the Federal low rent housing. These ordinances will be strictly applied in the case of the low rent construction and opera-

These ordinances are of such nature and are not an effort to make trouble for anyone not connected with low rent.

For those who have difficulty hearing on the telephone, a handset is available with a wheel which adjusts the volume of the voice being received. For telephone users whose speech is impaired, another handset is equipped with a wheel that amplifies speech.

Electronic Larynx

This battery-operated device substitutes artificial vibrations for the natural vibrations produced by vocal cords. It can be used in certain cases by vocally handicapped people.



School-To-Home Service

Shut-in students can attend classes via telephone. This two-way communications system lets the student speak and listen to anyone in the classroom.

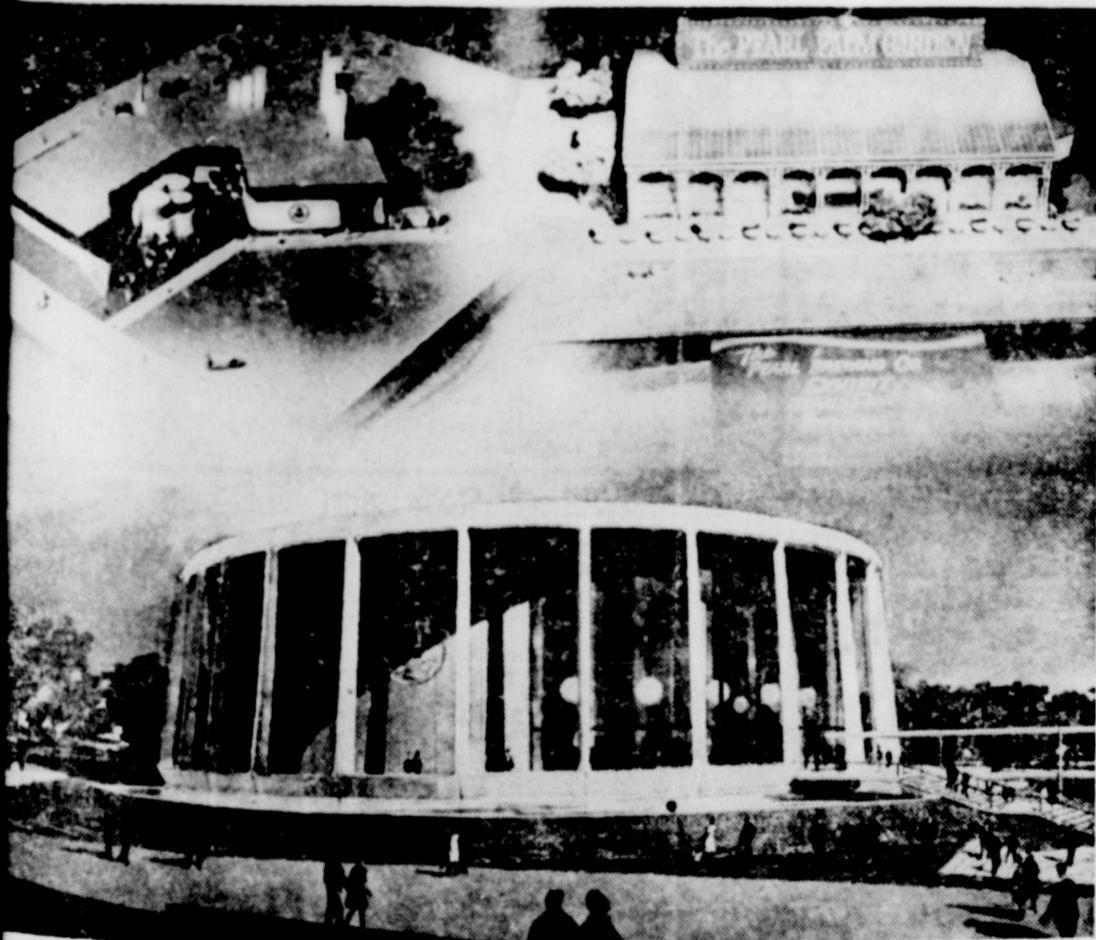

HINTS for the HOMEMAKER

There are many ways families can make their money go further.

The first place to start is with yourself. Here are some possibilities for savings:

Many families today spend as much as 14 percent of their income on car operation. Watch travel and keep track of expenditures. A switch to regular gas from premium gas will cut car costs.

There is a wide range in the amount spent for food. Some families eat for less than a dollar a day per person. If you would save money, plan meals and shop when markets offer specials. When possible, buy in quantity items to take advantage of price.

Continual payment of large finance charges on installment purchases or small loans often results in a loss of 5 percent of a family's income. It may be to your advantage to save in advance and pay when you can make the purchase. Figure out your payments. Can you afford them?

Insurance payments may be a heavy burden for your family. It may be possible to lower costs through the purchase of deductible insurance on property and on your automobile. The savings depend on where you live and the amount of insurance you carry. You can save, too, by having the company bill you once a year instead of monthly.

Coin-operated dry cleaning es-

tablishments make it possible for an individual to do a cleaning job for \$1.50 to \$2 that would cost \$6 or more at a regular cleaners. Use the coin-operated cleaner for items which need little or no pressing. Articles which require special care should be sent to a commercial cleaner.

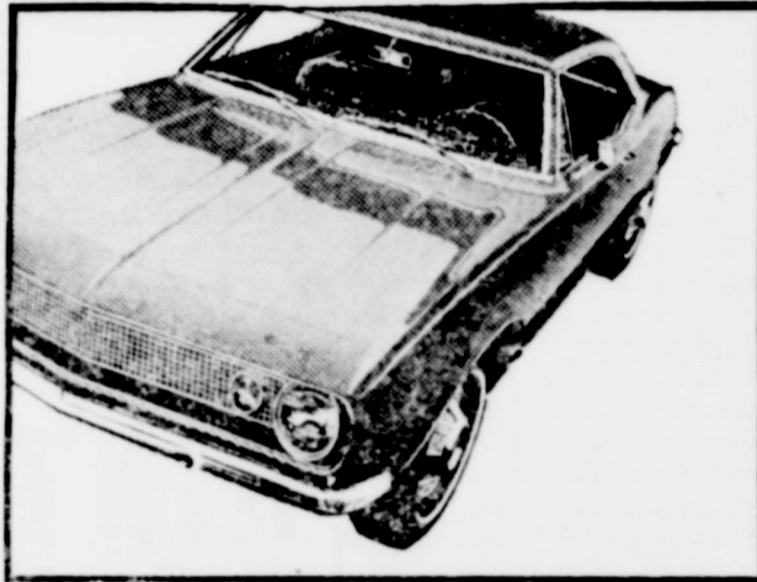

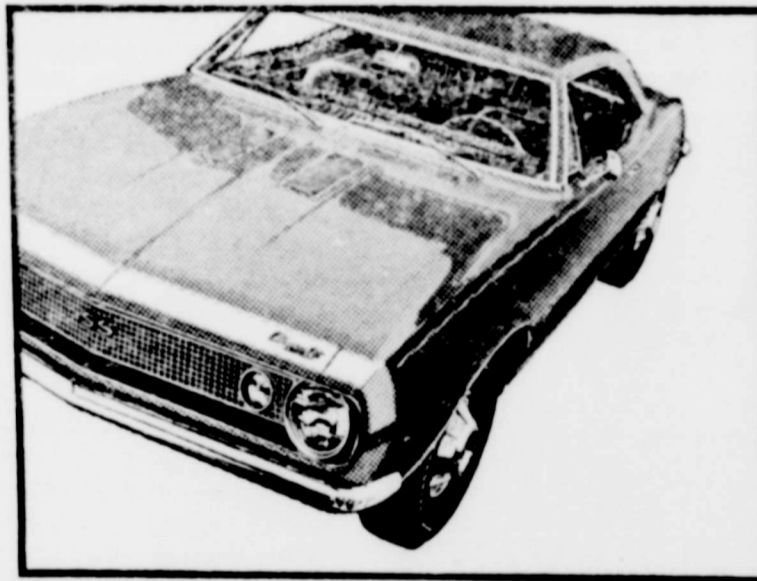
