Rankin to Send Thirteen to Lubbock Regional Meet

Rankin High School qualified a total of nine students for the Literary Regional Meet to be held in Lubbock April 21-22. Qualification was gained in District Literary Events, held over the past weeks, that saw Eldorado take the overall top slot with 124½ points. Rankin was second overall with an even 100 points while Sonora came in third at 72½.

takes their business out of town?

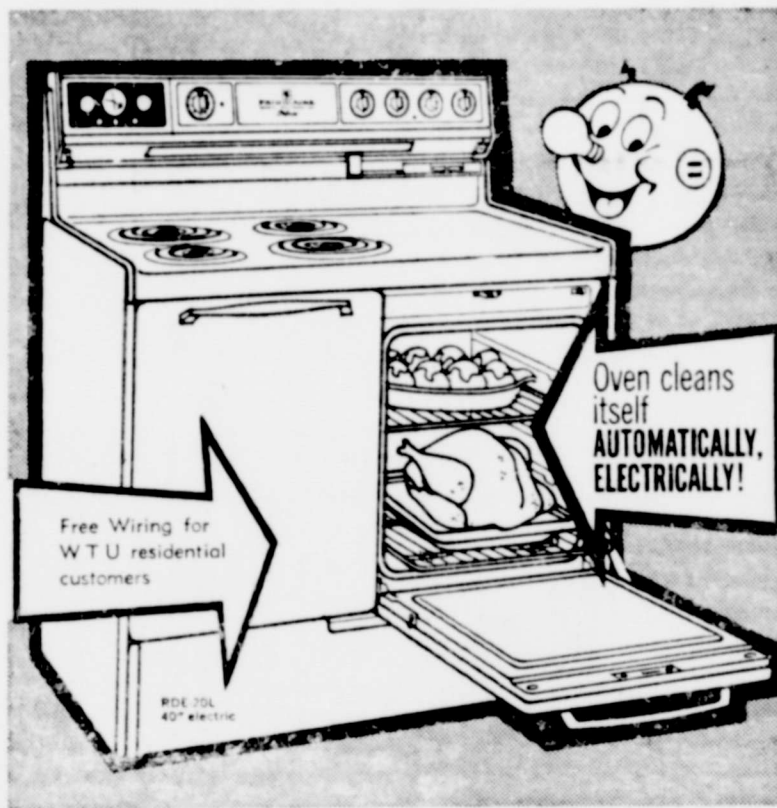
It just doesn't make much

in the first place.

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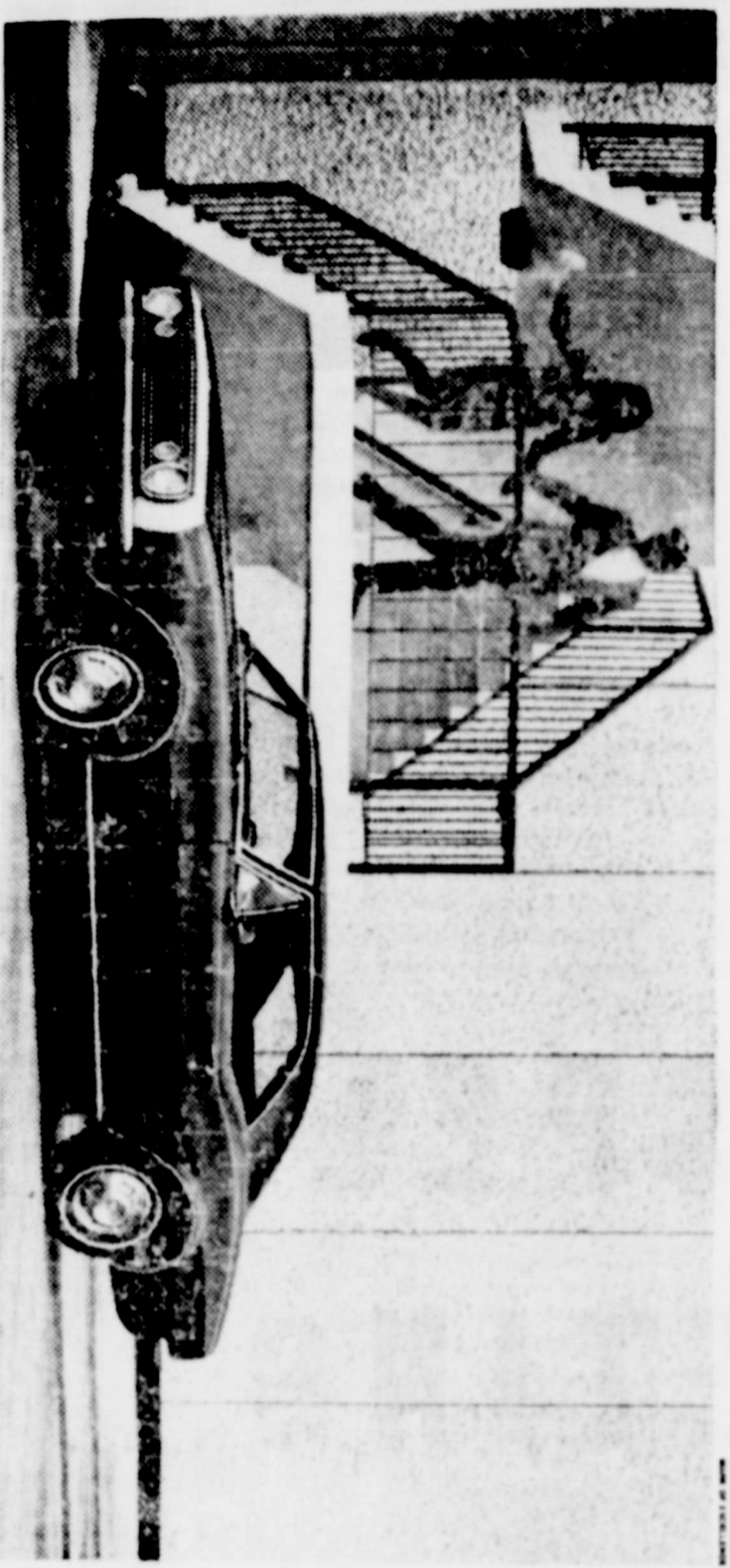
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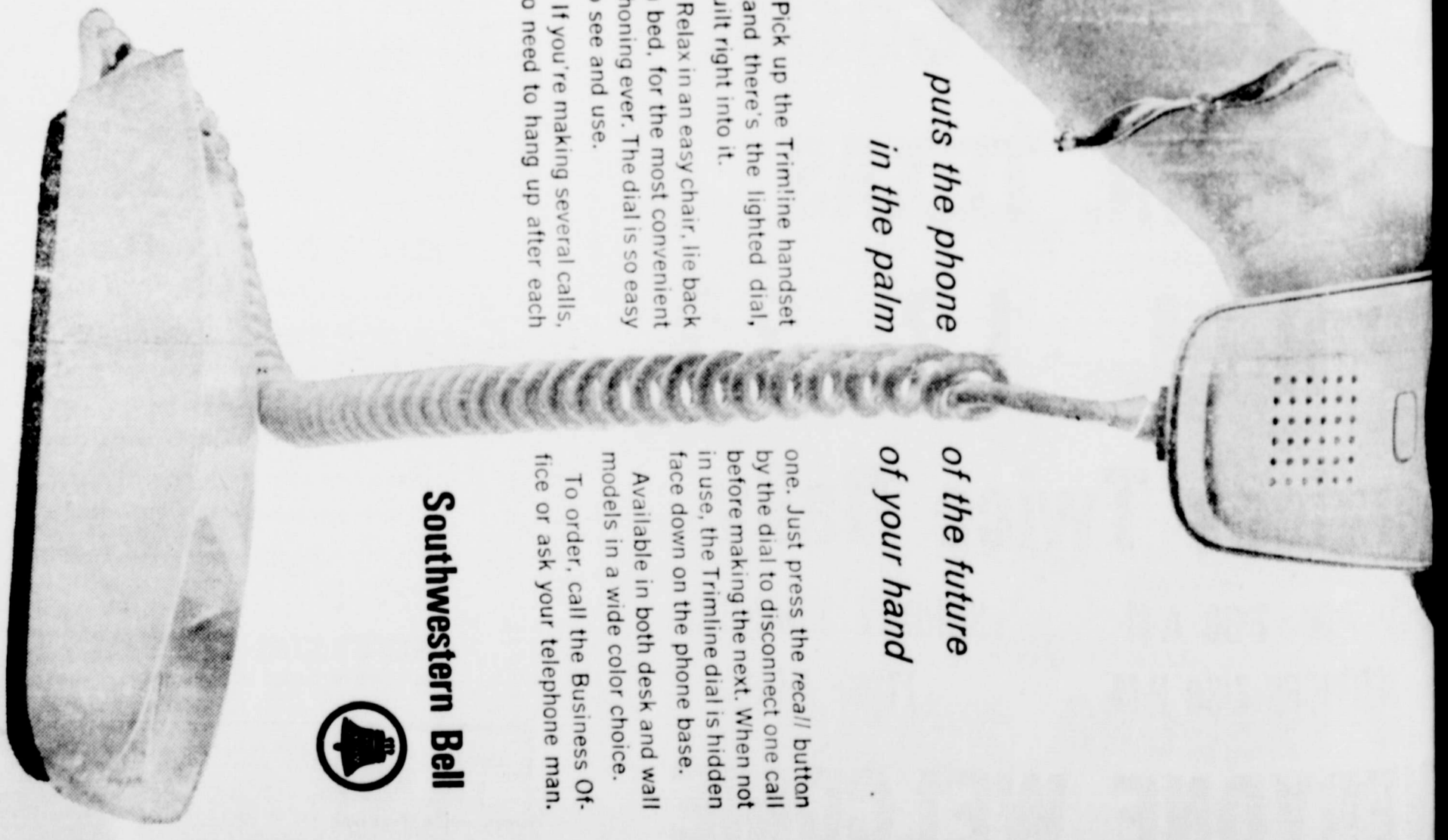

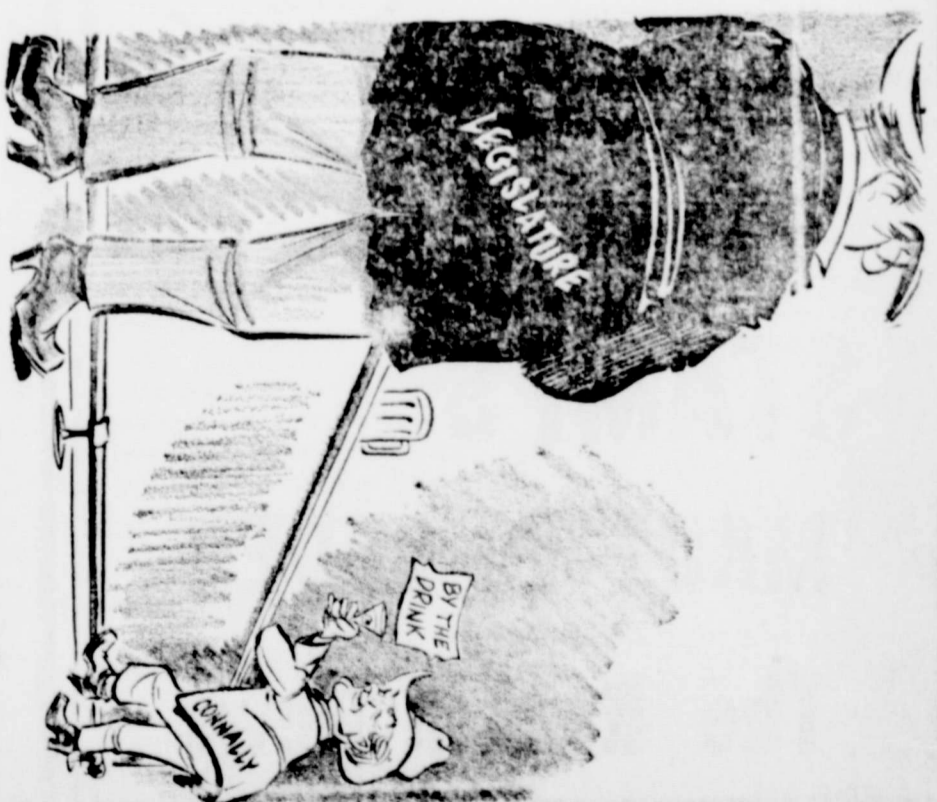

KOUNTY AGENT'S KORNER

Pecan trees are just now beginning to show new spring growth and growers should be planning a disease control program for 1967.

Scab is the most damaging disease of pecans and receives most attention from growers because noticeable brown areas produced on nuts lower quality and quantity. In certain years, other foliage diseases may cause as much or more damage than scab, and unhealthy leaves that shed early in the fall shortchange the grower who has hopes of a good crop the next year.

In order to control scab and other foliage diseases, a protective film of fungicide must be used on leaves prior to infection. Sprays should be directed to cover both surfaces of leaves, and enough spray should be used to insure good coverage.

The first of two applications should be made when leaves are one-third grown and before pollen is shed. The second application should be made just following pollination and about the time when the tips of tiny nuts

turn brown. Sprays should be made when heavy dews and intermittent rains keep the foliage damp for fairly long periods of time. Three to four additional sprays may be needed during the years of above average rainfall.

Zinc in the form of zinc sulfate may be added to fungicide sprays to prevent rosette.

Fungicides that give satisfactory control and are cleared for use on pecans are Bordeaux, Zineb, Cyprex, Polyram and Duter.

Interested growers may obtain more information on control of pecan diseases at my office.

1. Wash an apple for each person
2. Slice each apple into six pieces
3. Dip apple slices into orange juice or small amount of lemonade and drain on paper towel.
4. Spread one end slice and two middle slices of apple with peanut butter, deviled ham or cheese
5. Fit other end slice to end slice with spread on it. Fit other slices together to make "sandwiches"
6. Wrap each two slices in waxed paper for picnic lunch or serve as they are.

Questions and Answers about
All Number Calling
coming to Rankin in June



Q. What is All Number Calling?

A. It's the modern telephone numbering system that is being adopted across the nation, changing telephone numbers from two letters and five numerals to seven numerals.



Q. Will I actually dial most numbers as I always have?

A. Yes. There will be basically no change in the way you dial. The two letters of the exchange name will simply be changed to numerals.



Q. When will All Number Calling start in Rankin?

A. When the new telephone directory is delivered in June. The present prefix of "MY 3" will be changed to "693" — actually the same in dialing. The last four digits of each number will remain the same.



Q. Are other cities making this change?

A. Yes, on a gradual basis. About three-fourths of the nation's telephones now have all-numeral numbers.



Q. It is really easier and faster to dial numbers only?

A. People who have been using All Number Calling have found it is definitely easier and faster to dial numbers only, because they no longer have to search for letters on the dial.



Q. Are there any other advantages?

A. Definitely. All Number Calling ends confusion between the letter "I" and the number one; and the letter "O" and zero. Nor will there be any more misunderstanding or misspelling of the exchange names.
