some four to six dams would be needed to fully control the runoff of Rankin Draw and to give adequate flood protection to the areas South of the railroad. One of the big hopes for the proposed program, that of impounding a lake in the area, was pretty well dashed when engineers again put forth an opinion stating that it did not seem possible to them that any such location was situated within the watershed.

Pointing out that six out of thirty sites presently under consideration would be selected by June, the water board people gave no indication, publicly, as to Rankin's chances of getting on the select list. Priorities are controlled by a number of indicators such as urgency of need, funds available, amount of local interest shown, etc. It was the opinion of at least one observer that Rankin flunked the local interest bit. Federal, State and County offices participate in the joint operation in construction of these control and conservation undertakings.

Making the multiple-choice law effective was Governor John Connally who inked the measure this week after it had passed the Texas Legislature—receiving a 146 to 0 vote in the House of Representatives. A complete publication is made of that portion of the bill pertaining to Rankin Hospital and its general overall provisions, in this issue of the News. A similar publication is made in the McCamey News covering the McCamey Hospital and the general provisions of the bill.

where did it happen? In the shadow of the United Nations building! What did Martin Luther King do later? He addressed a rally at the U. N.! Ye gods and little fishes! What next can we expect?

"The Martin Luther Kings, the Stokely Carmichaels and others like them, wittingly or unwittingly, are playing footsy with the Communists, whether they have sense enough to know it or not. What they are doing may be very pleasing to Hanoi and Peking, but it is certainly repulsive, disgusting and sickening to the vast majority of Americans.

"While these rabble-rousers and hate-mongers—and that's what they really are—are running around over the country spewing their vermon and trying to get their dirty mugs before television cameras, hundreds of American boys, white and colored, are being killed or wounded in the jungles

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of Vietnam in a war that might have been ended but for the hope, encouragement and comfort this trio and their kind are continually giving to the enemy through fermentation of unrest, turmoil and disunity among a very, very small segment of the population. It is well to remember, however, that it was a small minority which seized power in the Communist revolution in Russia.

"In our opinion, when Martin Luther King was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize . . . it was not only a hoax, but the greatest travesty in history both perpetrated and perpetuated on the words "peace" and "justice".

"Can what he has been doing in America for several years be described or characterized as peaceful?

"From his mouthings it can be deducted that it's not peace in this country he wants—heaven knows he's created enough disturbances—but in Vietnam, and on the terms and conditions of the enemy.

"We're sorely tired of the abuse and vituperation that is being heaped upon our President by this motley gang . . . This country has . . . tolerated this open rebellion from a gang of traitors to the men in our fighting forces much longer than it should have.

"They go around bellowing like motherless calves and, like the calves, they're seeking nourishment—nourishment for their inflated egos and blood money for their pocketbooks.

"We wonder how much longer the United States government is going to tolerate the sowing of seeds of dissension and discord by King and his crew and others of their ilk? The processes of democracy have been stretched much, much too far already.

"Time has run out. It's later than we think. Something should be done now!

"In conclusion, as a suggestion, why wouldn't President Lyndon Baines Johnson, as Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces of

Sec. 3 CREATION OF DIRECTORS. Within 10 days after such election is held, the commission- ers court in such county shall convene and canvass the returns of the election and if a majority of qualified property taxpayers elects voting at said election in favor of the proposition, the court shall so find and declare the hospital district established and created. The management and control of the district is vested in a board of directors which consists of five members, to be elected by the qualified electors who own taxable property within the district and who have duly rendered that property for taxa- tion. To qualify for the election to the board, a person must:

1. be at least 21 years of age;
2. have been a resident of the district for at least two years;
3. be a qualified voter;
4. own taxable property within the district and have duly ren- dered that property for taxa- tion;
5. shall not be an officer of any political subdivision or the State of Texas or the County of Upton, whether such office be elective or by appointment.

Not less than 15 nor more than 25 days after the district is de- clared established and created the commissioners court shall call an election for the five directors who will serve as the district's first board of directors, this election to be held on a date not more than 30 days after the day of passage of the commissioners court order

Sec. 4 ADMINISTRATOR. The board shall appoint a general manager, to be known as the administrator of the hospital dis- trict. The administrator shall hold office at the pleasure of the board and shall receive such compensation as may be fixed by the board. The administrator shall be subject to removal at any time by the board. The adminis- trator shall, before entering into the discharge of his duties, ex- ecute a bond payable to the dis- trict, in the amount of not less than \$10,000 conditioned that he shall well and faithfully perform the duties required of him, and containing such other conditions as the board may require. The administrator shall perform all duties which may be required of him by the board, and shall sup- er vise all of the work and activi- ties of the district and have gen- eral direction of the affairs of the district within such limita- tions as may be prescribed by the board. Said administrator shall not be a member of the board and shall be qualified practitioner of medicine or be specifically train- ed for work of such character.

The board of directors, with the approval of the commissioners court, shall be authorized to con- tract with any county other than Upton County for care and treat- ment of the county's sick, diseased and injured persons, and with the state and agencies of the federal government for the care and treatment of such persons for whom the state and such agen- cies of the federal government are responsible. Further, under the same conditions, the board of directors may enter into such contracts with the state and fed- eral government as may be nec- essary to establish or continue a retirement program for the bene- fit of its employees.

Sec. 7 AUTHORIZATION OF BONDS. The board of directors shall have the power and author- ity to issue and sell as the obliga- tions of such hospital district, and in the name and upon the faith and credit of such hospital dis- trict, bonds for the purchase, con- struction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and im- provements and equipping the same for hospital purposes and for any or all of such purposes, provided, that a sufficient tax shall be levied to create an in- terest and sinking fund to pay the interest and principal as same mature provided said tax together with any other taxes levied for said district shall not exceed 75 cents in any one year. Such bonds shall be executed in the name of the hospital district and on its behalf by the char- man of the board of directors and countersigned by the secretary of the board of directors, and shall be subject to the same require- ments in the matter of approval thereof by the Attorney General of the State of Texas and the registration thereof by the Com- ptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas as are by law provided. Upon the approval of such bonds by the Attorney Gen- eral of Texas the same shall be incontestable for any cause. No bonds shall be issued by such

Sec. 9 FISCAL YEAR. AN- NUAL BUDGET. The fiscal year of the hospital district authorized to be established by the provi- sions hereof shall commence on October 1st of each year and end on the 30th day of September of the following year. The district directors shall cause an annual independent audit to be made of the books and records of the dis- trict, such audit to be made covering such fiscal year, and the same shall be filed with the County Clerk of Upton County, Texas, and at the office of the district not later than December 31st of each year.

The board of directors shall each year cause a budget to be prepared showing the proposed expenditures and disbursements and the estimated receipts and collections for the following fis- cal year and shall hold a public hearing on the proposed budget after publication of a notice of hearing in a newspaper of gen- eral circulation in the county at least once not less than 10 days prior to the date set for the hearing. Any person who is a taxpayer of the district shall have the right to appear at the time and place designated in the no- tice and be heard with reference to any item shown in the propo- sed budget. The proposed budget shall also show the amount of taxes required to be levied and collected during such fiscal year and upon final approval of the budget, the board of directors shall levy such tax as may be re- quired and certify the tax rate for such year to the county tax assessor and collector as provided in Section 6 hereof, and it shall be the duty of the said tax as- sessor and collector to assess and

Sec. 13 CONTRACTS EXCEEDING \$2,000. COMPETITIVE BID- DING. BOND OF CONTRACTOR. Any contract of any na- ture whatsoever entered into by the board of directors on behalf of said hospital district in excess of \$2,000 shall be let to the low- est qualified bidder after adver- tising the same in one or more newspapers of general circulation in this state for four consecutive weeks, and by posting notices thereof for at least 25 days in four public places in the county, one at the courthouse door and at least two within the district. Any person, firm or corporation desiring to bid on any such con- tract, shall, upon application to the directors, be furnished with a copy of the plans and speci- fications or other data necessary to make the said bid. All bids shall be in writing and sealed and delivered to the chairman of the board of directors, with a certi- fied check for at least five per- cent of the total amount bid, which shall be forfeited to the district in case the bidder re- fuses to enter into a proper con- tract if his bid is accepted. Any bid may be rejected if deemed too high. The contractor shall give surety bond to the district in ac- cordance with the provisions of Article 5160, Revised Civil Sta- tutes of Texas, 1925, and amend-

Sec. 17 EMINENT DOMAIN. The hospital district organized in pursuance of this Act shall have the right and power of eminent domain for the purpose of ac- quiring by condemnation any and all property of any kind or char- acter, real, personal or mixed, or any interest therein, including outright ownership of such prop- erty in fee simple absolute, with- in the boundaries of the said dis- trict, necessary or convenient to the exercise of the rights, pow- er, privileges and functions con- ferred upon it by this Act, in the manner provided by general law with respect to condemnation by counties; provided that the said district shall not be required to make deposits in the registry of the trial court of the sum re- quired by paragraph number 2 in Article 3268, Revised Civil Stat- utes of Texas, 1925, or to make the bond required therein. In con- demnation proceedings being pro- secuted by the said district, the district shall not be required to pay in advance or give any bond otherwise required for the issu- ance of a temporary restraining order or a temporary injunction relating to a condemnation proce- eding, nor to give bond for costs or for supersedeas or any appeal or writ of error proceeding to any court of civil appeals, or to the supreme court.

Sec. 18 CONSOLIDATION OF CERTAIN DISTRICTS. REFER- ENDUM, REFUNDING BONDS. The qualified electors of the hospital districts as provided here in may by two-thirds majority vote of each hospital district, consolidate the McCamey Hospital District into the Rankin Hospi- tal District at any time subse- quent to the organization of the separate hospital districts. When it is proposed to consolidate the two districts, 25 percent of the qualified taxpayer voters of each district may, by petition, request the commissioners court to sub- mit such a proposal to an elec- tion in each of the two hospital

collect such tax The directors and administrator of said hospital district shall annually prepare a report under oath containing a full statement of all the moneys, choses in action and how distributed or otherwise disposed of. Such report shall show in detail the operations of the district for the year and shall contain a full and complete list of all delinquent accounts owing and due such hospital district including names and addresses of delinquent debtors. Such report shall be filed in the office of the district and in the County Clerk's Office of Upton County, Texas.

ments thereto. Sect. 14. INSPECTION OF DISTRICT. The hospital district established or maintained under the provisions of this Act shall be subject to inspection by any duly authorized representative of the State Board of Health or any State Board of Charities (or Public Welfare) now existing or as may hereafter be created, and resident officers shall admit such representatives into all hospital district facilities and give them access on demand to all records, reports, books, papers and accounts pertaining to the hospital district.

districts. By the same petition and at the same election there shall be an election of five directors to serve the consolidated district. No more than one such election may be held after each general election. Both districts must separately approve the merger to effect the consolidation. Refunding bonds may be issued by said district upon merger and standing bonds (whether issued by said district upon merger and whether such outstanding bonds are original or refunding bonds). Additional funding may be provided by this Act.

Section 1. CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORITY. Pursuant to authority granted by the provisions of Section 9 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, Rankin County Hospital District is hereby authorized to be created and as created shall have boundaries coextensive with the boundaries of the Rankin Independent School District, as constituted on January 1, 1967, and possesses such rights, powers and duties as are hereinafter prescribed.

Sec. 2. CREATION OF DISTRICT. The district shall not be created nor shall any tax therein be authorized unless and until such creation and such tax are approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpayers electors of the district voting at an election called for such purposes. Such election may be initiated by the Commissioners Court of Upton County, Texas, upon its own motion or shall be called by said commissioners court upon presentation of a petition therefor signed by at least 100 qualified property taxpayers electors of the district. Such election shall be held not less than 20 nor more than 35 days from the time such election is ordered by the commissioners court. The order calling the election shall specify the time and places of holding same, the form of ballot and the presiding judge for each voting place. Notice of election shall be given by publishing a substantial copy of the election order in a newspaper of general circulation in said district once a week for two consecutive weeks, the first publication to appear at least 14 days prior to the date established for the election. If the proposition to create the Rankin County Hospital District fails to carry at the election, no other election for the same purpose may be held within one year after the result of the election is announced officially. At said election there shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpayers electors of said

Sec. 3. ASSISTANT TO ADMINISTRATOR. In the event of incapacity, absence or inability of the administrator to discharge any duties or functions required of the administrator, such assistant or other persons shall give bond and have such limitations upon his authority as may be fixed by the order of the board.

Sec. 10. DISTRICT DEPOSIT. The board of directors of the district shall name one or more banks within the district to serve as depository for the funds of the district. All such funds shall, as derived and collected, be immediately deposited with such depository bank or banks except that such money may be received by said bank or banks of payment on or prior to the date of maturity of such principal and interest so to be paid. To the extent that funds are not insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, they shall be secured in the manner provided by law for security of county funds. Membership on the board of directors of an officer or director of a bank shall not disqualify such bank from being designated as depository.

Sec. 11. DISTRICT ALONE TO INCUR INDEBTEDNESS FOR HOSPITAL PURPOSES. No county or part thereof that has been constituted a part of this hospital district, and no city therein, shall hereafter levy any tax for hospital purposes, and

Sec. 19. REFERENDUM ON QUESTIONS OF SEPARATE TAX ASSESSOR AND SEPARATE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION. After the establishment of a district, and upon the petition of not less than five percent of the qualified taxpayer voters thereof, the court may order an election to determine whether or not such district shall have a separate tax assessor, separate board of equalization and separate board of equalization for the assessment and collection of district taxes. Notice of such election shall be given as in the original election, and if said proposition carries by a two-thirds vote, the said directors shall appoint a suitable person as assessor and other such person as collector, and they shall give bond and exercise the same powers and perform the same duties as provided herein for the county assessor and collector; and the directors shall exercise all of the powers herein conferred upon said court with relation to the equalization of taxes, the general laws relating to the assessment, collection and equalization of taxes, insofar as applicable, shall apply to the assessment, collection and equalization of district taxes.

Sec. 5. ASSISTANT TO ADMINISTRATOR. In the event of incapacity, absence or inability of the administrator to discharge any duties or functions required of the administrator, such assistant or other persons shall give bond and have such limitations upon his authority as may be fixed by the order of the board.

Sec. 6. LEVY AND COLLECTION OF TAX. Upon the creation of such hospital district, the board of directors shall have the power and authority and it shall be their duty to levy on all property subject to hospital district taxation for the benefits of the district at the same time taxes are levied for county purposes, using county values and county tax rolls, a tax not to exceed 75 cents on the \$100 valuation of all taxable property within the hospital district, for the purpose of (1) paying the interest on and creating a sinking fund for bonds which may have been assumed or which may be issued by the hospital district for hospital purposes as herein provided; (2) providing for the operation and maintenance of the hospital or hospital system; and (3) for the purpose of making further improvements and additions to the hospital system, and for the acquisition of necessary sites therefor, by purchase, lease or condemnation.

Not later than October 1st of each year, the board of directors shall levy the tax on all taxable property within the district which is subject to taxation and shall immediately certify such tax rate to the tax assessor and collector of the county in which the district is located. The tax so levied shall be collected on all property subject to hospital district taxation by the assessor and collector of taxes for the county.

Sec. 14. INSPECTION OF DISTRICT. The hospital district established or maintained under the provisions of this Act shall be subject to inspection by any duly authorized representative of the State Board of Health or any State Board of Charities (or Public Welfare) now existing or as may hereafter be created, and resident officers shall admit such representatives into all hospital district facilities and give them access on demand to all records, reports, books, papers and accounts pertaining to the hospital district.

Sec. 15. PATIENTS; INQUIRY AS TO ABILITY TO PAY. Whenever a patient has been admitted to the facilities of the hospital district from the area of the said hospital district, the administrator shall cause inquiry to be made as to his circumstances, and of the relatives of such patient legally liable for his support. If he finds that such patient or said relatives are liable to pay for his care and treatment in whole or in part, an order shall be made directing such patient or such relative to pay to the treasurer of the hospital district for the support of such patient a specified sum per week, in proportion to the financial ability, but such sum shall not exceed the actual per capita cost of maintenance. The administrator shall have power and authority to collect such sum from the estate of the patient, or his relatives legally liable for his support, in the manner provided by law for the collection of expenses of the last illness of the deceased person. If the administrator finds that such patient or said relatives are not able to pay, either in whole or in part, for his care and treatment in such hospital the same shall become a charge upon the hospital district. Should there be a dispute, as to ability to pay, or doubt in the mind of the administrator, the board of directors of said district shall hear and determine the same after calling witnesses, and shall make such order as may be proper, from which appeal shall lie to the district court by either party to the

Sec. 20. LEGAL COUNSEL. The board of directors of said hospital district shall be authorized to employ legal counsel to represent the hospital district in all legal matters.

Sec. 21. SUITS. All hospital districts created under the provisions of this Act shall be and are declared to be political subdivisions of the State of Texas.

Sec. 22. SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this Act is held to be unconstitutional, the remainder of this Act shall not be affected thereby.

Sec. 23. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Act shall take effect on the date of its passage by the Legislature.

Sec. 24. SHORT TITLE. This Act shall be known and may be cited as the Rankin County Hospital District Act.
