## Rankin Begins Clean-Up After Big Blow

**HOUSES** found the going particularly hard Friday as three were completely overturned—the most severely damaged. Several others were moved about and practically all in town had hail damage.

At 7:00 o'clock last Thursday evening, everything was "normal" in Rankin. The Cardinals and the Giants were playing the first of two Little League games on tap. Several people were getting their horses ready and working on preparations for the opening of the rodeo Friday. Numerous others were busy with assorted tasks—many were outdoors.

Even the weather was a somewhat ordinary day. To the South and Southwest, showers were falling but only occasional and distant thunder could be heard in Rankin. Hardly anyone gave more than a second glance to the small cloud that apparently was passing to the East of town across the range of hills—just as such clouds had done numerous times in the past.

At about 7:05, the Little League pitcher took his windup and fired the ball toward home plate. He almost got it blown back in his face. In less than fifteen minutes Rankin had experienced what some believe was its worst wind storm ever and certainly its greatest property loss. Some say a tornado passed over the town. Others say it was a straight wind. Some estimated the force of the wind as high as 100 miles an hour. All agree that it was a mighty blow.

By 7:30, a warm wind was blowing into Rankin from the North as the storm cloud—still a rather small affair—ranged on toward Midland. By ten that night, a light rain was falling and most folk were trying to get their sleeping arrangements for the night in order.

An ordinary day that turned out to be not so ordinary was drawing to a close.

### DAMAGE WIDESPREAD

Hardly a building or tree in Rankin escaped without some mark to attest to the heavy hail that fell, particularly in the west part of town, or to the wind that had force enough to snap fifteen-inch thick poles at the drive inn theatre. Many pieces of metal and loose lumber were gust-ed about and tree limbs, trash and dirt were almost as thick as the rain and the hail.

Full extent of the damage may never be tallied. Insurance adjusters were in Rankin by early Friday morning and continue to work at a full pace. So far, only those with the most severe damages have been looked into.

Adjusters have estimated that

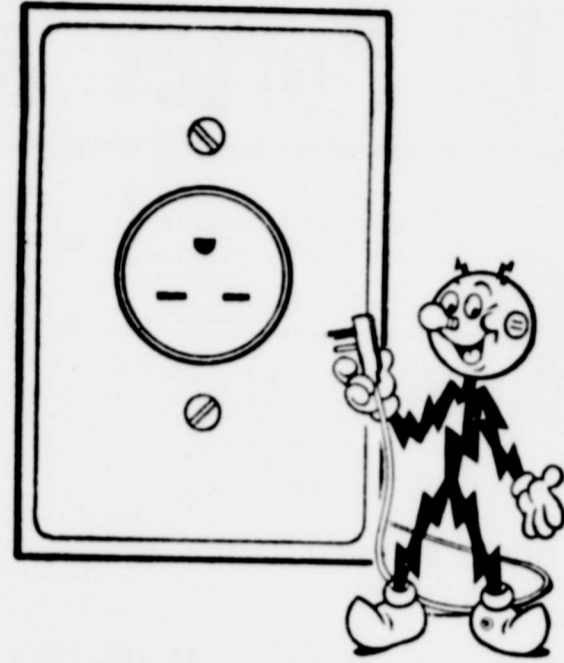

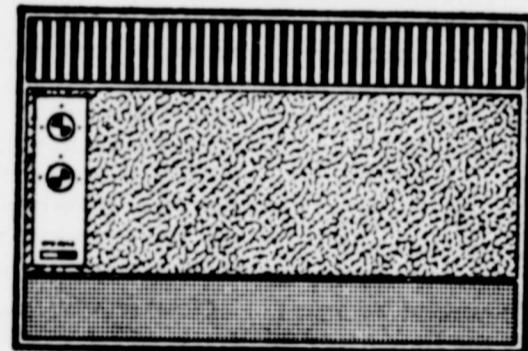

#### LAWNS, TREES SHRUBS AFFECTED BY LACK OF IRON

Iron Chlorosis has been showing up in many lawns and ornamental plants throughout Texas. Symptoms are generally a yellowing of the green foliage due to failure of chlorophyll to develop normally.

The chlorosis occurs in susceptible plants where and when iron is not available to them. This lack of iron may be due to a deficiency or to the iron being unavailable because of alkaline conditions. In either case, iron supplied by ferrous sulfate or iron chelates will be beneficial.

Ferrous sulfate can be applied as a foliar spray at the rate of two teaspoons per gallon of water, plus a spreader-sticker. A teaspoon of household detergent can be used as the spreader-sticker. The spray should be applied in the late afternoon to avoid leaf burn and should be repeated

The iron sulfate can also be applied to the soil as a fertilizer. Apply to trees and shrubs in holes made in a circle just outside the spread of the branches. A five-foot tall shrub requires about a fourth of a pound. A tree should have three-fourths of a pound for each inch of trunk diameter. In the case of highly alkaline soil, the foliar spray is more effective than soil application.

Close growing plants such as grass should receive an application of four pounds per 100 sq. ft. Any soil application should be watered immediately.

## HINTS for the HOMEMAKER

#### SIX THINGS TO MAKE BRIGHTER

##### MIRRORS—

Spray lightly with a window spray. Polish quickly with newspapers or paper towels.

##### GARBAGE CANS—

Keep "G. O." (garbage odors) under control by cleaning pails after they are emptied on collection day. Pour pine oil disinfectant and hot water into the pails, let them soak, then dump the solution out around the area where the cans are stored. This treatment cleans, disinfects and deodorizes all at once.

##### BIRD CAGES—

They are for the birds, but they are decorative too. Keep bird cage bright and sanitary by cleaning inside and out with a pine

oil cleaner.

##### IRONS—

Whisk away clinging starch with a window spray. Polish with a soft cloth and see yourself in the mirror-shine of the ironplate.

##### PAINT BRUSHES—

For soft, pliable bristles clean brushes in pine oil cleaner. Pine oil is a natural solvent. Remove all cleaner before using them again and make sure brushes are dry.

##### ASHTRAYS—

The trick here is to empty the ashtray before bedtime and soak them in a pine oil cleaner. By morning you will have pine fragrance instead of stale cigarette smell. Another good idea: wax inside of ashtrays to make ashes slide off.

### SIX THINGS TO MAKE BRIGHTER

#### MIRRORS—

Spray lightly with a window spray. Polish quickly with newspapers or paper towels.

#### GARBAGE CANS—

Keep "G. O." (garbage odors) under control by cleaning pails after they are emptied on collection day. Pour pine oil disinfectant and hot water into the pails, let them soak, then dump the solution out around the area where the cans are stored. This treatment cleans, disinfects and deodorizes all at once.

#### BIRD CAGES—

They are for the birds, but they are decorative too. Keep bird cage bright and sanitary by cleaning inside and out with a pine

oil cleaner.

#### IRONS—

Whisk away clinging starch with a window spray. Polish with a soft cloth and see yourself in the mirror's shine of the ironplate.

#### PAINT BRUSHES—

For soft, pliable bristles clean brushes in pine oil cleaner. Pine oil is a natural solvent. Remove all cleaner before using them again and make sure brushes are dry.

THE STATE OF TEXAS

2. That the proposed Rankin County Hospital District shall constitute a single election precinct for said election, and the following election officers are hereby appointed to hold said election at the aforesaid polling place:

Myrtle Holmes, Presiding Judge

Bernice Wheeler, Alternate Presiding Judge

The Presiding Judge shall appoint two qualified voters who are residents of the precinct to serve as election clerks and shall appoint as many additional clerks as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of election. The maximum number of clerks at the election precinct shall not exceed Four (4).

3. The County Clerk of Upton County shall be the Clerk for absentee voting for said election and the office of the County Clerk in the Courthouse is hereby designated as the place at which absentee voting shall be conducted for said election, during the regular office hours of said County Clerk.

5. That the official ballot for such election shall have printed thereon the following:

### PROPOSITION NO. 1

"FOR THE CREATION OF THE RANKIN COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT, AND PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY OF ANNUAL TAXES NOT TO EXCEED 75 CENTS ON THE \$100 VALUATION OF ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY WITHIN THE DISTRICT."

"AGAINST THE CREATION OF THE RANKIN COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT, AND PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY OF ANNUAL TAXES NOT TO EXCEED 75 CENTS ON THE \$100 VALUATION OF ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY WITHIN THE DISTRICT."

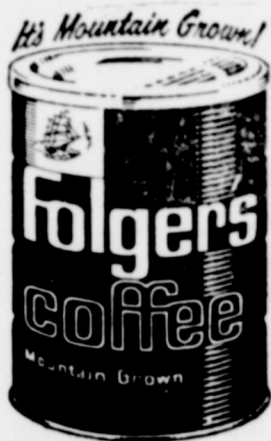
