WORSHIP SERVICES SUNDAY AT METHODIST CHURCH



\$50,000 IN NEW ADDITIONS

Methodist Church will hold the grand opening of its new sanctuary and educational facility on Sunday, June 25. The church recently completed a \$50,000 renovation program. The morning worship at 10 a.m. will include a consecration service held by Rev. Kermit Trussel, district superintendent, at that time. The school will meet at 10:00 a.m. and lunch will be served for the fellowship hall at 11:30 a.m. Plans call for a program in which recognition will be given to the fifty-first anniversary of the founding of the church.

A cordial invitation to the public to attend all the services was issued this week by the Methodist.

New construction at the local church started in mid-December and was substantially completed as of June 16. Efficient cooling and heating systems have been installed. The interior of the new sanctuary is designed to provide a worshipful setting, giving emphasis to the cross, according to church officials.

All the old portion of the church has been re-designed and made into classrooms, a nursery and a fellowship hall. Special lighting effects, upholstered seating and wall-to-wall carpeting have been included in the sanctuary.

boxes will be open in the county: one at the Upton Courthouse for voters residing within the Rankin School District and vot-

A simple majority can carry or defeat the proposition. Voters in one proposed district can create the district within the county and the voters of the other might reject the proposal—thus remaining under county control.

Although a rather light turnout has been indicated through the absentee balloting, most observers felt here in Rankin that the proposition may carry by a close majority. Strong support for creating the two districts has come from oil company representatives and the Commissioners Court — both having pointed out that a considerable savings in tax money can be realized by creation of the districts as opposed to present financing methods by the county for hospital operations.

In McCamey, the issue is said to be somewhat harder to define.

ABSENTEE VOTES—

A total of 21 absentee ballots were cast in the upcoming hospital election, according to the office of Nancy K. Daugherty, county and district clerk. Of this number, 7 of the voters resided in the McCamey District and 14 in the Rankin District.

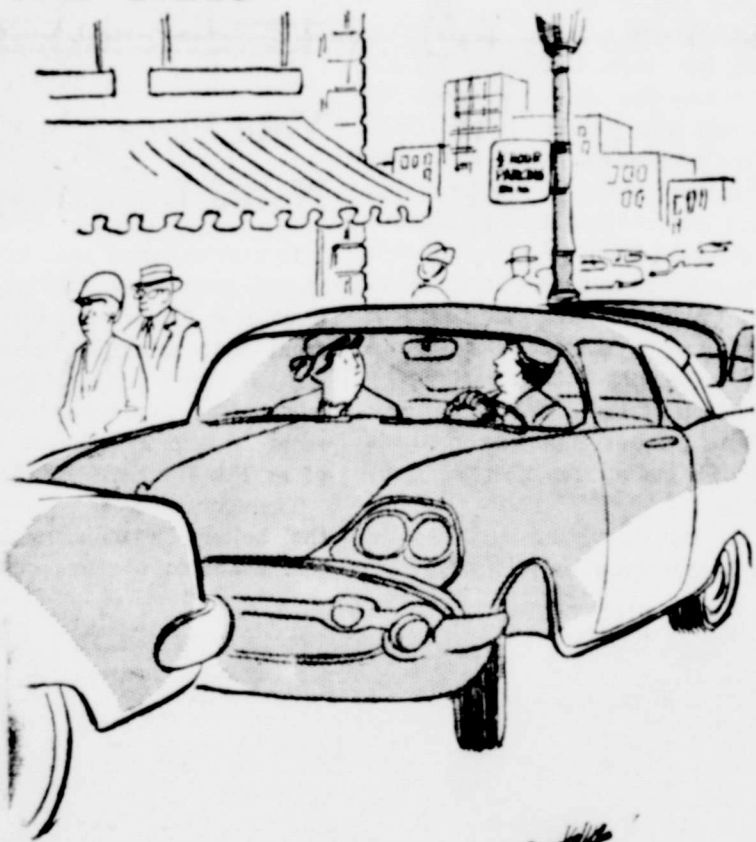

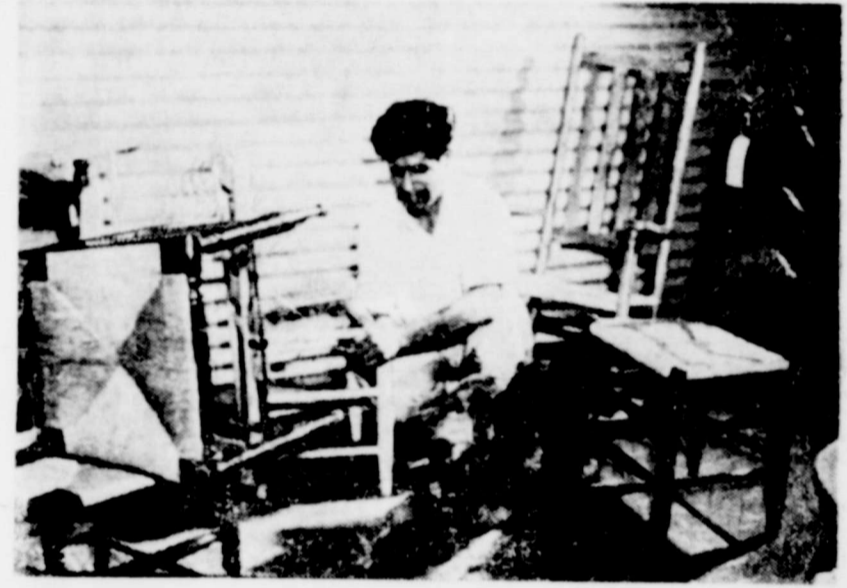
Local Service Unit Seeks "Army" Funds

SCREW WORM CONTROL RESULTS SINCE BEGINNING OF PROGRAM

May, livestock owners of
sent in 364 non-screw
ples to the Southwest

Screwworm Eradication Lab at
Mission, Texas for checking. Tex-
ans submitted 291 of these sam-
ples; New Mexico ranchers, 6;
Oklahoma ranchers, 20; Arkansas
and Louisiana livestock owners, 2

for each state; and Arizona, 43.
Texas counties reporting screw-
worm cases in May included —
one each — Atascosa, Brewster,
Crockett, Hidalgo, La Salle, Pre-
sidio, Starr, Val Verde and Will-
acy; and two each — Bandera,
Medina, Terrell and Uvalde. The
Arizona case was in Maricopa
County.

The eighteen confirmed cases of
screwworms in the United States
in May corresponds to 122 for
the same period in 1966; 93 in
1965; 37 in 1964; 705 in 1963, and
6,372 in 1962.

It was the best May since the

program was started in 1962. At
the same time, the program re-
leased the largest number of
sterile screwworm flies during
May than for any previous time
since the program began.

Another note of guarded opti-
mism was voiced by officials in
charge of activities when they
noted that for the past 5 weeks,
an average of only three cases
per week were reported. This pic-
ture, however, could change rap-
idly following recent rains and
continued hot, moist weather.

Livestock owners are cautioned
to continue checking animals at

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frequent intervals and to collect
and submit larval samples to the
Mission laboratory for checking.

The Screwworm Program offi-
cials emphasized that many a-
reas of the state are still shear-
ing, and farmers and ranchers
need to be especially careful to
treat all wounds that might in-
vite possible screwworm infesta-
tions. They urged that livestock
owners treat all wounds—man-
made and otherwise—in order to
curb the spread of screwworm
cases.

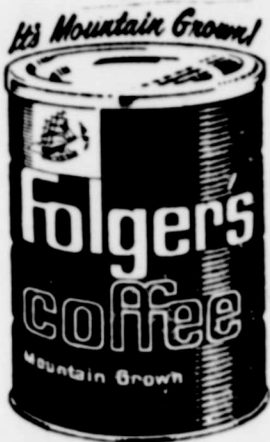
