A PARENT SPEAKS
4TH IN A SERIES
Parents of exceptional children feel at times thaty they stand a lone with their concern for their child. This is certainly a feeling that no one likes to have. It has been said that you can tell the parent of a cerebral palsied child by her bent back and tired face, the parent of a mentally retarded child by the look of quiet resignation. You can tell the parent of a brain injured child by a harried look of nervous exhaus

What parents of exceptiona children ask people to remember is that these children are loved very much. They need so much more than a child with no prob. lems at all.
There are even certain circum. stances where we parents have had to acquire a completely new set of friends, because our old ones did not understand the prob. lems that we have. If there are older children in the family, the parents are sometimes torn beween the children, because the older child might complain, "you spend all your time on him, you never pay attention to me." Then, because we are only human, we may wonder: 'my family never had anything like this. I wonder if it could be on my side, or my husoand's side?" On, maybe the parents wonder "what are we doing wrong?" The answer, of course, is nothing. These are just some of the dilemmas a parent goes through who has an ex. ceptional child.
I belleve that as parents of these children, the most diffi cult reality to face is that there are limited services for them; once we have accepted the fact that the child is exooptional. But, we need to accept this fact, and need not feel that God is punishing us for something through our child. Also, we begin to develop a strength and insight that some parents never have. Our strength comes from having an exceptional child.
Some people maintain that a parent cannot feel one way and act another way toward the child. But, we know that you can train yourself to be able to communicate love and understanding when you are dead tired. Control over our emotions is part of the strength we par. ents develop. As parents accept that fact that their child has a problem, they have an opportum. ity to be as close to each other as humanly possible. This too, is where the strength comes from; strong family thes.
There may be times when par. ents feel so deeply concerned with their chuldren that life seems to be a deep burden. But remember, we as parents of exceptional children have an opporsunity that many peopie have never had. And our concern is never meaningless to God. We can develop a trust in the goodness and mercy of God that can come only with intense concern for our chudren.
