Moved into Far West District 7-A for '68--

Rankin has new Schedule in Athletics for Next Year

With the moving of Rankin in to District 7A, a drastic change in athletic activities is indicated beginning in 1968 for the Red Devils. Gone will be several of the long-time opponents, to be replaced with teams never before faced by local squads. With a new district composed of Rankin, Iraan, Sanderson, Van

Horn, Clint and Socorro, Rankin will face a considerable traveling problem. In their first meeting under the new alignment, schools involved met last Tuesday in Van Horn and worked out the 1968-69 schedule. Rankin drew two opponents at home and three away. Opening the district action will be Rankin and Socorro, in Rankin, on October 18. October 25 will see Rankin in Clint, followed on November 1 with Van Horn in Rankin. On November 8, Rankin will go to Iraan for a game and on November 15, the regular season will close with the Red Devils going to Sanderson. A five-game non-district schedule has also been tentatively set up beginning next year. This schedule will not be definite until contracts are signed, according to Pete Bateman, superintendent of Rankin Schools. As now planned, it will be as follows:

Hospital Board to Post Delinquents

Rankin Hospital Board has recently hired an auditing firm to check the accounts of the District as of October 1. Among the duties of the firm will be that of determining delinquent accounts. The Board has set a rule that any account past ninety days and which has not received at least a partial payment, will be declared "delinquent." In commenting on the procedure this week, Leon Feuge, administrator, pointed out that under the law creating the Rankin and McCamey County Hospital Districts, the names of all delinquent accounts will be posted for public inspection, both in his office at the hospital and in the office of the county clerk. Feuge emphasized that this is a requirement of the law and that therefore, compliance by the Hospital Board is mandatory.

If it wasn't going to cost so much money, it would be laughable.

Here in Texas, we are prone to play games of make believe. For instance we call our school districts "Rankin Independent School District," "Iranan Independent School District," etc.

We ought to face facts and drop the "In" and make that read "Dependent" school districts.

We are dependent upon the whims of the state agencies in Austin that are the real "rulers" of Texas School Districts. If you don't agree, take a look at what has happened in our football district.

Without so much as a "by your leave," Rankin has been yanked out of District 8A—along with Iraan and Sanderson — and put in with Van Horn, Clint and Socorro. And did Austin ask any of us about the arrangement? Not hardly.

In fact, they didn't even bother to tell the schools involved in advance of releasing the information to the newspapers. They just up and spent several thousand dollars of our money without even finding out whether we

had any better way to spend it than running a few thousand extra miles a year to participate in such a district.

Using Rankin as the center and Socorro as the outer edge, draw a circle on the Texas map. You will see that the area takes in well over half the state, a good hunk of New Mexico, a part of Oklahoma and a chunk of Old Mexico.

To the east, we could travel almost to Fort Worth—or to the city limits of Wichita Falls—or

in the U. S. but these Austin boys must have burned their draft cards.

With the money it's going to take to participate in this outlandish "district", any of the six schools could have hired an extra teacher, could have purchased a batch of books for the library, could have bought new lab equipment, could have redone a classroom or two, could have passed out a few more free lunches—and believe me—out in the Socorro area they could use some more. They could have done a lot of things more worthwhile than running up and down the highways getting to and from extracurricular activities.

But, say the Austin people, the schools out in far west Texas must have someone as opponents. So divide the thing into zones—like basketball. Let Iraan, Rankin and Sanderson play each other twice—then let the winner from our zone meet the winner from the West for a one-game match.

Oh, but you can't do that in football, you say.

Listen, Buddy. That bunch in Austin can do anything they daa blamed well please. They can make the rules and they can change the rules. They are the only "Independent" operators in Texas.

But bring on the West Coast. It may cost us 5 or 10 thousand dollars but if Rankin can get by Iraan next year, we've done won us a district championship for after all the hue and cry about

getting some opponents for the far west schools, they hardly ever score against teams from this area—much less win.

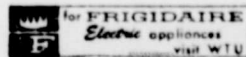

A PARENT SPEAKS

4TH IN A SERIES

Parents of exceptional children feel at times that they stand alone with their concern for their child. This is certainly a feeling that no one likes to have. It has been said that you can tell the parent of a cerebral palsied child by her bent back and tired face, the parent of a mentally retarded child by the look of quiet resignation. You can tell the parent of a brain injured child by a harried look of nervous exhaustion.

What parents of exceptional children ask people to remember is that these children are loved very much. They need so much more than a child with no problems at all.

There are even certain circumstances where we parents have had to acquire a completely new set of friends, because our old ones did not understand the problems that we have. If there are older children in the family, the parents are sometimes torn between the children, because the older child might complain, "you spend all your time on him, you never pay attention to me." Then, because we are only human, we may wonder: "my family never had anything like this. I wonder if it could be on my side, or my husband's side?" Or, maybe the parents wonder, "what are we doing wrong?" The answer, of course, is nothing. These are just some of the dilemmas a parent goes through who has an exceptional child.

I believe that as parents of these children, the most difficult reality to face is that there are limited services for them; once we have accepted the fact that the child is exceptional. But, we need to accept this fact, and need not feel that God is punishing us for something through our child. Also, we begin to develop a strength and insight that some parents never have. Our strength comes from having an exceptional child.

Some people maintain that a parent cannot feel one way and act another way toward the child. But, we know that you can train yourself to be able to communicate love and understanding when you are dead tired. Control over our emotions is part of the strength we parents develop. As parents accept that fact that their child has a problem, they have an opportunity to be as close to each other as humanly possible. This too, is where the strength comes from; strong family ties.

There may be times when parents feel so deeply concerned with their children that life seems to be a deep burden. But remember, we as parents of exceptional children have an opportunity that many people have never had. And our concern is never meaningless to God. We can develop a trust in the goodness and mercy of God that can come only with intense concern for our children.

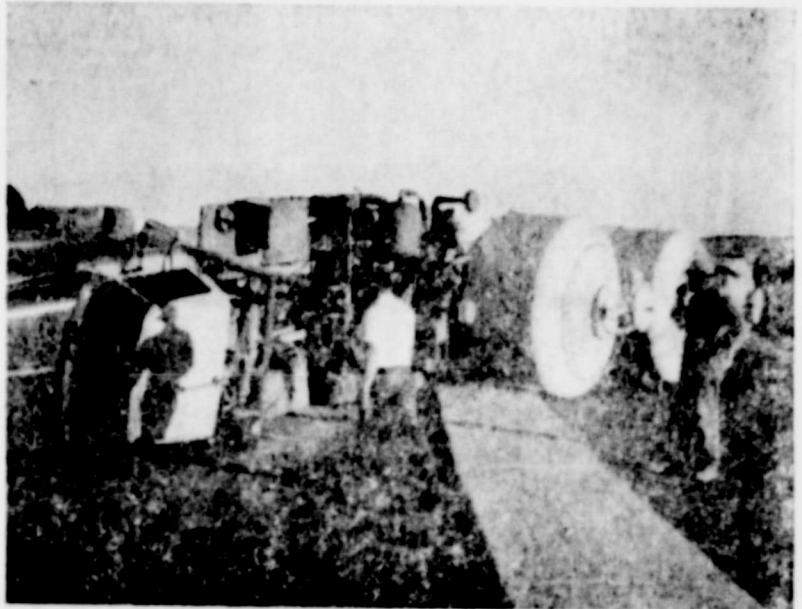
